**T**HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers; and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Septimus Robinson, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to;

*An Act for Naturalizing his Highness Prince Charles William Ferdinand, Hereditary Prince of Brunswick Lunenburg.*

*An Act to explain and amend such Part of an Act, made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for granting to His Majesty several additional Duties upon Wines imported into this Kingdom, and certain Duties upon all Cyder and Perry; and for raising the Sum of Three Millions Five Hundred Thousand Pounds, by way of Annuities, and Lotteries, to be charged on the said Duties, as relates to Cyder and Perry, made in this Kingdom.*

*An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces afloat on Shore.*

*An Act to continue, for a limited Time, the free Importation of Tallow, Hog's Lard, and Grease, from Ireland.*

*An Act for continuing and enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the West End of the Town of Burton upon Trent, in the County of Stafford, through the said Town, to the South End of the Town of Derby, in the County of Derby.*

*An Act for repairing and widening several Roads leading from Callington, in the County of Cornwall.*

*An Act to amend and render more effectual several Acts of Parliament, for repairing the Roads from Sherbrooke Hill, near Buxton and Chappel in the Frith, in the County of Derby, through the Town of Stockport, in the County of Chester, to Manchester, in the County of Lancaster, and other Roads in the said Acts mentioned; and for turning and diverting the Roads from Whaley Bridge, to Chappel in the Frith, and to Sparrow Pit Gate, and from Whaley Bridge, to the Western End of Longside Common, in the County of Chester.*

*An Act for repairing and widening the Roads, from the End of Stanbridge Lane, near a Barn in the Parish of Romsey, to the Turnpike Road at Middle Wallop, and from the Turnpike Road between Stanbridge Lane aforesaid and Great Bridge, to the Turnpike Road at Stockbridge, and from the Garden of Henry Hattat, at Aurbidge, to the Garden Wall of Denys Rolle, Esquire, at East Tuderley, and from Lockerley Mill Stream, to East Dean Gate, and from the said Garden-Wall, to the Turnpike Road leading from Stockbridge aforesaid, in the County of Southampton, to Salisbury.*

*An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from Horsbam, in the County of Sussex, through the Parishes of Shipley, Westgrinstead, Ashurst, Steyning, Bramber, and Breeding, in the said County.*

*An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Workop, in the County of Nottingham, through the Towns of Gateforth, Anston, Aston, Handsworth, and Darnall, to the North East End of Attercliffe, in the County of York, where the same joins the Turnpike Road from Barwry to Sheffield.*

*An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from the High Bridge in Spalding, to a certain Place, called Tydd Goat, in the County of Lincoln, and from Sutton Saint Mary's, to Sutton Wash, in the said County.*

*An Act for maintaining, regulating, and employing the Poor, within the Parish of Saint John at Hackney, in the County of Middlesex; and for lighting the said Parish, and establishing a regular nightly Watch therein.*

*An Act for continuing an Act, passed in the Tenth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, for continuing an Act, passed in the Fifth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the First; intituled, An Act for laying a Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or One Sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, upon every Pint of Ale or Beer, that shall be vended or sold within the Town of Dunbar, for improving and preserving the Harbour, and repairing the Town House, and building a School, and other public Buildings there, and for supplying the said Town with fresh Water.*

*An Act to enable the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, to purchase Houses and Ground for opening a Passage for Carriages, from Cornhill, to the Bank, and making more commodious several other Passages leading thereto; and for enlarging the Buildings of the said Bank, and making the same more commodious.*

**T**HE Merchants, and others, who have delivered into the Office of the Earl of Halifax, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, a Designation of the Ships which they respectively purpose to send to the Islands restored to France in the West Indies, to bring away their Effects from thence, to the End that Passports might be obtained from the Court of France for the said Ships, pursuant to the 8th Article of the late Definitive Treaty, are hereby desired to deliver into his Lordship's said Office, the Name of the Port in that particular Island to which the said Ships respectively are first intended to proceed.

*Constantinople, February 15.* Prince Dolgorucky; Envoy Extraordinary from Russia, having taken his Audience of Leave of the Sultan, and the Prime Vizier, is on the Point of his Departure, and will set out in a few Days.

*Vienna, March 7.* On Saturday last a Courier arrived here from Madrid, with the News, that the Marriage of his Royal Highness the Arch-duke Leopold with the Infanta, was celebrated there on the 16th past; and, on Monday, the Emperor, Empress Queen, and Arch-duke Leopold, received the Compliments of the Ambassadors, Foreign Ministers, and principal Nobility here. In the Evening there was a Ridotto, and the Ambassadors, with several other Foreign Ministers, had the Honour of Supping with their Imperial Majesties, and the Rest of the Royal Family. The Emperor's Journey to Frankfort is fixed for Monday next.

Venice

Venice, March 9. The Health Office have Advice from Dalmatia of the 20th past, that the Plague was considerably abated, there having died of it, in the great Suburb of Spalatro from the 11 to the 10th of last Month, Thirty Persons, in another Suburb Five, in another Three, and in the Fourth none. From the 10th to the 19th inclusive only Fifteen Persons had died in the Great Suburb, and none in the other Three. At Sign and Clissa the Distemper remained only in one Family; but a Person in Want of Subsistence in the latter Place carried the Infection into one House at Trau, which thereupon was inclosed, so that it was hoped the Distemper would not be spread in that Town.

The Court of Naples has made several Applications to this Republick for Liberty to purchase Corn in this State; but as the Scarcity becomes general, and as they have Occasion to send large Quantities into Dalmatia, they have absolutely refused it.

March 21.

This Day Count Woronzow, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Empress of Russia, had an Audience of Leave; and M. de Grosse, his Successor in the same Character, had his First Private Audience of her Royal Highness Princess Amelia.
