PURSUANT to an Act of Parliament passed in the 26th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, that Information has been sent to this Office, That a Vessel, called the de Houndraager of and from Amsterdam, whereof Aldert Engelz was Master, laden with Wainscot Board, sailed from Amsterdam on the 20th of December last, bound for London; That on the 28th being off Southwold, they took on Board a Pilot, to conduct her to her destined Port; That shortly after, she was driven by a violent Gale of Wind on the Coast of Holland, where they anchored, and on the 1st of January got under Sail again in Order to proceed to London; That being off Orfordness, on the 14th Instant about 8 o'Clock in the Morning, in a hard Gale of Wind the Anchor broke, so that they were obliged to cut away the Cable and bear away for Lowestoffe Roads; That about 11 o'Clock, being near the Buoy of the Stanford, and it still blowing a violent Gale of Wind, with a strong Ebb Tide, the ship was not able to weather the said Buoy, and not being able to set any Sail, except a double reefed Foresail and a double reefed Mizzen, she was, by the Violence of the said Wind and Tide, drove upon the Sand called Lowestoff Sand, or the Holmhead, where the said Vessel was entirely lost, and a great Part of her Cargo.
