The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint John Crewe, of Crewe, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Chester.

Oporto, January 1. The Camp in the Province of Alentejo is broke up, and the Troops are returned to Quarters.

Hamburg, February 7. Letters from the Frontiers of Hungary say, that the Plague continues to rage in Bosnia, and mention the Precautions taken to prevent its spreading, by exacting a strict Performance of double Quarantine of all Persons and Effects coming from that Port into her Imperial Majesty's Dominions.

As the Rains continue here almost incessantly, the Floods are far from decreasing; so that Travelling becomes daily more difficult; and our Correspondence from all Quarters remains interrupted.

Hague, February 14. Accounts have been received here, of the safe Arrival of her Royal Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, with his most Serene Highness the Prince, at Loo on Saturday last, and at Twickel on Sunday; so that it is thought their Highnesses will have been able to get forward, notwithstanding the Floods, which so terribly incommoded this Part of Europe. All possible Honours, as well Civil as Military, have been shewn to the Prince and Princess, wherever they have passed in the Territories of their High Mightinesses.

Hague, February 17. General Poninski, having executed his Commission to the States-General, by notifying, on the Part of the Republick of Poland, the Death of the late King, sets out for England, with this Day's Mail, where he is accredited to His Majesty as Envoy Extraordinary.

There is no farther News of the Journey of the Hereditary Prince and Princess of Brunswick, than that their Highnesses passed the Frontiers of this Country, in perfect Health, on Sunday last. It is supposed that they reached Lunenbourg Yesterday, or at latest this Day.
