**T**HREE Days ago this Republick received Advice from Bastia, that Pasquale de Paoli had put himself at the Head of a Body of Malecontents, with some Cannon. Yesterday Morning his Royal Highness the Duke of York set out from hence for Turin, and seemed very well satisfied with the Attention shewn by this Republick to make his Stay here as agreeable to him as possible.

Venice, February 15. The last Advices from Dalmatia, which have been received at the Health Office, are rather more favourable than the Preceding, the Plague having ceased entirely in Clissa, and not increasing in the Suburbs of Spalato: Nevertheless on Saturday last the Senate appointed a noble Venetian to go into that Country, to assist the Proveditor General in taking the best Methods for stopping the Progress of the Contagion.

Hague, February 28. We hear that the Hereditary Prince and Princess of Brunswick arrived safely at Brunswick from Lunenbourg, on the 23d Instant, where they had been received with the greatest Demonstrations of Joy.

This being the Anniversary of the Princess of Nassau-Weilbourg's Birth-Day, the Prince Stadtholder received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, and all the People of Distinction at the Hague, upon the Occasion.

Hague, March 2. M. Kalkoen, who had been named on the Part of the Republick to reside as Ambassador at Constantinople, died this Morning.

Whereas it has been represented to the King, that on Wednesday the 15th Day of this Instant February, Mathew Delobanty, an Irish Chairman, and several other wicked and ill-disposed Persons, riotously assembled before the House of his Excellency the Morocco Ambassador, in Panton Square, Piccadilly, and most audaciously broke open the Outer Door of the said House, and forcibly entered the same, and were guilty of great Outrages therein, in Violation of the Rights and Privileges of Ambassadors, and in open Defiance of His Majesty and His Law; for which Offences, a Bill of Indict-

ment has been since found by the Grand Jury of the County of Middlesex, against the said Mathew Delobanty, and Five of his Accomplices, who have been apprehended, and are now in Custody; but the said Mathew Delobanty, and some other of the Offenders, abscond, and are fled from Justice: His Majesty for the better discovering and bringing to Justice, the Persons concerned in the said audacious Riot and Violence, is hereby pleased to offer a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to such Person or Persons, who shall apprehend the said Mathew Delobanty, and bring him before any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, so that he may be proceeded against and brought to Justice, and a suitable Reward to any Person or Persons, who shall in like Manner apprehend any other of the Offenders not yet taken, to be paid by Philip Carteret Webb, Esq; Solicitor to His Majesty's Treasury: And if any one of the said Offenders now at large, except the said Mathew Delobanty, will surrender himself, and give Information against any other of the Offenders now at large, so that he or they may be apprehended, he or they shall receive all fitting Encouragement.

The Person who committed this Robbery is described to be about five Feet three Inches high, broad-set; had on a light-coloured Surtout Coat, and rode upon a strong little black Horse of the Cart Kind, with a bob Tail.
