THE following joint Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses of Ireland, in Parliament assembled, has been presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses, in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons of Ireland, in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to renew our unfeigned Professions of the most zealous and affectionate Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person and Government, which we have been, upon all Occasions, forward to express, and, we trust, have manifested by our Conduct.

We now think ourselves, in a very particular Manner, called upon, to make the most Solemn and Publick Declarations of our inviolable Duty and Attachment to your Majesty, when the most infamous and flagitious Libels have been published and circulated through your Kingdoms; filled with the grossest Insults to your Majesty's Sacred Person and Royal Authority; violating every Rule of Decency, Order and Government; and tending to stir up, through all Ranks of your Majesty's Subjects, a Spirit of Discontent, and of Disobedience to their Prince, the Laws, and the Constitution.

As these audacious and outrageous Attempts have been deemed fitting Objects for the just and exemplary Censure of the Legislature of Great Britain; we think it cannot be unseasonable, and we hope it will not be unacceptable to your Majesty, that we also express our utter Detestation and Abhorrence of such Insolent and Wicked Practices.

And we beg Leave, at the same Time, humbly to assure your Majesty, that these Sentiments proceed, not only from those Principles of Duty, by which we are bound as Subjects, but from the most cordial Affection and Reverence for those Respectable and Amiable Virtues, which are the Objects of the Love and Admiration of all your People.

We therefore intreat your Majesty graciously to receive these Declarations from us; That we are fully sensible of the many and great Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's mild and auspicious Reign; that we are truly thankful to your Majesty for the Honourable and Advantageous Peace, which your Majesty, through your Great Wisdom, and Paternal Concern for your Subjects, hath happily concluded for the Benefit of your Kingdoms; that it is our Firm and Unalterable Resolution to support the Dig-

nity and Authority of your Majesty's Government, wherefover our Influence can extend, against all, who shall presume to disturb it; and that it is our most sincere and ardent Wish, that your Majesty may reign through a long Course of Years, blessed with the Increase of every publick and domestick Felicity, and supported by the unanimous Voice of all your Subjects.

To us, who, by our Situation, must be deprived of your Majesty's immediate Influence, it is of the utmost Consequence, that your Majesty's Royal Power should be delegated to Persons sensible of the Importance of that high Trust, and by their Capacity, Probity, and Moderation, fitted for the Execution of it. And we cannot omit this Occasion of assuring your Majesty, that the Rights and Dignity of the Crown can never be more faithfully maintained, nor more honourably supported, nor the Administration of your Majesty's Government carried on upon Principles more agreeable to the Constitution, nor in a Manner more intirely acceptable and satisfactory to the People, than by the Earl of Northumberland.

Madrid, December 7. His Excellency the Earl of Rochford arrived here Yesterday.

Hague, December 23. We hear from Paris, that M. de la Vardy, a Counsellor in the Parliament of Paris, is appointed Comptroller of the Finances, in the room of M. Bertin.

We are every Day expecting the Arrival here of the Hereditary Prince of Brunwick, as the Accounts from thence mention, that his Serene Highness was to set out from thence the Beginning of this Week.

Hague, December 27. The Elector of Saxony died the 17th Instant at Dresden, of the Small-Pox. The Electress immediately took the Regency upon herself, associating Prince Xavier of Saxony in the Direction with her. The Augusta Yacht, with the Happy Sloop of War, are arrived at Helvoetsluys, to wait for the Hereditary Prince of Brunwick, who is expected here this Evening, or at latest Tomorrow Morning. The Quantity of Wet, that has fallen, has rendered the Roads as bad as possible, and makes it very difficult to get Equipages along.

Hambourg, December 23. The Elector of Saxony died very suddenly and unexpectedly, on Saturday the 17th Instant, at Two o'Clock in the Morning, of the Small-Pox, which came out only a few Hours before he expired. The Guards took the Oaths on the same Day to the present Elector, who enters only upon his Fourteenth Year this Day. Count Bothmar left this Place Yesterday Morning, in his Way to England.

Copenhagen, December 20. Prince Charles of Hesse Cassel, being recovered of the Indisposition that detained him at Hanau, returned hither some Days ago, and is now in a perfect State of Health. M. d'Ahlefeldt, who was lately his Danish Majesty's Envoy at the Court of Berlin, is likewise arrived here. On the 16th Instant, a Marriage was celebrated at Court, between the General Adjutant Colonel Numfen, and Madamoisella d'Osten, one of the Maids of Honour to the Reigning Queen.

And on Sunday the 8th of January, the Court to go out of Mourning.

Whereas by the 8th and 19th Articles of the Definitive Treaty of Paris, the Ratifications whereof were exchanged the 10th Day of March last, Eighteen Months from the Day of the said Exchange are allowed to such of His Majesty's Subjects, who shall have settled in the Islands of Guadeloupe, of Marie Galante, of Desfrade, of Martinico, and of Bellisle, or in the other Places restored to France by the said Treaty, or who shall have any Commercial Affairs to settle there, to sell their Lands, and Estates, to settle their Affairs, to recover their Debts, and to bring away their Effects, as well as their Persons;—And whereas, in order to their availing themselves, in the most secure, and effectual Manner, of the Liberty so stipulated, in Behalf of His Majesty's Subjects, it is also provided by the said Article, that they shall be permitted to send Vessels to the said Islands, and other Places restored as above; which Vessels are to serve to no other Use than That of bringing away their said Persons, and Effects;—To go in Ballast;—Their whole Number, and the Tonnage of each, to be limited;—To set Sail within a fixed Term;—To make one Voyage only;—And all the Effects belonging to the English to be embarked at the same Time—And it being further agreed, that his Most Christian Majesty shall cause the necessary Passports to be given to the said Vessels, &c.—Which Liberty of bringing away their Effects, as well as their Persons, on Board of Ships of their own Nation, is likewise stipulated, under the same Conditions, in Behalf of such of His Majesty's Subjects, as shall have settled in the Island of Cuba, or have any Commercial Affairs to settle there.

And whereas some separate Applications have been already made to His Majesty's Secretary of State, for obtaining Passports according to the said above recited Articles from the Crowns of France, and Spain, in order to the procuring of which it may be necessary, that the whole Number of Ships intended to be sent, the Name and Tonnage of each, and the Term within which they will set Sail, should be at once declared; It is therefore hereby proposed and desired, that all Merchants, or others, concerned in the Execution of the Stipulations contained in the above-recited Articles, do deliver into the Office of the Earl of Halifax, His Majesty's Principal Secre-

tary of State, with all convenient Speed, a Designation in Writing, signed with their Names, of the Ships proposed to be sent by all, and every of them, either jointly or separately, with the Name and Tonnage of each, and the Time within which they are intended to sail to any of the French Islands, or Places, (specifying to which) or to the Isle of Cuba, respectively: Upon the Receipt of which Designations, His Majesty's said Secretary of State may be enabled to make Application, in the King's Name, to the Courts of France and Spain, for the Delivery of the respective Passports agreed by Treaty to be given to the said Vessels, as is above set forth.
