The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint Rowland Berkeley, of Cotheridge, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Worcester.

Constantinople, January 2. Upon the Remonstrances made by His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador, jointly with the other Foreign Ministers residing at the Porte, against the uncivilized and inhuman Behaviour of the Turkish Officers, in countenancing rather than restraining the Mob in the barbarous Stones of Rapine and Outrage committed by them during the late dreadful Fire at Smyrna; the Grand Signior expressed very high Displeasure against the Authors and Abettors of those Proceedings; so contrary to ancient Privileges, so repugnant to Hospitality, and so totally inconsistent with the good Faith and Friendship subsisting of old between the Crown of Great Britain and the Ottoman Porte; and an Officer of Distinction was immediately ordered to repair to Smyrna, bearing an Imperial Command, directing all possible Means to be used for discovering the Offenders, and punishing them in an exemplary Manner, according to the Degree of their Offence, and ordering the plundered Effects, as far as they could be distinguished and known, to be restored to the unhappy Sufferers. Though the Imperial Command has not perhaps, in this Respect, produced all the Effect that could be wished, yet as the Grand Signior has ordered it to be registered in the proper Offices, to serve as a standing Rule, and a public Manifestation of his Pleasure, and to be rigorously maintained and observed as such, there is no Doubt of its producing very salutary Consequences, if ever, in future Times, the like Calamity should again befall that unhappy City. Multapha Pacha, who now succeeds to the Vizirat for the third Time, arrived here, from his late Government of Aleppo, about a Fortnight ago.

Venice, January 27. Cavalier Tron the Younger is named to go as Commissary from this Republick, to adjust the Dispute about the Waters of the Tartaro; and Ostiglia is the Place appointed, by her Imperial Majesty's Desire, to treat upon this Affair. The Emperor's Queen has restored the Polls into their usual Channel. It is not yet known, whether her Imperial Majesty has named her Commissary.

Ratisbon, February 8. The Departure of the Emperor for Francfort is fixed for the 11th of next Month. His Imperial Majesty will be twelve Days on his Journey, and is to be supplied at every Station with 467 Horses. His Suite will consist of 65 Couches, and other Carriages.

Hamburgh, February 17. The Hereditary Prince and Princesses of Brunsvick were expected to arrive at Lunebourg this Afternoon.

Hague, February 21. The Hereditary Prince and Princesses of Brunsvick were got safe and well to Zell, according to our latest Accounts, and were to be at Lunebourg on Friday the 17th Instant.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing and Sending the said anonymous threatening Letter to the said Mr. Allin, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover him, or her Accomplice, or Accomplices, in the said Fact, so that he, she, or they; may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
