Warsaw, November 19.

COUNT Oginski is set out for Petersburg, to thank the Empress for the Blue Ribbon which he has lately received from her Imperial Majesty.

Count Mercy is named Ambassador from the Court of Vienna to this Republick; and his Excellency is expected here in a short Time from Russia.

Milneria, November 28. The Duke of York arrived here the 11th Instant in perfect Health, and continued so the whole Time he honoured this Island with his Presence. When he sailed from hence on the 17th, the Wind was moderate, and the Weather fair; but since it has been stormy, as is usual in these Parts at this Season of the Year: It has however been more moderate, and quite fair for these 12 Hours, which makes us hope, that his Royal Highness may have made either Leghorn or Genoa, whither he proposed going. His Royal Highness had with him, when he left this Island, besides the Centurion, only the Thames and Lively Frigates, but expected to be joined immediately by the Montreal and Flamborough.

Genoa, November 29. The Duke of York, who arrived here last Night, has been pleased to take the Title of Earl of Ulster, and his Arrival was notified, under that Name, to the Master of the Ceremonies, who went on Board to offer the Palace prepared by the Republick for his Reception, which his Royal Highness was pleased to refuse, as also all other public Honors, except a Deputation of Six Noblemen, who are to wait upon him this Morning with Compliments upon his Arrival at Genoa. His Royal Highness designs to stay here about Three Weeks, during which Time his Residence will be made as agreeable to him as possible by the Genoese Nobility.

Copenhagen, November 29. Last Friday their Danish Majesties returned from Friedensbourg, and all the Royal Family are now settled in Town, where the Anniversary of the Queen Mother's Birth-Day was celebrated Yesterday, with the usual Demonstrations of Joy: The Evening concluded with an elegant Supper, and a Ball at Court. The Hereditary Prince of Hesse Cassel arrived here a few Days ago.

Copenhagen, December 3. We hear from Stockholm, that on the 21st inst, being the Anniversary of the Order of St. Olaf, the King gave the Blue Ribbon to three Senators, Baron Rudenichold, Count Torulff, and M. Huerna. At the same Time Major General Stackelberg, and M. Scheffer the Swedish Ambassador in France, were declared Commanders of the Order of the Sword, and M. Vult van Steyeren, and Count Bielke, of the Order of the North Star.

The Contagious Distemper, which lately broke out here among the Horses, is no longer so fatal as it was at first: Most of those infected now recover by the Use of proper Remedies, and there is great Reason to hope the Malady will cease entirely in a short Time.

Berlin, December 3. Achmet Effendi, the Turkish Internonce, having desired to see some of the King of Prussia's Houses, set out from hence last Monday Morning with a small Part of his Retinue, for Potsdam, and in his Way he saw the Palace of Charlottenbourg, where he was regaled with Coffee, &c.

This Day his Excellency the Count de Seilern, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Emperor and Empress Queen, had a Private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.

And afterwards of her Royal Highness Princess Augusta.

To both which he was introduced by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.
