*Whitehall, January 14.*

**H**IS most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick Lunenburg, having sailed from Helvoetsluys, on Board His Majesty's Yacht the Princess Augusta, on Tuesday last the 10th Instant, landed at Harwich the 12th in the Morning, and arrived last Night at Somerset House.

*St. James's, January 14.*

This Day His most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick Lunenburg waited on their Majesties and the Rest of the Royal Family.

*Lord Chamberlain's Office, January 14.*

The Marriage of her Royal Highness the Princess Augusta, with his most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick Lunenburg, is appointed to be Solemnized at St. James's on Monday next the 16th Instant, at Seven o'Clock in the Evening; at which Time none but Peers and Peereses, Peers Eldest Sons and Peers Daughters, Privy Counsellors and their Wives, and Foreign Ministers, are to be admitted.

*Petersburgh, December 13.* The Imperial Ambassador is to have his Audience of Leave on Monday next.

Count Lubinski, from the Republick of Poland, is expected here very soon.

*Genoa, December 17.* This Day the Republick, as usual, began to ballot to chuse the Two Hundred Members who are to compose the Small Council for the next Year.

*Copenhagen, December 24.* The contagious Distemper, which broke out lately among the Horses, seems now to be entirely stopt; but that of the Horned Cattle still rages without Intermission. We hear that it had penetrated into Norway by means of a Transport of Cattle from hence, and had reached some Places near Christiania; but that the Governor of the District, by taking proper Precautions, prevented it from spreading; so that after having carried off about Forty Head, the Distemper ceased.

*Turin, December 24.* His Royal Highness the Duke of York, who was to have come hither from Genoa the 26th Instant, has deferred his Journey till about the Middle of next Month.

*Vienna, December 28.* Count Ofolinski, who is sent hither as Envoy from the Republick of Poland, to notify the Death of the late King, had, on Monday last, his first Audiences of their Imperial Majesties.

*Bonn, January 2.* Yesterday the Elector received the usual Compliments of the Ministers, Chamberlains, and of the several Courts of Justice, on the New Year. His Electoral Highness, on this Occasion, declared he had fixed his Journey to Munster the 10th of this Month, to assist at the Opening of the Assembly of the States of that Bishoprick.

*Liege, January 2.* On Saturday arrived here a Courier, dispatched from Rome the 20th past, with the News of the Consistory's having rejected Prince Clement of Saxony's Request, and confirmed the Election of Count Outremont. The Votum of the Consistory was conceived in these Words: *Constat Electionem Comitum ab Outremont, eademque esse Confirmandam.* On this Occasion Bonfires were made, the Cannon was fired, and Long live Prince Outremont was the common Cry throughout the whole City all Night, and still continues.
