T*Copenhagen, January 21.* HE French Ambassador, M. d'Ogier, has lately presented, in the Name of the King his Master, a Gold hilted Sword to Capt. Lamb, one of the Seven Danish Officers, who had Leave to serve on board the French Fleet. Three of that Number have been already gratified with the Order for Military Merit; and of the remaining three, two were killed in Action, and the Third died soon after his Return hither.

Count Schmettau, Lieutenant General of the Cavalry in the Danish Service, arrived here about ten Days ago from Holstein, and is to have the Chief Command of the Army in Norway, that Post not having yet been filled up since the Death of General Gruner.

Count Ulrich Adolph of Holstein, a Descendent of the old Grand-Chancellor, is appointed an Additional Deputy in the General War Directory.

They have long had a Design here of Repairing, Mending, and Shorening, as much as possible, all the Roads in this Island, in order to open, between the Cities and chief Market Towns, a more easy Communication for the Benefit of their mutual Commerce: And this Project is now so far advanced, that a Sum of Money has been appropriated for the Purpose, and the Care of the Execution is committed to Baron Rosenkrantz, Secretary of State for the Marine Department, under the new Title of Superintendent General of the Roads.

Out of the Regiments of Foot Guards and Grenadiers, which were lately broken, they are now forming two Life Regiments; one under the Title of Denmark, and the other of Norway: The former of these, it is said is to be given to Prince Charles of Hesse-Cassel, and the latter to Prince Frederick, as being superior, in some Degree, to the Regiments they command at present, which are otherwise to be disposed of.

On the 15th Instant died, at this Place, after a short Illness, and at the Age of 68, his Excellency M. d'Osten, Knight of the Order of the Elephant, and Director of the Custom-house in the Sound.

According to the general Expectation, an Ordinance, dated the 17th Instant, is just come out, relating to a new Contribution. It alters some Articles of the former Taxations of 23 September 1762. and favours the poorer Subjects, laying the Burthen more heavily upon the Rich, who are to pay in Proportion to their respective Rank and Character.

Ratisbon, January 23. Several Workmen are arrived here from Vienna, in order to build Twenty Vessels, in which the Imperial Court proposes to descend the Danube, on their Return from Francfort: These Vessels are to be ready by the 12th of April. The Chevalier de Buat arrived here from Paris on the 20th Instant.

Copenhagen, January 24. Last Saturday the 21st Instant an Estafette arrived from Elsenore, with an Account, that Lieutenant-General Moltke, Knight of the Order of Dannebrog, and Governor of the Fortrefs of Cronenbourg, died there the Day before, after a short Illness, at the Age of about 62. He was elder Brother to the Grand Marshal.

An Ordonnance, dated the 19th Instant, is come out this Morning, which renews and prolongs to the End of this Year, the general Pardon offered the

30th of December 1762, to all Danish Seamen, who having secreted themselves from their Dominions during the late War, shall return again to the Service within the Time limited.

By the Ordonnance of the 17th Instant, the King alters some Points in the Capitation-Tax: The Peasants are no longer to pay for the Poor in the Country, but the Proprietors of Land are to bear that Burthen: Children are exempted from Taxation till the Age of 16: But all Persons comprehended in the Regulation of Rank, are to furnish an Annual Contribution in the following Proportions, viz. Those of the 1st Class pay 8 Rix-Dollars each; of the 2d, 70; of the 3d, 40; of the 4th, 24; of the 5th, 18; of the 6th, 15; of the 7th, 12; of the 8th, 8; and of the 9th, 6: Widows are to pay one half, except when their Income does not amount to 100 Rix-Dollars yearly. All the Subaltern Officers, both by Sea and Land, are to pay 24 Danish Shilling (twelve Pence English) every Month.

Madrid, January 26. A Register Ship, called La Galga, arrived at Cadiz the 15th of this Month, in 69 Days, from Cartagena in the Indies. The registered Cargo for Account of the Commerce, consists of 1,827,706 Dollars, Seven Chests of wrought Silver, 1732 Serons of Cacao, 130 Chests of Sugar, 20 of Cascarilla, and 3816 Hides.

Hague, February 10. The Prince and Princess of Weilbourg, having expressed their Wishes to the Hereditary Prince and Princess of Brunswick, that they would be Sponsors to their new-born Daughters, their Serene and Royal Highnesses were pleased to assist at the Ceremony of the Baptizing, at the Great Church in this Town, on Wednesday Evening last, when the young Princess was named Augusta-Maria-Carolina. The Prince of Weilbourg gave a Grand Supper after the Ceremony: The Hereditary Prince and Princess set out for Utrecht Yesterday Morning at Nine o'Clock, where they rested that Evening. To-day, they proceed to Loo; to-morrow to Twickel; and the following Days by Bentheim and Osnabrug to Lunebourg.
