HIS Day being the Anniversary of the King's Accession to the Throne, there was a numerous and brilliant Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty on that Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park, and at the Tower, were fired; and in the Evening there were Bonsires, Illuminations, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy, throughout London and Westminster.

And the Count de la Marmora, Envoy Extraordinary from Sardinia, had Private Audiences of Her Majesty.
