**W**E your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Lord-Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commonalty, of the City of York, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on the Auspicious Marriage of your Majesty's eldest Sister, the Princess Augusta, with the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick-Lunenburgh.

The illustrious Descent, and Amiable Accomplishments, of that Excellent Princess, which endear her so justly to your People, demanded the Affections of a Brave and Virtuous Hero, whose Humanity and Valour are equally conspicuous, and who, animated with the Renown of his glorious Ancestors, hath so eminently distinguished himself in the Defence of the Liberties of Europe.

So propitious an Alliance, founded in sound Policy, and adorned with exalted Merit, reflects the highest Honour upon your Majesty's Councils, and excites our sincerest Wishes, that this illustrious Pair may be blessed with a numerous Issue, as virtuous and as fortunate as their Parents.

Permit us, Sir, to add our dutiful Congratulations on the Increase of your Royal Family, by the Birth of your Second Son; a Subject of general Joy and Satisfaction, and an additional Security to the Protestant Succession, that Palladium of British Liberty.

May constant Felicity attend your Majesty and your Royal Consort: May the Sacred Name of Liberty be ever distinguished by Britons from those Pests of Civil Society, Faction, and Sedition; and may your Majesty's Government be ever firmly maintained by a Legal and Constitutional Authority.

intended to fail to any of the said Islands or Places: And whereas it is now become necessary to fix a certain Time, beyond which the Applications to be made by His Majesty's said Secretary of State to the Courts of France and Spain, for the Delivery of the respective Passports, agreed by the said Treaty to be given to the said Vessels, cannot be delayed, without Danger of much Prejudice, and Inconvenience, to the Interests of the Concerned; It is therefore hereby proposed and desired, that the said Merchants and others, would deliver in the Designations of their respective ships, in the Manner above described, to the Office of His Majesty's said Secretary of State, before the 14th Day of February next; and they are further to take Notice, that no Regard will be had to any Applications of that Nature, which may be delivered into the said Office, after the said 14th Day of February, except in such Cases where the said Notice shall appear to have been delayed by some unavoidable Circumstance or Accident.

*Dublin Castle, January 19.*

Yesterday being the Day appointed for celebrating Her Majesty's Birth Day, the Flag was displayed on Birmingham Tower, the Great Guns, at the Salute Battery, in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, were fired Three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. At Noon there was a very numerous Assembly of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes, at the Castle, who appeared in extraordinary Splendor to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode set to Music, was performed; in the Evening a Play was given by his Excellency to the Ladies; And at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy throughout the City; and at the Castle, the Ball and the several Entertainments were extremely Grand, and conducted with the utmost Regularity, and the Decorations of the Ball and Supper-Room particularly elegant.

Yesterday, upon receiving the Account of the Celebration of the Marriage of her Royal Highness the Princess Augusta, with his most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick Lüneburgh, the Flag was immediately displayed on Birmingham Tower; the Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired Three Rounds, and were answered by Volleys from the Regiments drawn up in the Royal Square at the Barracks; in the Evening the Castle was illuminated, and a Ball was given by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, to a most Brilliant Appearance of the Nobility and Gentry: The Great Guns were fired Three Rounds again, and the Regiments in the Barracks fired a Feu de Joye after each Round; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, Ringing of Bells, and every other Demonstration of Joy.
