Lisbon, October 5.

I have the Satisfaction to acquaint your Lordship, that his Royal Highness the Duke of York arrived here, in perfect Health, on Monday the 3d Instant, in His Majesty's Ship the Centurion. His Royal Highness is pleased to make Use of his Title of Earl of Ulster, under which Name his Arrival has been notified to the Court. His Royal Highness proposes staying about eight Days, and will then proceed from hence to Gibraltar. In the mean While, their most Faithful Majesties, and their Ministers, do every Thing in their Power, to make his Royal Highness's Residence as agreeable to him as possible.

His serene Highness the new born Infant, was christened on Sunday last the 2d Instant at the Royal Chapel or the Palace of Ajuda, by the Names of John-Francis-Xavier-de-Paula-Domingos-Antonio-Carlos-Cypriano; his Catholick Majesty and the Queen Mother of Spain being Sponsors.

The Expedition Packet arrived here Saturday the 1st Instant.

The Duke of York Packet Boat arrived here Yesterday.

Agaz, October 25. The Succours for Berbices put to Sea on Thursday last with a fair Wind.

The Marquis de Havrincourt, late Ambassador from his most Christian Majesty to Sweden, being appointed to reside with the States General in the same Character, arrived here from Paris on Sunday last; and has this Day presented his Credentials.

By the last Accounts from the Mediterranean we hear, that the French Consul, and all the Merchants of that Nation, at Algiers, have been chained, and obliged to work as Slaves: And it is supposed, that the Ships, which were fitting out at Toulon, were intended to go against the Algerines. We learn too from Algiers, that His Britannick Majesty's Consul there, having been shot in the Arm by a drunken Soldier, he was the next Day hanged and quartered for that Crime.

The Princess Victoire, who was Niece to Prince Eugene of Savoy, and had resided many Years at the Court of Turin, died there the 12th Instant, in the 81st Year of her Age.

And whereas great Numbers of Letters have hitherto been privately collected and delivered, as well in this Kingdom as in Scotland, contrary to Law, and to the Prejudice of the Revenue of this Office, Notice is hereby given, that all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Wherry-men, Dispersers of Country News-papers, Higlers, and all other Persons whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal Collecting, Conveying, or Delivering of Letters and Packets, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity.

The Penalty is Five Pounds for every Letter collected or delivered contrary to Law; and One Hundred Pounds for every Week such Practice is continued.
