This Day his Excellency the Prince de Mafferano, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of Spain, had his first Private Audience of His Majesty to deliver his Credentials.

To which he was introduced by the Right Hon. the Earl of Halifax, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, November 30.

This Day his Excellency the Prince de Mafferano, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of Spain, had his first private Audience of Her Majesty.

To which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Harcourt, Lord Chamberlain to Her Majesty; and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, December 3, 1763.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, between Eight o'Clock on Sunday Night, and Monday Morning last, a large Elm Tree, growing in the Grove, in the Green Park, near the Wall, Piccadilly, was maliciously cut down, by some Person or Persons unknown; in order for bringing such Person or Persons to Justice, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein. so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
