**T**HE Court removes from hence to Madrid on the 26th of this Month. The Infanta's Marriage is to be celebrated after Christmas; and the three Ambassadors of Vienna, France, and Naples, are preparing to give great Festivals on the Occasion.

Venice, November 25. On Sunday last Count Woronzow, Great Chancellor of Russia, arrived here with his Lady and Family, and a large Retinue; and To-morrow his Excellency proceeds on his Journey for Florence.

Signor Lodovico Manin was elected this Day, by the Great Council, Procuratore of St. Mark's, in the room of Procuratore Andrea Contarini, lately deceased; and his Palace was immediately opened to keep the publick Festivals for three Days, as usual upon that Occasion.

Vienna, November 26. The Archduchess Joseph died this Afternoon. The Emperor, Empress, Archduke, and all the Imperial Family, are in the utmost Affliction.

Mentz, December 2. On the Representations that have been made by several Electors, of the great Expence and Inconveniency of holding the Congress at Augsbourgh, it has been resolved to transfer it to Frankfort; and the Elector has issued out Letters for convoking it at that Place the 7th of January 1764. in order to consider of the Election of a King of the Romans.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Colonel Edward Harvey, to be Adjutant-General.

Dublin, December 1, 1763.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Birth of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales, in the Morning the Flag was hoisted on Birmingham Tower; at Noon there was a numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction at the Castle, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant on the Occasion. The Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. In the Evening there was a Play given by his Excellency for the Entertainment of the Ladies, and a Ball at the Castle: And the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy throughout the City.
