 "to the Devle thou Son of a Rich thee kild that
 "Man ith Woke and Dam thy Sou! Deah is thy
 "Po.tion by Nite or Day if ever whe lost of thee
 "and that Rich oud Clifton if she does not lay
 "Hunderd Pound under the Hens Steps whel Eeats
 "in to her Houre and send her to the Devle who
 "shall not trist won by his sen to most thee agane
 "thou Son of a Bich."*

In order for bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above Offences, His Majesty is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said anonymous threatening Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
