Venice, January 6.

IT has been ordered by the Senate, that all such Levant Goods, as are or can be shipped here on English Vessels for England; shall be exempted from the Export Duties, with the Restitution of those paid on Importation.

Venice, January 11. There are no farther Accounts from Spalatro; which gives Reason to hope that the Plague is subsiding there, through the unwearied Diligence used by the General Michieli to prevent any Communication with the Infected.

St. James's, January 28, 1764.

Whereas, notwithstanding the repeated Notices, which have been published in the London Gazette, the Merchants and other Persons having Effects in any of the several Islands or Places restored to the Crowns of France and Spain by the late Treaty of Peace, and having a Right to send Ships thither to bring away such Effects, pursuant to the 8th and 19th Articles of that Treaty, do nevertheless neglect to deliver into the Office of the Earl of Halifax, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, a Designation in Writing, signed by their Names, of the Ships proposed to be sent by all and every of them, either jointly or separately, with the Name and Tonnage of each, and the Time within which they are intended to sail to any of the said Islands or Places: And whereas it is now become necessary to fix a certain Time, beyond which the Applications to be made by His Majesty's said Secretary of State to the Courts of France and Spain, for the Delivery of the respective Passports, agreed by the said Treaty to be given to the said Vessels, cannot be delayed, without Danger of much Prejudice, and Inconvenience, to the Interests of the Concerned; It is therefore hereby proposed and desired, that the said Merchants and others, would deliver in the Designations of their respective ships, in the Manner above described, to the Office of His Majesty's said Secretary of State, before the 14th Day of February next; and they are further to take Notice, that no Regard will be had to any Applications of that Nature, which may be delivered into the said Office, after the said 14th Day of February, except in such Cases where the said Notice shall appear to have been delayed by some unavoidable Circumstance or Accident.

All Letters for any of His Majesty's Islands in the West Indies, not herein mentioned, may be directed by the Way of Barbadoes, Grenada, or St. Christopher's; and if not so directed, they will be left at St. Christopher's, to be forwarded from thence as Occasion may offer.
