laft, be forced to give way to the great numbers of their Enemies, who appear on all fides of them. The Duke of Zell is preparing to enter inco Bremen, and to him the Bishop of Munster will give over the command of the Forces that act in that Duichy. The Magiltrates of this City are fitting out two Men of War, who are to Cruife off of the Mouth of the Elbe, to fecure our Merchant-men against the French Privateers, who we hear, have Commissions to take them. Our Letters from Danizick and Warfaw, speak of a fecond, and greater Victory obtained by the King of Poland over the Turks ; though at the fame time, the Letters that

come from Leopel, do somewhat lessen the thing, spire, Ottob. 15. The Imperial Army remains as yet near Landam, and the Head-quarter is at (f. nbach; where, it's faid, General Montecuculi expects the re-turn of Count Mansfeils from Viennit, whicher he was lately fent by his Excellency, to acquaint his Imparial Majefty with the necefficies of the Army. His Excellency is at prefent, very much troubled with the Gout.

Philipsburgh, Ottob. 17. The Imperial Army con-tinues in our Neighborhood, having its quarters at Offenbach, Landam, Weissemburg, Lauterburg, and other laces, in the mean titue, General Montecuculi fortiplaces, in the mean take, our distribution this Win-thes three or four Pofis to bridle this Garifon this Winter. Our parties bring in Prifoners daily, and very much disturb the Enemies Foragers ; it is faid, that the Imperial Army is much weakned, as well by deferters as

thole that have dyed, which are not a few. Cologne, Off. 18. The Imperialists demand of this Diocefs, and the Dutchy of Fulices, a monthly Contribution of 30000 Rixdollers, which the poor Inhabitants will hardly be able to raife, having been already ruined by the continual marches and quartering of Soldiers, during this War. We expect our next Letters from Spire will inform us, of the Imperial Armies having paffed the Rhine at Lauterburg, in order to their going into their Winter-quarters, which, it's faid, will be in Franconia, and that the Head-quarter will be kept at Francf.rt ; though those Magistrates endeavor to free their City from that trouble and vexation, and have offered a good fum of Money to obtain that exemption, The Duke of Holftein has still his quarters with the Lunenburg Troops that remain in the Diocefs at Wveringen.

Meiz, Oftob. 20. Some days fince arrived here the Dauphins Regiment of Dragoons, and feveral Troops , of Horfe commanded by the Marquis de Chageron, who are marched again, with the Infantry that was here, to Moyenvic, the place appointed for the Rendezvous of the Troops to be commanded by the Mareschal de Rothefort. who is at prefent posted with a small Body between Fauquement and Sarbruck, to have an eye upon the Duke of Lorrain, who hath lately appeared with 5 or 6000 Men towards Hamburgh, as if he defigned to befiege Sarbruche on the Saar ; but upon the approach of the Mareschal deRoche fort he is retired towards Meffenheim, beyond St. Vandel, on the River Glan, which paffes to Creatznac, where he expects, as is faid, the Imperial Troops from Mayence. Two days fince arrived at Moyenvic a commanded party of 1200 Men, from the Prince of Conde's Camp, for the reinforcement of the Mareschal de Rochefort.

Liege, Oflob. 20. The Countrey people who come in quarters which the Durch and Spaniards quitted fome days fince at Orp le Grand. The Durch Army was ad-wanced within three Leagues of this place, which alarm-ed the French in the Cittadel, but is fince marched to-wards Haffelt, and those quarters. Three days fince 14 Troops of Horfe, and 9 Companies of Dragoons

marched out of Maestricht, with orders, as was given out, to go and join the French Army, under the command of the Mareschal de Montmorency, who, it was faid, refolved to fall upon the Dutch in their retreat; but these Troops have been fince countermanded.

H lgue, Oftob. 22 The Burghers (who are ordered to receive Highes, $Ucos^{-2.2}$ The Burgners (who are ordered to receive his Highnels is Arms) that they may not be furprized with his coming, have appointed Watches, who are to give them notice, and upon the ringing of the Bell, and beat of Drum, they are all to repair immediately with their Arms to their Colours The 20 inflant, the Lunenburgh Miniflers cauled Bonefires again to be burnt, and entertained the Deputies of the States at supper at Prince Mawin's house. Peo-ple here seem not also gother fatisfied, that General Manutcacels bath one used to have been and the second s hath continued fo long without attempting any thing upon the Enemy, efpecially when it was faid he had fo great an advantage upon them.

We are told that the Men of War which are arrived at Thoulan from Meffina, will be ready to put to Sea again by the beginning of the next month, and that they will take with them great (tores of all forts of Provisions.
