The Prince of Conde receives daily recruits from Lorraine, Burgundy, and Suifferland, and there be those that endeavor to perswade us, that his Highness intends to conclude the Campagne with some confiderable action, which the Gordan's feem to apprehend, and therefore will not pass the Rhine to go into Winter-quarters, will they lee haw the Prince of Carde disposes of his Forees - Corealn in he that great provision is making he Brifae, feveral stores having been brought thicker from Saverno and Haguendw. we formerly told you of the Suiffers having given leave to the French to raise six thousand Men in their Territories, provided they be not employed against the Empire, is confirmed by the Letters we received by the last Ordinary from chose parts. Here hath been a report, that the Prince of Conde would pass the Rhine at Brifac and fo go and join the Fortes of the Elector of Bavaria; but it meers with little exedity no body being able to doubt, but that his Electoral Highness will continue firm in his Neueralieye (1944)

Lipfade, Oftob. 22. Yesterday the Lunewburg Troops, which came from the Diocel's of Cologne, under the command of Monsieur Chauver Lieutenant-General, passed the River here, and have at present their quarters in the Diocel's of Paderborne, but we understand that they have received orders to march through the Bish-cprick of Osnabrag, towards Bremen, where the Duke of Zerl will command them, as well as the Munsters and the other Cansteller Troops, as General stimp, being particularly thereunto appointed by the Emperor and

the Empire.

Francfort, Octob. 23. We have nothing new to write from hence, concerning the Armies, who continue in their old quarters. From Rutisboune they write, the the Deputies of the States of Suabia, continue to make very earnest instances at the Dyet to be excused from granting Winter-quarters to the Imperial Troops, they having suffered so much the last Winter in this particular, but hisherto we hear not of any success they are like to have in their fuit. Our Magistrates are likewife en leavouring to prevent the Generals of the Imperial Army having their head quarter here as they feem to The Garison of Philipsburgh is not yet so blocked up, but that the French continue to make frequent excursions, and very much to incommode the Im-The reports we had here of the Duke of Lorrains design upon Sarbruck, was, it seems, without any ground, his Highness is at present with his Troops in and about Meiffenheim, and the Mareschal de Rothe fort is come with 2000 Men to Sarbrucke, to fecure those parts.

Liege, 0610b. 15. The Cavalry which passed by here the 20 instant, coming from Maestricht, are since returned thicker again, having convoyed some of the Rings Musqueteers to the Mareschal Montmorency's Army, which we hear, marches back towards Charleroy. The Dutch and Spanish Troops have their quarters still between Halfett, Diest, and St. Tron, where, it's thought, they will continue till the French Army is separated. From Cologne they write, that the Imperialists press with much carnessness their demand of a monthly contribution of Thirty thousand Rixdollers, a sum which that Diocessness hardly able to raise, considering how

the Inhabitants are impoverished since the War. The overtures that were made for the French quitting the places they at present hold in this Countrey, and their

granting it a Neutrality, are now laid aside.

Hamburgh, Octob. 25. Since the news we had of the Confederates having possessed themselves of Dem ; garten, Loitz, &c. the Passes into Pomeron, and that the Suedes had formed a Camp near Strae/font; certain Merchants here, have received Letters from Barr, which fay, that the Confederates having marched with their Forces directly towards the Suedes, the 20 instant they engaged in a Battel with them, in which, the Suedes are faid to have been rotally routed, and to have loft soon Men upon whe place. But the Letters from Roffeet of the 22 instantiand from other places; of a very fresh date, not making mention of any thing, farther than the taking the places; we gave you anaccount of in our last, this news of a Battelia lockt upon as a report, that has no ground: In which out next! advices from those parts will farther clear us. "The. Confederates before Stade find more employment chant: they have done before those places they have alteady; gained The Mareschal de Horne, Governor of the Dutchy for the Suedes, and several other eminent Officers being in the place, with a good Garifon; forthat in all probability, the Confederates will meet with work enough, effectally confidering the featon. It is reported here; that the Suedes have quitted Wolgast, and that General Wrangel has desired of the Elector of Brandenburgh, a safeguard for his Castle called Wrangelfburgh.

Bruffels, offob. 25. On Tuefday lafty the States of Brabant affembled for the first time. The Duke de Villa Hermoja remains with the Army, and as yet we know not certainly when he will return hither; the French keeping our Army longer in the Field than was intended at the Prince of Orange's leaving it. Yesterday came hither several Countrey people, who had been at Charlerof to pay their Contributions; they say, that the French Army was still in the Field, but that a great many sick Soldiers had been brought from

it to Charleroy.

Hague; Octob. 29. All the foveraign Colledges, and many of the principal Burghers, in compliment to his Highness, have put themselves into mourning, for the Princess Dowager, who will be enterred at the publick charge, with great pomp and folemnity, for which, preparation is accordingly making. It is faid, that his Highness has sent orders to the Count de Walder, to put his Troops into Winter-quarters, but without any certainty; though, it feem probable, that the Army will continue together fo long as they have any reason to fear any attempt from the French, who fill keep the Field. Two days since, the Sieur Klingenberg, Extraordinary Ambassador from the King of Denmark, was with his Highness to acquaint him with the taking of Demgarten, by the Forces of the King his Master, and the other successes of the Consederates in Pomeren; the like hath been done by the Heer Romfwinckel the Brandenburg Minister. There be Letters from the Sieur Binches, who commands the Durch ships of War ia the Baltick, he onely fays, that they continued to cruife upon the Coasts of Pomeren. Advertisement.
