Hamburg, February 28. Letters from Brunswick give an Account of the Arrival there of the Prince and Princess of Brunswick on Tuesday the 21st Instant in the Forenoon: Her Royal Highness was met at some Distance from the City, by the Reigning Duke, and the Hereditary Prince, who conducted the Princess, amidst the Acclamations of a numerous Concourse of his Subjects, to the Palace.

On Thursday last the 23d Instant, M. de Johnn, a Knight of the Order of Danebrog, one of his Danish Majesty's Privy Counsellors, and his Envoy Extraordinary in the Circle of Lower Saxony, died here, after a lingering Illness, in the 78th Year of his Age.

The Count D'Ostrog, a Polish Nobleman, passed through this City a few Days ago, in his Way to

Copenhagen and Stockholm; to which Courts he is going to notify, in Form, the Death of the King of Poland.

Leicester House, March 4.

This Day Count Woronzow, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Empress of Russia, had an Audience of Leave of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.

And M. de Grosse, his Successor in the same Character, had his First Audience.

To which they were introduced by Sir Charles Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing and Sending the said anonymous threatening Letter to the said Mr. Allin, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his, or her Accomplice, or Accomplices, in the said Fact, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
