Petersburg, September 2.

ON Wednesday Two Men of War of Sixty Guns were launched. Her Imperial Majesty, the whole Court, and all the Foreign Ministers, were present.

Venice, September 9. Letters of the 7th from Verona inform us, that the Austrian Troops, which to the Number of 7000 had entered the Venetian Territories, returned on Sunday Night with a General at their Head; that they have stop't all the Mills, and have placed Detachments all along the Taro; that the greatest Numbers, to the Amount of 4000 Men, were at the Island of Scala; and that 600 were advanced within five Miles of Verona: The Dispute concerned the Allowance of a sufficient Quantity of Water for the Rice Grounds.

Venice, September 16. The Difference subsisting between the Venetians and the Mantuans is at present quieted; and the Austrian Troops are marched off the Territory of the Republick, not having any Pretence to stay any longer, as the Water is taken off the Rice Grounds at this Season of the Year.

By a Ship arriv'd the Day before Yesterday we hear, that there has been a great Fire at Smyrna, which has destroyed a great Part of the Town, and that the European Merchants have suffered extremely.

Lisbon, September 12. The Baron de Haasten, Minister from the States General, had his First Audience of the most Faithful King and Queen, and the Royal Family, on Saturday.

Dresden, September 13. The Russian Regiments, which had entered Lithuania, began their Retreat from thence the 5th of this Month, in pursuance of Orders signified to them by Count Keyserling, Ambassador from the Empress of Russia at Warsaw.

Turin, September 17. The King of Sardinia, the Duke of Savoy, and the Duke of Chablais, left Turin on Monday last, in order to visit some Places on the Frontiers of Piedmont.

Dublin Castle, September 22, 1763.

His Excellency the Earl of Northumberland, Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom, arriv'd here early this Morning: His Excellency was received at Landing by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs of Dublin; the Foot Forces in Garrison, lined the Streets, and His Excellency (attended by a Squadron of Horse) proceeded amidst the Acclamations of the People, with the usual Ceremony, to the Castle, where, in Council, His Excellency took the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and received the Sword from their Excellencies the Lords Justices. After which the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired, and answer'd by Volleys from the Regiments on Duty, which were drawn out upon the College Green: And His Excellency repairing to the Presence Chamber, received there the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction upon his safe Arrival to take upon him the Government of this Kingdom.

PURSUANT to an Act of Parliament pass'd in the 20th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, that Information has been sent to this Office, That on Thursday the 22d of September, the Ship Blagdon, of London, John Gee, Master, which was bound from Newcastle to the West Indies, laden with Coal, Stones and other Merchandize, ran upon a Sand called the Scroby, on the Coast of Norfolk; that floating off that Sand upon her Broadside, she was towed on Shore on Yarmouth Beach, where, by a Northerly Wind on the 25th, she was broke all to Pieces, and the Goods entirely lost.

General Post-Office, October 1, 1763.

His Majesty's Post-master General, for the further Improvement of Correspondence, have been pleas'd to extend the Bye Night Mails, two additional Times a Week, from Newcastle to Edinburgh, and three additional Days a Week, from Carlisle to Annan and Dumfries; as likewise, to establish a Six Days Post, between Edinburgh and Aberdeen, Glasgow, Greenock, and the several intermediate Towns, the Whole to commence from the 10th Instant.

The additional Mails will be dispatch'd, from this Office, for Edinburgh, on Mondays and Fridays; the Monday's Mail will arrive at Edinburgh on Fridays, and the Friday's Mail on Mondays.

The additional Mails, from Edinburgh, will be dispatch'd for England, on Tuesday and Friday Evenings; the Tuesday's Mail will arrive at this Office on Saturdays, and the Friday's Mail on Tuesdays.

And whereas great Numbers of Letters have hitherto been privately collected and deliver'd, as well in this Kingdom as in Scotland, contrary to Law, and to the Prejudice of the Revenue of this Office, Notice is hereby given, that all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Wherry-men, Dispersers of Country News-papers, Higlers, and all other Persons whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal Collecting, Conveying, or Delivering of Letters and Packets, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity.

The Penalty is Five Pounds for every Letter collected or deliver'd contrary to Law; and One Hundred Pounds for every Week such Practice is continued.
