Westminster, November 15.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Septimus Robinson, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE Re-establishment of the Publick Tranquility, upon Terms of Honor and Advantage to My Kingdoms, was the first great Object of My Reign: That salutary Measure has received the Approbation of My Parliament, and has since been happily completed, and carried into Execution, by the Definitive Treaty. It has been, and shall be My Endeavour to ensure the Continuance of the Peace, by a faithful and steady Adherence to the Conditions upon which it was concluded: And I have the Satisfaction to acquaint you, that the several Powers of Europe, who were engaged against Us in the late War, have given Me the strongest Assurances of the same good Disposition. Our Principal Care ought now to be employed to improve the valuable Acquisitions, which We have made, and to cultivate the Arts of Peace in such a Manner, as may most effectually contribute to extend the Commerce, and to augment the Happiness of My Kingdoms.

For these great Purposes I have called you together. It will ever be My earnest Will and Endeavour to demonstrate to My People, by My Actions, the Love which I bear them; and I doubt not of receiving from them the grateful and just Returns of Duty and Affection.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I will order the proper Estimates for the Service of the Year to be laid before you. The heavy Debts contracted in the Course of the late War, for many of which no Provision is yet made, call for your utmost Attention and the strictest Frugality. I must however earnestly recommend to you the Support of My Fleet, to which Our past Successes have been so much owing, and upon which the future Welfare and Importance of Great Britain do most essentially depend. To ease My People of some Part of their Burthens, I have directed, as I promised at the End of the last Session of Parliament, that the Money arising from the Sale of the Prizes veiled in the Crown, should be applied to the Publick Service. It is My Intention to reserve, for the same Use, whatever Sums shall be produced by the Sale of any of the Lands belonging to Me in the Islands of the West Indies, which were ceded to Us by the late Treaty.

The Improvement of the Publick Revenue, by such Regulations as shall be judged most expedient for that Purpose, deserves your serious Consideration.

This will be the surest Means of reducing the National Debt, and of relieving My Subjects from those Burthens, which the Expences of the late War have brought upon them; and will, at the same Time, establish the Publick Credit upon the most solid Foundation.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

As the Interests and Prosperity of My People are the sole Objects of My Care, I have only to desire, that you will pursue such Measures, as are conducive to those Ends, with Dispatch and Unanimity. Domestic Union will be essentially necessary to remedy those Evils which are the Consequences of War, to enable us to reap the most permanent Advantages from the Conclusion of the Peace, and to discourage that licentious Spirit, which is repugnant to the true Principles of Liberty, and of this happy Constitution. In this Opinion I trust that My Subjects will be confirmed by your Example; and that they will be taught by your Proceedings, to unite their utmost Endeavours to support such Measures, as may equally tend to the Honor and Dignity of My Crown, and to their own Security and Happiness.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this Day read at the Board, the humble Petition of several Merchants, whose Names were thereunto subscribed, in Behalf of themselves and others His Majesty's Subjects trading to and from the Kingdom of Spain; setting forth, That by the Restoration of the Peace, British Ships are no longer liable to be stop'd or visited by Cruisers, and to other Accidents on those Seas, which exposed them to Infection in Time of War; That there is very seldom any Communication or Interchange of Trade between those Ports in the Levant, Barbary, and other Places where the Plague usually breaks out, and the Ports of Spain; and when any Ship or Vessel, that has touched at any other Port or Ports in the Streights (even suspected of having Communication with infected Places) arrives at a Spanish Port, she is always subjected to perform a regular Quarantine before she is admitted into Port; That the Dutch, Hamburgers, Danes, Swedes, and other Nations, do not subject their Trade from those Ports to Quarantine, or to any Delay upon that Account, nor did they do it even during the last War; That the Continuance of the Quarantine will be attended with a great Deal of Vexation to the Petitioners, Difficulties and Delays in their Trade, as well as Expence, and consequently very injurious to that Part of the British Commerce and Navigation, particularly in regard to perishable Goods: And as the Cause for establishing the said Quarantine is intirely removed, the Petitioners humbly pray, that the Quarantine may be taken off

off all Ships coming from Spain, upon producing clean Bills of Health—His Majesty, having taken the said Petition into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Obstructions upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with the Health and Safety of His Subjects, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to Order, as it is hereby Ordered, That the Quarantine at present subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, be taken off so far as respects Ships and Vessels coming directly from any of the Ports of the Kingdom of Spain, Minorca, or Gibraltar; and that such Ships and Vessels be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings without Opening, Unpacking and Airing, and without performing any Quarantine; provided that they bring with them clean Bills of Health, and that the Master, or other Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, do first make Oath before the Custom-house Officer, or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that they did not touch at any infected Place, nor had Communication with any infected Ship during the Voyage, and are free from all Infection.—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being, of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Warsaw, October 19. General Count Romatowski, in the Austrian Service, is arrived here from Vienna. The Empress of Russia has given the Order of St. Andrew to Count Oginski, Son-in-law to the Prince Chancellor Czartoriski.

Copenhagen, October 29. Count Ahlefeldt, lately Secretary at War, has been advanced to the Rank of General of the Cavalry, and made Governor of this City. The Regiment of Zealand, regular Infantry, is given to his Serene Highness Prince Frederick of Hesse Cassel; the former Commander, Prince Amelius of Sunderburg, having obtained the Appointment of Lieutenant General.

Dresden, October 30. Count Bruhl died on Friday Evening. Every Thing in his House was immediately sealed up, and a strong Guard put about it for the Security of his Effects. Mess. Heinecke and Gartemberg, in whom he placed his chief Confidence, are put under Arrest. The Lord Viscount Stormont, Ambassador from His Britannick Majesty to the Imperial Court, sets out To-morrow for Vienna.

Copenhagen, November 5. Count Dietrichstein, the Imperial Minister, has taken his Leave of this Court in Form, and is set out on his Return to Vienna. It is said, he is to be succeeded here by Count Wurmbbrandt.

Hamburg, November 4. The Mortality, which has long raged among the Horned Cattle in Jutland, still continues; and it is much apprehended it may spread here, several Cattle from that Country having been seized in the Streets of this City with that Distemper, as they were passing along, and one or two having dropt down dead.

Berlin, November 5. Achmet Effendi, the Turkish Intendant, arrived at Weissensee on Wednesday last, with a Retinue of upwards of 70 Persons; and it is said, he will make his Entry into this Capital on the 9th Instant.

The Queen of Prussia, who has been very ill of a Fever, is so far recovered, that her Physicians have declared her Majesty to be out of all Danger.

Mentz, November 4. The Elector has nominated Baron Erthal, Canon of the Cathedral, President of the Aulick Council and of the Regency, his First Ambassador at the Congress of Augsboung, for electing a King of the Romans; and Baron Groschlag the Second.

His Electoral Highness is to be consecrated the 13th, with as little Ceremony as possible.

Treves, November 5. It is thought either M. Boofs, Great Dean of the Chapele, or Baron Beidbach, formerly Great Chancellor of Liege, Brother to the Elector of Mentz, and Canon of Treves, will be appointed our Elector's First Ambassador at the Congress of Augsboung; together with M. Munich our Chancellor, and Baron Trok.

Bonn, November 6. It is said his Electoral Highness has nominated Count Hohenzollern, Grand Maire, his First Ambassador to the Congress of Augsboung; Baron Gymnich, President of the Aulick Council, the Second; and Baron Sierstorff the Third.

Hague, November 8. To-morrow the French Ambassador is to make his Visit of Ceremony to the Prince of Orange, which will be returned by his Serene Highness the following Day. The Succour for the Berbices are got out of the Texel, and, it is hoped, will be able to get down the Channel.

The King has been pleased to order Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the Kingdom of Ireland, containing a Grant to Arthur Brooke of Colebrooke in the County of Fermanagh, Esq; and his Heirs Male, of the Dignity of a Baronet of the said Kingdom.

Whereas the Post-Boy carrying the Mail of Letters from Maidstone to Rochester, between the Hours of Nine and Ten o'Clock on Friday Night last, was attacked near the Hospital, within a Quarter of a Mile of Rochester, by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Gun or Pistol, loaded with large Shot, which wounded the Post-Boy very dangerously in his Body, Face and Arms:

kept the Person who actually fired the Gun or Pistol shall make Discovery, whereby one or more of the Persons may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverers or Discoverers will, upon the Conviction of any one of the Parties, be intitled to the same Reward of Fifty Pounds, and will also have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
