*Algiers, October 17.*

**O**N the 5th Instant in the Morning, the Treasurer and Prime Minister at this Court, who was destined to succeed the present Dey, was arrested in his Presence, and instantly strangled. The Crime publickly imputed to him, was that of using Magick against the King. Since this Execution, according to the Severity usually exercised in these Cases here, all his Relations and Friends have been privately put to Death.

Last Sunday about Noon, three Shocks of an Earthquake were felt here, which however did no Damage.

The French Consul continues still in Chains, but has been removed from the Common Prison to his own House.

*Cologne, November 10.* This Cathedral having lost their Grand Prevost, by the Death of the Archbishop of Prague, proceeded this Day to the Election of a Successor, when Count Hohenzollern, Grand Maître to the Elector of Cologne, was unanimously chosen.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That in the Nights of the 7th, 8th, and 9th Instant, some Villains attempted to break into the House of Lady Clifton, of Clifton Hall near Nottingham, and one of these Nights were drove off, and pursued by George Bentley, one of her Servants, and very nearly escaped being taken; but the next Night, as the said George Bentley was returning from Nottingham, he was attacked and pulled off his Horse by a Villain; but proving too strong, he cried out upon which a Second came up, saying hold him fast till I come, and we'll stop him from running after us again at Clifton Hall; but the young Man got clear of them both. That on Monday Night after, the following anonymous threatening Letter was laid at the Kitchen Door. (which seems to have been wrote by some one of the Villains,) directed, "For young leer nout"

"Yonger Feernought prepare thy Sen for to go in the Devle thou Son of a Bich thou kild that Man ith Woke and Dam thy Soul Deth is thy

"Portion by Nite or Day if ever whe leet of thee and that Bich oud Clifton if She does not lay, Hunderd Pound under the Hors Steps whel Beag in to her House and send her to the Devle whe shall not trist won by his sen to meet thee agane thou Son of a Bich."

In order for bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above Offences, His Majesty is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said anonymous threatening Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas notwithstanding the Order of Court made the 29th Day of December, 1744, Complaint is made to this Court, by the Merchants trading to Virginia and Maryland, of the Behaviour of the Pilots of this Fellowship, in not taking Charge of Ships without a previous Agreement to leave them at Gravesend, or, in case of no such Agreement being made, absolutely refusing to carry them any further, thereby obliging the Matter to be at the additional Expence of hiring River Pilots, and very often going up to London for such to conduct them to their Moorings, to the manifest Danger and Delay of the Ships and Cargoes, and contrary to the Meaning of the Act of Parliament for regulating the Pilots of this Society; It is therefore ordered by this Court, That if any Pilots of this Society shall, for the future, be guilty of any of the Practices above complained of, or mentioned in the aforesaid Order, such Pilot shall, ipso Facto, stand suspended during the Pleasure of the Lieutenant of Dover Castle, or his Deputy.
