Pendennis, Novemb. 5.

N Friday and Saturday last several ships came in here, particularly a small Vessel from Irelands laden with Butter, bound for Oftend : Anorher from Bourdeaux, belonging to Bruges, laden with new Wines, who had feveral Cocquets intended for Hamburgh, which he pretends to have fent overland, himself intending for Boston. A third, a Swede laden alio with Wines from Bourdeaux, and bound homewards : They were in all 18 or 20 in company, but were dispersed by frorm, and can as yet give but little account of the reit. The French fleet (as they tell us) continue still at Havre de Grace; they speak of several Dutch Merchants that lie laden ready to fail, and give out, they will pass through the Channel.

Edenburgh, Novemb. 6. The Danes Man of War lately brought into Peterhead, had in him 28 Guns, 4000 weight of Powder, great store of o her provisions, and 130 men: he had in the storm, spent all his Masts, and had four foot of Water in hold, which had spoiled most of his Powder. The Captain concludes all or most of the other eight of his company in as bad, if not worse condition then himself. have here a confident report of the wrack of a Saip of fifty brass Guns more to the Northwards of us; of which, we expett farther confirmation.

Falmouth, Novemb. 7. The fifth instant was brought in here, a French prize, taken by the Guernsey Fregat of 100 Tuos laden with Bank-fish.

Minchesed, Novemb. 9. Here is arrived the Humility, a small Barque of 50 Tuns, with Wool and Sugar from Dungarvan: Here came in also the Anne of Newton in Wales with Coals, who in his last return discovered a great Tree florting near the midst of the Channel; its boughs much broken, and the body covered with Barnacles. He with his crew, with some difficulty, haled it to shore at Newton, it proves in length 84 foot, and nine foot in circumference, and he supposes may make a good Mast for a third R ne Ship.

West Comes, Novemb. 10. Here are lately arrived, driven in by storms and conversy winds, the St. Jacob of Ostend, fo. Gerritson Master, the rown of Gaunt, fo. Budars Mafter, the St. Francis, Ant. Sola Mafter, the St. William of Bruges, and the Fortune of Mamburgh, all of them bound for Bourdeaux, to lade Wines. Those from Flanders speak much of their apprehentions in those parts of the French preparations, which they suppose to be intended against them, and are accordingly bufie in fortifying upon the Frontiers, and in all places reinforcing their Garitons, to prevent any fudden attemp s.

Rome, Octob. 23. His Ho iness in his way to the Castel Gondolfo the last week, feemed much pleased with the Treat made him at Frateccio, by the Constable Colonna's B. other, to whom he showed extraordinary kindness, and 'tis believed is endeavoring upon that occasion to reconcile the differences between the Chigi and the Constable, which have been very high between them, since the beginning of his Pontisisa:c.

The Pope seems much recovered from his distemper, and deily divers himself at Castel Gondolfo, taking the air in a tich Caleche.

Genova, Octob. 25. Letters from Rouereds of Octob. 19. tellus, That the 17 inftant, her Imperial Mejeft; arrived there with only her own Train, all of them in mourning; and the next went to hear Mais at the great Church, atunded on by the Doke of Albuquerque, with hix Spanish

Chaches, and a Train of Sixty persons in Ach Liveries. After Dinner the Prince de Dietrichstein made him a Visit, and afterwards about five in the afternoon came to the Court, where he found the Empress firting under a Canopy of State of Crimson Velvet, on her right hand attended by her Ladies, and on her left by the Duke of Albuquerque; near whom the Prince taking his place, the Secretary of the King of Spain read the Contract of Marriage; which ended, the Duke upon his knees kiffed the Empresses hand, and taking his leave, committed his charge to the Prince Dietrichstein. The Empress, then rising up, gave her hand to all her Spanish Train. who with tears in their eyes took their leaves; and a little after retiring to ker Closet, gave there her last and private Audience to the Duke d' Albuquerque : After which, he with his whole Train left the City, and looge that Night in a Village near it, in order to his return. The Empres preparing the next day to go forwards for Trent.

The prepar tions made by the Republick of Fenice for the entertainment of the Empress at Brefeia, are extrao dinary great and magnificent; belies which, they have ordered that all her Expences during her continuance in their Territorics, shall be defined by the Senate, and the care of all committed to their Ambassador Procuratore Valiero, who attends the Empress with a Train of at the least 300 persons, acquitting

himself of his charge, with much gallautry.

The Spanish behaviours to the f. that made their Addresses at Milan to the Empress, has extreamly difficisfied all persons, especially the Princes of Italy. At the Empresses departure thence, the Spaniards that attended her, tore down, spailed and carried away with them all the rich Furniture that belonged to her e pettemen, in which many persons are highlycon-cerned, who lent their richest Houshold-stuffe to the Gove:-

nor to furnish the Palace upon that occasion.

Venice, October 29. Simior Procuratore Valiero, having conducted the Empress through the Territories of this Republique is returned hither; and on caturday morning last went to attend the Duke, to give him an Account of his Embaffy, which he performed with much fatisfaction to the Empreis, by whom he was received with all peffible the the Emp cos, of whethers, and presented with a jewel of rich Diamon's, which the Ambelliuor received from the Master of the Jewels, whom he in return presented with a rich Clain. The Duke of Albuquerque in the name of the Emperor and King of Spain conferring on him the honor of Knighthood: Several Chains of good value were likewite prefented by the Empresses commanded to the principal persons that accompanied him in his Em-

The Duke of Albuquerque with the rest of the Spanish Train, are upon their return and by order of the Senare, are treated in all parts of our Diminions: two of her Majesties Major Domo, arrived lately here to see this City and the Curioficies therein, where they are attended by Signior Procuratore Valiero, and the principal persons of this City,

and treated according to their qualities.

Our Letters from Dalmatia inform us, that G neral Cornare having vilited and reinforced all the principal places in that Country was returned to Zara, where at prefent he continues attending the motion of the Turks, of whom they have heard but little news of late, fince they retreated to their own quarters; only forne small parties are sent out to forrage, which hath been sufficiently revenged by a party of our Morlachs, who making an incursion into the Enemies Country, returned with a very confiderable booty, and much Cattle.

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Our men of Werr have secured the Seas from the Piracies of the Corfaires, of whom we have not of late heard any thing, only that one of the solome few daies fince was chaced by a Vellel of ours, who killed feveral men shoard the Turks Veilel, and had certainly taken him, had not the night pre-Vante 1.

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Legorn, October 26. We have lately advice from Smyrna, that from miliunder flattding begins there to sppear between the French and Genouese, which principally atrifes from the French jealousy of the growing trade of Genaua in the Levant, and is encreased upon their declaring against the French fire Sols pieces, which are much venied in the Levant, as being of an Alloy 16 per cent, below the frandand of Seville and Mexico Dollars, the venting of which miney as is pretended, enabled the French to give higher rates for the Armenian silks, then other Merchents could afford, and so consequently beat them out of the Trade. The Grand Vilier has it feems taken the abule fo far into his confideration, as to prevent the diforeer for the future, he has commanded those five Sols pieces, and all of the Alloy to be c.ved down, the French Ambafiador being unable to prevaile for the luipen, ing of the Decroe for fix months.

The nineteenth instant, three Gellies past by in light of this Per , which by advice brought in by a Feluca, that come in the same day, were thought to belong to the Squadron of the Dake di Furfi, bound from Naples for Spain with new railed foot for the Kings service. The same Feluca telling us of seven Spanish Gries which he fa v off of Monte Argentale, with more foor aboard them upon the fome account, who in their puffage ftept all the Barques they met with, fearch-

ing them for counterbanded goods.

The twenticth inflant, arrived here the Sr. Francis, a French Veffel well frought, in 26 days from Ciprus, who by the way touched at Argentiera, and Malta, and tells us of the arrival of leveral Gilles in Sicily. By a French Ba que artived from Confiancinopie at Malta, he was informed of the lefe arrival of the Genous Convoy at Smyrns, and that the Venetian Armada re ethen riding about the Isle of Andro. In his return off Corfica, he fel! into a quadron of Tunk Corfaires, who prefently boarded him; but after forne examination difficiti him without farther trouble, then taking with them a Veffel of Wine, which he was not unwilling to part with to them.

Madrid, Novemb. 1. Letters from Tangier Inform us, that Taffiletta is gone with his A my against Bambucar King of Feq. Gaylands Father in Law, in which, if ke prove successiui, he designes as 'ris feid to conclude a Peace with that Garrison, which is in a very good condition, and by a new Fort lately made, have taken in a confidereble plot of gound, which will be of much advantage to them.

A Letter lately fent from Caracene to her Mejefty, informes her that he had intercepted a party of 600 Portiguese horti, taken a Lieutenant Geneial, three Commiffaiy Ginerals, and 22 Captains, and was farther profesuring the Victory. Other Letters speak only of 200 horse taken : but the Partugaisare lo far from owning this streets, that they report the advantage to be on their file, the cectainty we may expect here ther.

Later Letters from Tangier advist us that Tafalete bad lately beaten the Sante, and Geylands condition by the de-

Hague, Novemb. 16. This day the States received Letters by two Courriers af parclit, one from the Elector of Branden Eurgh, and the other from the Duke of Lunenburgh, prefsing enneftly for fuccors against the Swedes, who having raised the fiege, have qui ted Bremen, and are marched to the Frontiers of Lunenburgh , where the General has given arms to 3000 Peatan's, and is there breaking ground, intending to build a very strong Fort; which (if not prevented) will the late Contagion and Pestilence.

Paris, Novemb. 16. Yesterday about five in the Evening, three Theeves entred into the Chamber of Monfieur Bra. nezu an Abbot, K eper of his Mijesties Meddals, dwelling in the Louvre, whom they that'd in his Bed, and seized upon a great quantity of the Meddals; but were (it feems) discovered before they could fecure themselves with their boo y: One of them endeavoring to escape by climbing over the houses, was killed by a shor; another taken with many Middals about him, but the third had the fortune to escape.

B. sides the late Ordinance prohibiting the Admission of any persons into Religious Orders under twenty five years of age, if men; and under twenty, if women: All Abbeffes and Ledies Superiors, are furbitden to receive above 1000 Livres apiece for these they admit into Convents, or above 100 Crowns for each penfion.

The Chamber des Grands Jours fitting at Puy in to Velay has of late ploces led severely against severa pe loss; and ordered several Gibbers to be set up, while some executions has been already done; and that the Court de Rieux, the Baron de Queiles, and the Viscount de Polignae, save been cited, but would not appear; the latter of them repairing his ther to make his excuses to his Mejesty, and purge himself of the crimes whereof he was occuled.

Antwerp, Nevemb, 20. Letters from Hamburg of the 13 inffant tell us, that the Swedes Army et 12000 men compleat were fill about Bremen, and that the Princes of Lunenbourg, Brunswick, and Gelle, had likewise an Army of 12000 men upon the Weser and thereabours, and that 4000 more were expected from the Elector of Brandenbourg, and 6000 from Holland, and 2000 from the Electer of Cologne, to oppose the Swedes, who ('is believed') has fome great delign on foot, the Treaty being concluded with Muscowy , and 15000 men employed in Fin'and and Ingermanlandt, having orders sent them to Emba que themselves speedily for Germany, for which purpose they had prest all forts of Veffels that could be found at ut attackholme to transport them before the Frosts into Pomerania, which gives no small jestouly to the Danes, who are putting themselves into a posture, and building more ships, and have (as 'tis said) already 12000 men in armes in Normay.

Edeaburgh, Novemb. 8. We are now alfuled, that the Vice-Admiral of Danemark of 52 Guns, is by form forced into the North of Scotland, and fecured.

Letters from Capt. Hamilton advise us, that he bath taken a fhin of 400 Tuns laden with Pot-Ailles, Tulky-Lenher, and Faris.
