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Madrid, February 13.

DON Emanuel de Sada, who was formerly Ambassador at Turin, and latterly Captain General of Valencia, died a few Days since, and Count d'Aranda is appointed Captain-General in his Place.

The following is an Account of the Days of Entertainment, and Festivals, for the Marriage of the Infanta Donna Maria Luisa, in February 1764.

February 10, Friday, The King and Court return from the Pardo to Madrid.

Feb. 11, Saturday, The Imperial Ambassador Count Rosenbergs comes to Madrid, and occupies the House where he is to be defrayed at the King's Expence.

Feb. 12, Sunday, and Feb. 13, Monday, The Ambassador continues to be served at the King's Expence.

Feb. 14, Tuesday, The Ambassador goes in Ceremony, from the aforesaid House, to a Publick Audience, in which he makes a Demand of the Infanta. At Night Fireworks or Entertainments at the Buen Retiro.

Feb. 15, Wednesday, The Marriage Contract is signed, Fireworks or Entertainments at the Buen Retiro.

Feb. 16, Thursday, The Nuptials. Fireworks again, or Entertainments at the Retiro.

Feb. 17, Friday, First Festival at the Count of Rosenbergs's.

Feb. 18, Saturday, Second Festival at the Count of Rosenbergs's.

Feb. 19, Sunday, The Court kiss Hands in the Morning. In the Afternoon the King and Royal Family go in great Solemnity to return Thanks at the Church of Atocha.

Feb. 20, Monday, Third Entertainment at the Count of Rosenbergs's.

Feb. 21, Tuesday, Day of Rest between Count Rosenbergs's Festivals, and those of the Prince de la Catholica, Ambassador from Naples.

Feb. 22, Wednesday, Entertainment of the Prince de la Catholica.

Feb. 23, Thursday, The Tribunals kiss Hands.

Feb. 24, Friday, Entertainment of the Marquis d'Orlan, Ambassador from the French Court.

Feb. 25, Saturday, The King and Court return to the Pardo.

The Ambassadors of the three Courts will have Fireworks, and give a Play in Theatres which they have fitted up for the Occasion within their Houses, which will be followed by a great Supper, and a Ball.

Turin, February 15. His Royal Highness the Duke of York, is arrived in this Capital in perfect Health: Notwithstanding his Withes to maintain a private Character, it was impossible to avoid his being received at Alexandria and Asti, the two chief Towns through which his Royal Highness passed, with all possible Marks of Respect and Distinction. At some Distance from the first, the Commandant met him with two Coaches and Six, complimented him in the Name of the King, and conducted him to the Governor's House (he being absent upon Account of his Health) where his Royal Highness was received by the Officers of the Garrison and chief Nobility of the Place, and entertained magnificently. In entering the Town, he was saluted with Thirty Discharges of Cannon, the Guard at the Gate presented their Arms, and the Officer saluted him; a Captain's Guard was mounted, and all other Honours paid him in Proportion: During his Royal Highness's Stay at

Alexandria, he desired to see the Citadel, which his Sardinian Majesty has rendered a complete Work at a great Expence. Upon his Royal Highness's Departure, he was saluted with the same Number of Cannon, and received the same Honours at the Gate as at his Entrance. At Asti, he met with the same Treatment. At the first Post from Turin, he was met by the Master of the Ceremonies, and his Deputy, in Two of his Sardinian Majesty's Coaches, and conducted to the Palace prepared for his Reception on Sunday last at Noon, and soon after complimented on his safe Arrival, on the Part of the King, the Duke of Savoy, and the rest of the Royal Family.

The Foreign Ministers residing at this Court went in a Body to pay their Respects to his Royal Highness; after which his Royal Highness was conducted to Court by the Master of the Ceremonies and his Deputy, in Two of his Sardinian Majesty's Coaches, attended by Mr Pitt, Sir William Boothby, and Colonel St. John. At the Foot of a private Staircase, which leads to a Part of the Palace, he was met by the same Gentleman of the Bedchamber who had complimented him in the Name of his Sardinian Majesty, and in a Gallery at the Head of the Stairs, by the Grand Chambellan, who conducted his Royal Highness to an Apartment, where he was received by the King of Sardinia, the Duke of Chablais, and the Prince of Piedmont, the Duke of Savoy being confined to his Room by the Remains of a Fever and Cold, which has not yet left him. After some Conversation with his Sardinian Majesty, his Royal Highness was conducted by the Duke of Chablais and Prince of Piedmont, to the Duke and Dutches of Savoy's Apartments, where his Royal Highness was received by the Rest of the Princes and Princesses of this Royal Family. After this Ceremony, his Royal Highness returned in the same Manner to the Apartment where he had left the King, and was reconducted Home from thence in the same Coaches.

From the Cordial Friendship which exists between the Two Courts, it is easy to conceive with what Warmth of Regard his Royal Highness was received by his Sardinian Majesty and his Family, of which he continues to experience every Testimony, by every possible Mark of Attention and Esteem that can be shewn him; and his Royal Highness, on his Part, returns it in a Manner, which has already procured him the sincere Affection of the whole Court. Immediately upon his Royal Highness's Return, he was waited upon by the Prince of Carignan and his Son, and the next Day by the Great Officers, the Ministers of State, the Knights of the Order of the Annunciation, and Those about the Court who are of the same Rank. His Royal Highness then visited the Prince and Princess of Carignan, as Earl of Ulster, and continues to preserve his private Character.
