Lisbon, August 22.

SIR Harry Fränkland, the Consul General, and his Lady, sailed the 9th, in the Hanover Packet, for England.

Yesterday, being his Highness the Prince of Beira's Birth-day, who enters into the Third Year of his Age, the Foreign Ministers and the Nobility had the Honour to pay their Respects to their most Faithful Majesties. Her Royal Highness the Princess of Brazil, who is far advanced in her Pregnancy, appeared at Court that Day; as did all the Infantas, except the Infanta Dona Maria Dorothea; who still continues indisposed.

The Commandant and the Knights of Malta belonging to the St. John Man of War, which has been here about a Month, had their Audience of Leave Yesterday; and only wait till the Court can dispatch Don Henrique de Menezes, who is the Minister appointed for Turin, and who takes the Opportunity of Embarking on Board this Ship for Genoa.

We have Advice from Cadiz, that Four Men of War, and three Merchant Ships, arrived there the 30th of July from Vera Cruz; and bring about thirteen Millions of Dollars, and several other Effects, for the King and the Commerce.

The Count de Cunha, Viceroy of the Brazils, sailed from hence, on Friday the 19th Instant, for the Rio de Janeiro, on board the Madre de Dios & St. Joseph, Capt. Francisco Miguel Ayres.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, within these Twelve Months last past, there have been several Tumults and Riots in, and about, the Parish of Christ Church in the County of Middlesex; That, in particular, on Wednesday the 24th of August last, a great Number of Persons assembled about the House of one Joseph White, in Lamb Street in the said Parish, and, in a most outrageous and riotous Manner, broke all the Windows of the said House; and, about Three o'Clock in the Afternoon of the same Day, brought the Body of one Cornelius Saunders (who had been executed, that Day, at Tyburn, for Stealing out of the Dwelling-House of the said White upwards of Fifty Pounds,) and laid it before the Door, and, in the Evening of the same Day, broke open the said House, and took out all the Forms, Tables, Benches and other Things which were in the lower Part of the said House, and made a Bonfire before the Door, and burnt a Quantity of Linnen; and, also, pulled down and destroyed the Wainscot, Flooring and Stairs of the said House; and, on the next Day, assembled again, and could not be dispersed till near Midnight: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said outrageous and dangerous Riot, and in the Taking out of the said Goods, and burning them in the Manner aforesaid, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them, who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Facts.
