The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to Order, That the Parliament, which stands Prorogued to Tuesday the Sixth of September next, should be further Prorogued to Tuesday the Eleventh Day of October following.

His Majesty having been pleased, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Great Britain, to constitute Charles Vernon, Esq; Lieutenant of His Majesty's Tower of London, he this Day, in Council, took the Oaths appointed to be taken, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy; and likewise the Oath of Lieutenant of the Tower of London.

The following Address of the Governor, and Council of Barbados, has been presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Governor, and Council of Barbados.

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects of the Island of Barbados, the Governor, and Council, humbly beg Leave to felicitate your Majesty on Two the most joyful and important Events, that can affect the Hearts of a loyal and commercial People; The auspicious Birth of an Heir to your Imperial Crown, and the happy Re-establishment of a general Peace. One, the early Fruit of our most ardent Wishes for the Increase of your Majesty's domestick Felicity, and for a long Continuance of publick Prosperity, under the Protection of your Illustrious Line: The other, the late Object of your most serious Attention, and the proper Effect of your Majesty's Humanity and Benevolence to Mankind.

The several Nations of Europe, connected once more by the social Bands of Commerce, and flourishing in the Growth of peaceful Opulence, will join in celebrating the gracious Author of these Blessings, and in conveying them to Regions, which before had only heard of the Greatness of your Power, and the Glory of your Arms.

Amidst these Testimonies of Gratitude and universal Joy, your newly acquired Subjects will have Reason to rejoice at the Event which subdued them to your Majesty's Sway: While your ancient Subjects, already confirmed in their Allegiance, and still receiving fresh Proofs of Royal Beneficence, will consider the Extent of your Majesty's Happiness and Glory, as the Measure and Foundation of their own Felicity.

That your Majesty may long continue to be an Ornament to Regal Dignity, and a Blessing to your People; and that the Virtues of your Illustrious House may be perpetuated to Posterity, in the rising Hope now next to your Majesty's Throne, is the ardent Wish of,

Barbados, July 12, 1763.

Petersburgh, August 2. The Empress passed all Saturday and Sunday at Cronstadt. On Sunday she went on board the Pelegrine, an English Vessel in the Mediterranean Trade, commanded by Mr. Flynn, formerly a Lieutenant in His Majesty's Navy: She is a new Ship, and a very fine one of her Burthen. Her Imperial Majesty seemed greatly pleased, and staid half an Hour on Board, and accepted of some Refreshments. At her Departure she was saluted with 21 Guns, the Shrouds were manned, and the Sailors gave her Three Cheers, which she ordered her Boats Crew to stand up in the Boat and return.

Dresden, August 21. Count Bruhl has been in the utmost Danger these Three Days past, but this Morning he is better, the Fever being somewhat abated.

Hambourg, August 23. Count Schuembourg, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark to the King of Poland, set out from hence this Morning for Dresden.

The Princes of Mecklenbourg Strelitz are set out this Afternoon for Zell.

Spa, August 29. The Elector of Mentz is much better. Prince Clement of Saxony set out from Liege Yesterday Morning at Three o'Clock, in his Way to Munich.

The Process between that Prince and Count Outremont at Rome, is suspended till after the long Vacation; and it is not probable it will be soon finished, as the former seeks to gain Time.

Hague, August 30. Major General Lacy, who is appointed Envoy from the Court of Madrid to That of Stockholm, arrived here a few Days ago, and is going forward immediately to his Destination.

This Day Baron Dewitz, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Mecklenburgh Schewerin, and the Duke of Mecklenburgh Strelitz, had his First Private Audience of His Majesty; to deliver his Credentials.

To which he was introduced by the Right Hon. the Earl of Halifax, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, September 2, 1763.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, within these Twelve Months last past, there have been several Tumults and Riots in, and about, the Parish of Christ Church in the County of Middlesex; That, in particular, on Wednesday the 24th of August last, a great Number of Persons assembled about the House of one Joseph White, in Lamb Street in the said Parish, and, in a most outrageous and riotous Manner, broke all the Windows of the said House; and, about Three o'Clock in the Afternoon of the same Day, brought the Body of one Cornelius Saunders (who had been executed, that Day, at Tyburn, for Stealing out of the Dwelling-

Dwelling-House of the said White upwards of Fifty Pounds,) and laid it before the Door, and, in the Evening of the same Day, broke open the said House, and took out all the Forms, Tables, Benches and other Things which were in the lower Part of the said House, and made a Bonfire before the Door, and burnt a Quantity of Linnen; and, also, pulled down and destroyed the Wainscot, Flooring and Stairs of the said House; and, on the next Day, assembled again, and could not be dispersed till near Midnight: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said outrageous and dangerous Riot, and in the Taking out of the said Goods, and burning them in the Manner aforesaid, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them, who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Facts, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
