Though the Imperial Command has not perhaps, in this Respect, produced all the Effect the could be wished, yet as the Grand Signior has ore ered it to be registered in the proper Offices, to serve as a standing Rule, and a public Manifestation of his Pleafure, and to be rigoroufly maintained and observed as such, there is no Doubt of its producing very falatory Confequences, if ever, in future Times, the like Calamity should again befal that unhappy City. Mustapha Pacha, who now succeeds to the Vizirat for the third Time, arrived here, from his late Government of Aleppo, about a Fortnight ago.
