Dresden, October 16.

COUNT Bruhl having desired Leave to resign all his Employments of Trust, the Elector has been pleased to accept his Resignation, reserving to him however the Office and Title of First Privy Councillor.

Ratisbon, October 17. We hear from Vienna, that Prince Francis of Lichtenstein was to set out, in a short Time, for Madrid, in order to conclude a Marriage between the Arch-duke Leopold and an Infanta of Spain.

Dublin, October 25.

Last Sunday being the Anniversary of the Irish Rebellion in 1641, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant proceeded in the usual State to Christ Church, attended by the House of Peers, Judges, &c. and escorted by a Squadron of Horse; where a most excellent Sermon was preached, by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Dromore upon that Occasion: The Sword of State was carried to and from the Church by the Earl of Tyrone. After his Excellency's Return to the Castle, the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys of small Arms from the Regiments of Foot on Duty, drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks; and the Evening concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

St. James's, October 30.

This Day the Count de Seilern, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Emperor, and the Empress Queen, had a Private Audience of Her Majesty.

To which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Harcourt, Her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain; and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, on Tuesday, the Fourth Day of this Instant, between the Hours of One and Two o'Clock in the Morning, the House of Miss Hamersleys, upon the Park Hill, in New Windsor, was broke into by some Person or Persons unknown; that a Man came into the Room where the said Miss Hamersleys lay, and demanded their Money, and took from them their Pockets, in which their Money and Keys were; that their said Pockets were afterwards found in Windsor Little Park, with their Keys and other Things, but, that their Money, and a Shagreen Case of Instruments, were gone; and that the said Person or Persons had murdered Mary Holland, the Maid-Servant of the said House, in her Room, by tying a small Line, like a Jack-Line, twice round her Neck very tight, which choaked her: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robbery and Murder, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, as also a Reward of One Hundred Pounds Sterling, to any One of them (except the Person who actually committed the said Murder) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Facts, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward of One Hundred Pounds Sterling, to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, to the Person making such Discovery as aforesaid (except as above excepted) upon the Conviction of any One or more of the Criminals.

Pox; the other, rather a short Man, dressed in a Sailor's Jacket, with a great Number of small Buttons, a Hat upon his Head, and a checked Shirt on.

General Post-Office, October 1, 1763.

His Majesty's Postmaster General, for the further Improvement of Correspondence, have been pleased to extend the Bye Night Mail, two additional Times a Week, from Newcastle to Edinburgh, and three additional Days a Week, from Carlisle to Annan and Dumfries; as likewise, to establish a Six Days Post, between Edinburgh and Aberdeen, Glasgow, Greenock, and the several intermediate Towns, the Whole to commence from the 10th Instant.

The additional Mails will be dispatched, from this Office, for Edinburgh, on Mondays and Fridays; the Monday's Mail will arrive at Edinburgh on Fridays, and the Friday's Mail on Mondays.

The additional Mail, from Edinburgh, will be dispatched for England, on Tuesday and Friday Evenings; the Tuesday's Mail will arrive at this Office on Saturdays, and the Friday's Mail on Tuesdays.

And whereas great Numbers of Letters have hitherto been privately collected and delivered, as well in this Kingdom as in Scotland, contrary to Law, and to the Prejudice of the Revenue of this Office, Notice is hereby given, that all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Wherry-men, Dispensers of Country Newspapers, Higlers, and all other Persons whatsoever, hereafter found guilty of the illegal Collecting, Conveying, or Delivering of Letters and Packets, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity.

The Penalty is Five Pounds for every Letter collected or delivered contrary to Law; and One Hundred Pounds for every Week such Practice is continued.
