Naples, November 8.

ON Thursday his Sicilian Majesty came to Naples, to celebrate the next Day the Feast of St. Charles. This being the Name-Day of the King of Spain, was kept as a great Holiday at Court; and, in the Evening, his Sicilian Majesty assisted at the Representation of a new Opera. The following Day his said Majesty returned to Portici, when a Mourning of Six Months was immediately declared at Court for the Death of the late King of Poland.

The Two Neapolitan Frigates of War are to sail, in a few Days, on a Four Months Cruize.

Genoa, November 12. This Republick having received Notice that the Corsican Malecontents had marched a Body of their Men to a small Distance from San Fiorenzo, and that a Half Galley and a Galliot kept cruising near the Entrance of the Harbour, insomuch that the Town is in a Manner blockaded by Sea and Land; the Republick has ordered a large Bark and a Galliot to be fitted out with all possible Expedition, and they are to sail in Two or Three Days, to drive the Corsican Cruizers from their Station, and to open the Communication by Sea with the Town above-mentioned.

Early this Morning arrived His Britannick Majesty's Ship the *Valeur*, in Fourteen Days from Lisbon, and brought Orders to the English Consul from Commodore Harrison, to prepare a House for him proper for the Reception of his Royal Highness the Duke of York, who is shortly expected.

Turin, November 19. Some French Merchant Ships are arrived at Marseilles, being released from Algiers; by which it is understood, that the Differences between the French and the Algerines are accommodated.

St. James's, December 6.

The Most Christian King having upon His Ambassador Count de Guerchy's Arrival here, sent to the Chevalier d'Eon de Beaumont, who had the Character of Minister Plenipotentiary at this Court, His Revocation from hence, with a Letter addressed to His Britannick Majesty; and having been informed, that M. d'Eon persisted in refusing to pay Obedience to His Orders, and to present the King His Master's Letter; His said most Christian Majesty thereupon wrote a Second Letter to the King, and commanded His Ambassador to present the same immediately; which having been accordingly done, His Majesty has been pleased to declare, That the said M. d'Eon has no longer any Character here, and has forbid him the Court.
