

possessed themselves of the said Fort, and consequently became Masters of that Pass; the same day, the Lieutenant-General *Gortzen*, and the Lieutenant-Colonel *Grubkow*, being commanded out with two strong Parties, took the Pass at *Stolpis*, and that at *Faram*, which after some resistance the *Suedes* likewise quitted. Upon which, the King of *Denmark* likewise resolved to attack the 17 instant *Demgarien*, before which, he had layen with his Forces since the sixth instant, and accordingly all things were prepared for an assault; but the night before, the *Suedes* quitted it, fearing, it seems, lest the Bilector of *Brandenburgh*, who, they understood, had passed the *Peene*, should come upon them on the other side, and so they be inclosed between the two Armies; the *Suedes* left behind them four iron Guns, and a good quantity of all sorts of Provisions: and, it's said, that the Forts and Retrenchments which they had raised for the defence of this Pass, were so strong and situate a-midd of a Morass, that it would have been a very difficult thing to have forced them. The *Suedes* have likewise quitted the Passes at *Spankow* and *Tribsee*, so that the whole Countrey of *Pomeran* lies now open to the *Confederates*, who march with all their Forces against the *Suedes*, they having, as we understand, formed a Camp near *Stralsund*, and fortified it. Besides these successes, a party of *Brandenburgh* have taken the Islands of *Wollin* and *Usedom*, which lie in the River, *Oder* near *Stetin*, by which means that City is in a manner blocked up.

*Bremen*, Octob. 23. Since the taking of *Buckhoede*, the gros of the *Confederate* Army is marched to *Stade*, which they besiege; 1500 Men at present attack *Carelstat* on the *Weser*; and four Regiments are marched to attack *Bremersfurde*, so that the *Suedes* are beset on all sides: that the Duke of *Lunenburgh-Zell* is suddenly expected with 6000 fresh Men in this Countrey; five hundred of his Men are put into *Buckhoede*. This afternoon we receive advice, that the besieged in *Stade* make a good defence, but that the *Confederates*, by means of four Men of War, have taken the Fort, which the *Suedes* had on the *Swinge*, where it falls into the *Elbe*; it's said, that they were *Danish* Men of War, though others roll us, that they were four of those who had been before *Carelstat*.

*Brussels*, Octob. 25. Our Army continues quartered between *Leeuw* and *Diest*, though it's said that some *Dutch* Regiments are marched homeward. Our Governor General, the Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, remains with the Army, which will keep together in that quarter, where they now are, till the *French* are removed farther off; at present they are encamped at *Fleyers* Abbey, though, it's thought, the weather will quickly oblige them to look after Winter-quarters. We had two days since a report, as if some *French* Troops had been sent out to attack *Charlemon*, but it is not confirmed. It is said, that the *Lunenburgh* Troops, which are at present in the Diocess of *Cologne*, will continue there this Winter, that they may be readier at hand the next Spring to pass the *Meuse*, and act for the service of these Provinces.

*Hague*, Octob. 25. This afternoon his Highness the Prince of *Orange* is expected here, from his house at *Socstide*, and the 12 Companies of Burghers of this place have been in Arms since noon to receive him. From *Bremen* we have the confirmation of the taking of *Buckhoede*, by the *Confederates*, which was besieged the 15, and surrendered the 18; occasioned by the disagreement among the Burghers, as well as among the Soldiers, and especially the former, who refused to

contribute any thing towards the defence of the place. The *Confederates* are now before *Stade*, where is a Garrison of Three thousand five hundred Men, besides the Burghers.

*Amsterdam*, Octob. 29. It was sine a clock at night, on Friday last, before his Highness arrived here (his Highness being willing to avoid the Publick Reception intended him) however, the Burghers continued in Arms, and received his Highness in the manner usual on such occasions, omitting nothing that might express their Respect and Affection to his Highness; who being come to his Court, the Burghers drey up in the *Bysten-Hoff*, and made three Discharges, while his Highness was at supper; so that it was midnight ere they separated. The next morning, his Highness received the Compliments of the several Colledges by their Deputies, &c. and afterwards went into the Assembly of the *States General*; who having heard the account his Highness summarily gave them of his proceedings with the Army this Summer, returned him their hearty thanks. The Letters we receive from *Hamborgh*, inform us of the great Successes of the *Confederates* against the *Suedes* in *Pomeran*, they having made themselves Masters of the several Passes into *Pomeran* which were guarded by the *Suedes*, so that that whole Countrey lies now open to the *Confederates*. In the Duchy of *Bremen*, the *Confederates* at present besiege *Carelstadt*, *Bremersfurde* and *Stade*.

*Amsterdam*, Octob. 29. The Letters we just now receive, of the 25 instant, from *Hamborgh*, tell us, That the Besieged in *Stade*, had made a Sally upon the *Wassers* with good success, having done considerable execution upon them; but that in *Pomeran*, the *Suedes* had likewise quitted the Passes at *Loitz* and *Greiffenbagen*. The same Letters tell us, That they had advice from *Barr*, of the 21, which spoke of a Battel fought between the *Suedes* and the *Confederates* the day before, near *Stralsund*, and that the former were worsted; but the Letters from *Rostock*, which are two dayes fresher, not knowing any thing thereof, we cannot give any credit to it.

*Paris*, Octob. 30. The Letters from *Germany* do not bring any thing of moment, the *Armies* continuing in the same station; in the mean time we here expect the Prince of *Conde*, as likewise the *Marshel de Montmorency* will suddenly return hither. We have already told you, That the Assembly of the Parliament of *Britany* is removed from *Rennes*, because of the late Sedition there, to *Vannes*: and, it's said, that a farther mark of the Kings displeasure will be laid upon that City. From *Thouren* they write, That the Men of War that lately arrived there from *Messina*, are re-fitting with all possible diligence, and that even some fresh ships will be added to them, that they may be able to rencounter with the Spanish and *Dutch* Men of War, who will act in conjunction.

*Cadix*, Octob. 3. We have news here from *Tangier* of some loss that Garrison hath lately sustained by the *Moors*, six that the Governor the Earl of *Inchiquin*, having, as is said, upon the advice he received of several Head of *Cattel*, that were feeding without any Guard, within five Miles of the Town, sent out on the 19 past, a party of 500 Foot, with some Horse, under the command of Sir *Palmer Fairburn*; they being advanced three or four Miles, on the sudden found themselves encompassed by a great number of *Moors*, upon which, Sir *Palmer* thought fit to retreat with his Men, which they did with great bravery, and in excellent order, with the loss of 10 or 12 Men only (besides those that had the Forlorn Hope, most of which, it's said were cut off) notwithstanding the great numbers of the *Moors*, who attacked them on all sides, though to the loss of many of them, which were killed. But all this is reported without any certainty, so that we must expect the confirmation hereof, as well as the farther particulars.
