A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R. HEREAS We have taken into Our Confideration, the great Benefit which will arife to the Commerce of Our Kingdoms and the Interests of Our Subjects, from the fpeedy Settlement of Our Islands of Grenada, the Grenudine, Dominica, St. Vincent, and Tobago. We do therefore think fit, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation to publish and declare to Our loving Subjects, that We have, with the Advice of Our faid Privy Council, given the necessary Powers and Directions for an immediace Survey and Division into proper Parishes and District., of such of the faid Islands as have not hitherto been fo furveyed and divided, and for laying out fuch Lands in the faid Iflands, as are in Our Power to difpole of, into Alloments for Plantations of different Size and Extent, according as the Nature of the Lanc fhall be more or lefs adapted to the Growth of Sugar, Coffee, Cocoa, Cotton, or other Articles of beneficial Culture, referving to Us. Our Heirs, and Succeffors, fuch Parts of the lad Islands as shall be necessary for erecting Fortification, thereon, and for all other mili-tary Purpoles, for Glebes for Ministers, Allotments for Schoolmafters, for Woodlands, High Roads, and all other publick Purpofes; and alfo referving fuch Lands in Our Iflands of Dominica and St. Vincent, as, at the Time of the Surrender of those Islands, were and still are in the Possession of the French Inhabitants of those Islands, which Lands, it is Our Will and Plea fure should be granted to such of the faid Inhabitants as shall be inclined to accept the fame, upon Leafes for Terms abfolute, or for renewable Terms, upon certain Conditions and under proper Restrictious. And We do hereby further publish and declare, that the Allotments for Plantations in Our Islands of Grenada, the Grenadines, Jobago, and St. Vincent, Ihall contain to Three Hundred Acres, with fome few Allotments in each Island of Five Hundred Acres; and that the Allotments in Our Island of Dominica, which is repreferred to be not fo well adapted to the Cultivation of Sugar, and which from its Situation requires in Policy to be well peopled with White Inhabitants, shall be in general from Fifty to One Hundred Acres.

And whereas We have thought fit to declare to Our Parliament at the Opening of the prefent Seffion, Our Gracious Intention of referving for the publick Ufe, whatever Sums fhall be produced by the Sale of any of the Lands belonging to Us in the Iflands of the Weft Indies, which were ceded to Us by the late Treaty; We do further publifh and declare, that when these Allotments, or a fufficient Part of them, fhall bave been laid out, the fame fhall be fet up to Sale by Auction, at a Price per Acre, to be fixed thereon by Commiffioners appointed for that Purpole, under Our Great Seal of Great Britain, who fhall give publick Notice of the 1 ime and Place of fuch Sale.

And We do hereby further publish and declare, that the Lands fo fet up to Sale by Auction, shall not be fold, but upon the following Terms, and under the following Conditions and Refervations, that is to fay,

That each Purchaser shall immediately pay into the Hands of such Person as We shall appoint to receive the same, Twenty per Cent. of the whole Purchase-Money.

That the Remainder of the Purchafe-Money shall be paid by different Installments, viz. Ten per Cent: within the First Year after the Purchafe, Ten per Cent. more within the Second Year after such Purchafe, and Twenty per Cent within every successive Year, until the Whole is paid.

That each Purchafer of Lands which have been cleared and improved, fhall, within the Space of Three Months from the Date of the Grant; fettle and conitantly keep upon the Lot purchafed, One White Man or Two White Women for every Hundred Acress contained in the faid Lot; and, in Default thereof, fhall be fubject to the Payment of Twenty Pounds per Annum for every White Woman; and Forty Pounds for every White Man, that fhall be wanting to compleat the Number.

That the Purchafer of uncleared Lands fhall clear and cultivate One Acre in every Twenty in each Year, until Half the Land fo purchafed fhall be cleared; and; in Default thereof, fhall pay Five Pounds per Annum for every Acre not cleared, purfuant to fuch Condition; and fuch Purchafer fhall alfo be obliged to fettle and conflat.tly keep upon the Lot fo purchafed, One White Man or Two White Women for every Hundred Acres, as the fame fhall be cleared.

That each Purchafer fhall, befides the Purchafe-Money, be fubject to the Payment of an Annual Quit-Rent to Us, Our Heirs, and Succeffors; of Six-pence per Acre, under the Penalty of Five Pounds per Acre upon Non-payment thereof; fuch Quit Rents, in the Cafe of the Purchafe of cleared Lands, to commence from the Date of the Grant; and the firft Payment to be made at the Expiration of the Firft Year; and in Cafe of the Purchafe of the uncleared Lands; fuch Quit Rents to commente at the Expiration of Twelve Months from the Time each Acre is cleared:

That in Cafe of Failure in the Payment of the Purchafe-Money in the Manner above directed, the Purchafer shall forfeit all Right to the Lands purchased.

That no Perfon shall purchafe at any publick Sale more than Five Hundred Acres of cleared or uncleared Lands, in the Islands of Grenada, and the Grenadines, Tobago, and St. Vincent's, and in the Island of Dominica the Quantity shall be restrained to Three Hundred Acres; and in Order to enforce this neceffary and effential Regulation, that a Condition shall be inferted in every Grant, to be made in Confequence

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of fuch Purchafe, that in Cafe any Purchafe shall be made contrary thereto, so that the Property of the Purchafer in the Islands where the Lands lie, shall thereby amount to more than the above Quantity respectively, the same shall be void, the Money paid thereon forseited, and the consequential Grant of no Effect.

That all and every Purchaser of Lands, upon the foregoing Terms and Conditions, shall immediately, upon the Payment of the first Twenty per Cent, of the Purchase-Money, receive a Bill of Sale, figned by the faid Commissioners, which shall entitle such Purchafers to a Grant of the faid Lands, under the Seal of the Islands, containing the aforementioned Conditions and Refervations: Which faid Purchafe, and Grant in Confequence thereof, duly registered in the proper Offices, shall be good and valid in Law against Us, Our Heirs and Successors, unless the fame shall be revoked : And We do hereby declare the fame revocable by Our Commissioners of Our Treasury, or Our High Treasurer for the Time being, within Twelve Months from the Date thereof ; in which Cafe fuch Purchafe and Grant shall become void and of no Effect; and upon Notice of fuch Revocation, the faid Commissioners shall return to such Purchaser the Money paid upon the Purchase, with legal Interest thereon, and reasonable Allowance for any Improvements made on the faid Lands.

And whereas the Eftablifhing Towns in proper Situations, within the faid Iflands, will conduce greatly to the Convenience of the Inhabitants, and the Benefit of Trade and Commerce; We have therefore thought fit, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to direct a proper Diftrict in every Parifh in each Ifland, to be laid out for that Purpofe, into Lots for Tenements of different Size and Extent; and each Town-Lot to have a proportionate Allotment of Land contiguous to fuch Town, for a fmall Field or Pafture, allowing one Acre for every ten Foot in Front of the Town-Lot to which it is to be annexed; but no Field-Lot to exceed the Quantity of Six Acres.

And We do hereby further publish and declare, that such of these Town and Pasture-Lots, in each Island, as consist of Lands, which have been already cleared and improved, shall be set up to Sale by publick Auction, at a Price per Foot in Front of each Town-Lot, and a Price per Acre of the Field-Lot, to be fixed upon such Lot, by the faid Commissioners, in like Manner as upon the Allotments for Plantations.

And We do further publish and declare, that the Lots, fo fet up to Sale by Auction, shall not be fold but upon the following Terms and Conditions; that is to fay,

That the Purchafe-Money shall be paid in the fame Proportion, by the like Installments and upon the fame Conditions as are required in the Case of the Purchase of Allotments for Plantations.

That each Tenement shall be charged with the Payment of an Annual Ground-Rent to Us, Our Heirs, and Succeffors, of One Penny per Foot in Front, and Sixpence per Asse, for each Acre of the Field annexed to such Tenement; the faid Rents to commence at the Expiration of one Year from the Date of the Purchase, and the Purchaser to be liable to the same Penalties, in Case of Failure of the Payment of the Purchase-Money, and the Ground-Rent and Quit-Rent, as We have already required in respect to the Purchase of Allotments for Plantations.

And We do further publish and declare, that the Refervations, which We have directed to be made for Town and Pasture Lots of uncleared Lands, shall be granted in Fee Simple by Our Governor in Chief,

under the Scal of the Islands, to any Perfons, who will give fuch Security as Our Commiffioners shall approve, for building on fuch Town-Lots within a reafonable Time, to be fixed by Our faid Commiffioners; and alfo for Inclosing, Fencing, and properly Clearing for Pasture, the Fields that shall be granted with such Tenement.

And We do further publish and declare, that We have directed that no more than one Town-Lot be granted to any one Person, and that no more than Six Acres of Pasture-Land be annexed to such Town-Lot, whatever Number of Feet in Front it shall consist of.

That each Grantee shall be obliged, under proper Penalties, to the Payment of an Annual Ground-Rent to Us, Our Heirs, and Successfors, of One Penny per Foot in Front of the Town-Lot for a Tenement, and Sixpence per Acre for each Acre of the Pasture-Lot; the first Payment to be made within two Years from the Date of the Grant.

And in order the more effectually to conduce to the Peopling Our faid Iflands with industrious White Inhabitants, upon which their Strength and Security do effentially depend; We have thought fit, with the Advice of Our faid Council, to direct a Quantity of Land, not exceeding Eight Hundred Acres, to be referved in fuch Parts of every Parish in each Island respectively, as are not adapted for Sugar Plantations, for the Accommodation of poor Settlers, to be divided into Lots, of not lefs than Ten, nor more than Thirty Acres each : And We do hereby further publish and declare, that the faid Allotments are to be granted in Fee Simple, under the Seal of Our faid Iflands, to fuch poor Protestants as shall apply for the fame, in Proportion to their respective Abilities to cultivate the faid Lands; and fubject to the following Conditions; that is to fay,

That each Grantee shall, at the Expiration of four Years from the Date of the Grant, pay a Quit-Rent to Us, Our Heirs, and Successfors, of Six-pence per Acre, for every Acre then cleared, and a Penalty of Two Shillings per Acre, for every Acre of Land uncleared; which faid Penalty of Two Shillings per Acre shall be reduced to Six-pence per Acre, as the Land shall be cleared; and in Case of Failure of such Rent and Penalty, the Grantee shall be fubject to the further Penalty of the Payment of Five Pounds for every Acre, for which such Suit-Rent shall not be paid.

That each Grantee shall enter upon and occupy the Land within Three Months from the Date of the Grant; and shall continue to occupy and improve the same, for Twelve successive Months, from the Time of such first Settlement.

That the Lands shall, for the Space of Seven Years, be unalienable by Sale, nor shall the fame be let, fet or affigned over during the fame Term, otherwife than to the Ufe and Benefit of any Child or Children of fuch original Settler, without especial Licence in Writing first had and obtained, from the Chief Governor or Commander in Chief of Our faid Islands for the Time being; and in Cafe of Failure or Default in either of the two last mentioned Conditions, the Grant to be void.

And We do hereby further publish and declare, that all Grants made of the faid Allotments for poor Settlers, as also all Grants made of Town and Patime Lots of cleared and uncleared Lands, shall be absolute and final.

That in all Grants to be made of Allotments for Plantations and Town and Patture Lots, and of Lands for poor Settlers, there shall be a Refervation to Us, Our Heirs, and Successors, of all Mines of Gold and Silver.

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And We do further publish and declare, that the first Sale of Lands shall be in the Month of June next, if the Surveys can be made fo foon; due Notice of which, as also of the Place of Sale, will be given by Our Commissioners appointed as aforesaid, for the Disposal of the faid Lands.

HE Merchants, and others, who have delivered into the Office of the Earl of Halifax, One of His Majefly's Principal Secretaries of State, a Defignation of the Ships which they refpectively purpole to fend to the Islands reflored to France in the Welt Indies, to bring away their Effects from thence, to the End that Passports might be obtained from the Court of France for the faid Ships, pursuant to the 8th Article of the late Definitive Treaty, are hereby defired to deliver into his Lordship's faid Office, the Name of the Port in that particular Ifland to which the faid Ships refpectively are first intended to proceed.

Petersbourg, March 6. Count Lubinski, Minister from the Republick of Poland, has already had his Audience of Leave: The Empress has presented

him with the Order of St. Alexander Newfky. Berlin, March 24. On Tuefday last the King of Pruffia came here, and had a Levée, at which the Foreign Ministers assisted ; early the next Morning, the King fet out for Silefia, accompanied by the Prince Royal and his Brother, and the two Young Princes of Brunfwick : His Majefty is expected back by the 6th or 7th of next Month. Prince Henry, the King's Brother, ftill continues at Rhinfberg. Major General Reidt, the Imperial Minister at this

Court, fet out on the 20th Inflant, for the Baths at Toplitz, and intends to be back about the Time of the King's Return from Silefia.

Ratisbon, March 18. Yetlerday about One o'Click the Emperor, accompanied by the Archdukes Joleph and Leopold, with a numerous Retinue, pulled close t) the Walls of this City. His Imperial Majefty had lain the Night before at Straubing, where he was most magnificently entertained by the Elector of Ba-varia, who waited on him there in Person. The Elector has caused several new Roads to be cut across the Country, and ordered Detachments of Cavalry, new cloathed on Purpole, 10 parade at every Station. Venice, March 16. The following is the Tranf-

lation of a circular Letter from the Health Office, to the Foreign Ministers here.

The contagious Diftemper at Spalato declines daily according to our last Accounts, nothing remarkable having paffed in those Parts, except the Astack of another Town in the Jurifdiction of Trau, where Six Perfons died of it in Ten Days. The who'e of those who died in Nine Days in the Four Suburbs of Spalato, were but Sixteen: And in Seven Days, in the Three Territories of Cliffa, Sign, and Trau, Eighteen. This is our fresheft Intelligence: We hope it will grow every Day more favourable, and shall not fail acquainting you with the News which we fhall receive.

Hague, March 30. The Prince of Naffau Weilbourg is gone to his Government of Bergen op-zoom.

The Accounts from Berbices mention, that the rebellious Negroes had been driven from their Pofts before the Arrival of the regular Troops fent from Europe; and that it was hoped the Colony would foon be refettled as before the late Difturbances. The Troops from hence were arrived at Surinam in perfect Health.
