Madrid, January 26. The Marriage of the Infanta is said to be now entirely settled. The Imperial Ambassador is to make his Entry the 11th of next Month to demand the Princess; and the Feasts will immediately succeed it: The King of Spain returns to Madrid for this Purpose on the 10th. The Duke d'Osuna, a Grandee of the first Class, is to set out very soon for Vienna, with the Infanta's Picture, and is to proceed to Franckfort to compliment the King of the Romans.

Berlin, February 4. Last Tuesday Count Bohlen, Envoy from the Court of Sweden, had his first private Audience of the King of Prussia to deliver his Credential Letters; and he has since been presented to the Queen, and the rest of the Royal Family. Lieutenant Colonel Cocceji, Envoy from the King of Prussia to the Court of Sweden, set out from hence the 28th of last Month on his Way to Stockholm. The King of Prussia left this Place in the Morning; he dined at Charlottenburg with Part of the Royal Family, and went in the Afternoon to Potsdam, where it is believed he will remain for some Time: He was attended by the Prince of Prussia, the young Princes of Brunswick, and several General Officers. Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick set out this Morning for Potsdam, and will proceed from thence directly to Brunswick.

" I Shall certainly know and then depend upon it
" you will have your brains bloud out I am a tradit-
" man well known by you and will return ye money
" to you ye 17th of next month Leave it to morrow
" being friday ye 11th of february at 2 or 3 o Clock
" in the afternoon if you regard y^r life do not fail"
" there is davis, wrote with red ocre
" on ye side of ye Stature"
" take care no body see you leave it"

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and sending the said anonymous threatening Letter to the said James Norman, as abovementioned, does, hereby, promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Facts, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
