THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Septimus Robinson, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for granting to his Majesty a certain Sum of Money, out of the Sinking Fund, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Four; and for preventing, in certain Cases, the obtaining of Allowances, in respect of the Leakage of Wines imported into this Kingdom; and for making forth Duplicates of Exchequer Bills, Tickets, Certificates, Receipts, Annuity Orders, and other Orders, lost, burnt, or otherwise destroyed.

An Act for granting certain Duties in the British Colonies and Plantations in America; for continuing, amending, and making perpetual, an Act, passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, (intituled, an Act for the better securing and encouraging the Trade of His Majesty's Sugar Colonies in America;) for applying the Produce of said Duties, and of the Duties to arise by Virtue of the said Act, towards defraying the Expences of defending, protecting, and securing, the said Colonies and Plantations; for explaining an Act, made in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of King Charles the Second, intituled, An Act for the Encouragement of the Greenland and Eastland Trades; and for the better securing the Plantation Trade; and for altering and disallowing several Drawbacks on Exports from this Kingdom; and more effectually preventing the clandestine Conveyance of Goods to and from the said Colonies and Plantations, and improving and securing the Trade between the same and Great Britain.

An Act for continuing certain Laws, therein mentioned, relating to British Sail Cloth, and to the Duties payable on Foreign Sail Cloth, and to the Allowance upon the Exportation of British-made Gunpowder; and for giving further Encouragement for the Importation of Naval Stores from the British Colonies in America.

An Act for repealing the Duties now payable upon Beaver Skins imported, and for granting other Duties in lieu thereof; and for granting certain Duties upon the Exportation of Beaver Skins and Beaver Wool; and for taking off the Drawback allowed on the Exportation of such Skins.

An Act to continue several Laws, for the better regulating of Pilots, for conducting of Ships and Vessels from Dover, Deal, and Isle of Thanet, up the Rivers of Thames and Medway, relating to the Landing of Rum or Spirits of the British Sugar Plantations, before the

Duties of Excise are paid thereon, and to the further Punishment of Persons going armed or disguised, in Defiance of the Laws of Customs or Excise, and to the Relief of the Officers of the Customs, in Informations upon Seizures; and for granting a Liberty to carry Sugars, of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture, of any of His Majesty's Sugar Colonies, directly into Foreign Parts, in Ships built in Great Britain, and navigated according to Law; and for punishing Persons, who shall damage or destroy any Banks, Floodgates, Sluices, or other Works, belonging to Rivers and Streams made navigable by Act of Parliament.

An Act for the better regulating of Buildings, and to prevent Mischiefs that may happen by Fire, within the Weekly Bills of Mortality, and other Places therein mentioned.

An Act for the more easy Discharge of Recognizances estreated into His Majesty's Court of Exchequer

An Act to enable Infants, who are seized of Lands, Tenements, or Hereditaments, within the Duchy of Lancaster, or the Counties Palatine of Chester, Lancaster, or Durham, or the Principality of Wales, in Fee, for the Life or Lives of one or more other Person or Persons, in Trust, or by Way of Mortgage, to make Conveyances of such Estates, by Order of the Court of the Duchy Chamber of Lancaster, of the Court of Exchequer of the County Palatine of Chester, of the Court of Chancery of the County Palatine of Lancaster, of the Court of Chancery of the County Palatine of Durham, and of the Courts of the Great Sessions, in the Principality of Wales.

An Act for the Relief of the Bond and other Creditors of the Wardens and Commonalty of the Mystery of Mercers of the City of London.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Derby to Mansfield, in the County of Nottingham, and several other Roads therein mentioned.

An Act for continuing the Term of, and amending, the Acts for repairing several Roads leading from Ledbury in the County of Hereford; and for widening and amending the Road through the Parish of Bromesborough in the County of Gloucester, and through Corse Lawn, till it meets the Road from Gloucester to Worcester.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, intituled, An Act for making, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads, in the several Parishes of Lambeth, Newington, St. George Southwark, and Bermondsey, in the County of Surrey, and Lewisham in the County of Kent; and for repairing Lambeth Back Lane, and for lighting and watching the said Roads.

An Act for amending and widening the Road, from a Place near the Village of Milford, through Haslemere, to the Portsmouth Road, between Lippock and Rake, in the several Counties of Surrey, Sussex, and Southampton.

An Act for amending and widening the Road from Tinsley

Tinsley in the County of York, to the Town of Doncaster in the said County.

An Act for amending and widening the Road, from the South End of the Town of Rotherham in the County of York, to the present Turnpike Road, near Pleasley, in the County of Derby, and also the Road from the North End of the said Town of Rotherham, into the present Turnpike Road, on the East Side of Tankersley Park in the said County of York.

An Act to continue the Term, and enlarge the Powers, of an Act passed in the Seventeenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for repairing the Road between the Town of Kingston upon Hull and Town of Beverley, in the East Riding of the County of York; and for repairing the Road from Newland Bridge, to the West End of the Town of Cottingham in the said Riding.

An Act for repairing, widening, and keeping in Repair, the high Roads leading from Alfreton in the County of Derby, through Carters Lane, to a certain Place in the Town of Mansfield, called Stockwell, and from the Bridle Gate, at the Division of the Liberties of Blackwell and Hucknall, through the Town of Sutton in Ashfield, to the Mansfield and Newark Turnpike, at or near Pythou Hill, in the Forest of Sherwood in the County of Nottingham.

An Act for continuing and enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Rochdale to Burnley, in the County of Lancaster.

An Act for extending the Provisions of an Act passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of His late Majesty, for repairing the Roads from the North End of Malling-street near Lewes, and other Roads in Suffex, to the Road leading from the North End of Offham, to the Spital Barn in Lewes aforesaid.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road, from the West End of Baxter Gate, in the Town of Whitby, to the South End of Lockton Lane, in the Parish of Middleton, in the County of York.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of two Acts of the Twelfth of King George the First, and of the Third of His late Majesty, for repairing several Roads, therein mentioned, in the County of Salop; and also for amending and widening the Road, from the Sign of the Horse Shoe in Uckington, to Longnor Green; and also from the West End of Hatcham Bridge, to the Cross Houses upon the Bridgenorth Turnpike Road, in the said County.

An Act for establishing a regular and Nightly Watch, and for maintaining, regulating, and employing the Poor, within the Parish of St. Clement Danes, in the Liberty of Westminster, and County of Middlesex.

An Act for the more effectual Relief and Employment of the Poor within the City of Gloucester, and for lighting the Streets of the said City.

An Act to amend, and render more effectual, an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor, in the Hundreds of Colneis and Carlford, in the County of Suffolk.

An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor, in the Hundred of Samford, in the County of Suffolk.

An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor, in the Hundred of Bosmore and Claydon in the County of Suffolk.

An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor, in the Hundred of Blything, in the County of Suffolk.

An Act for continuing One Moiety of the Duties, granted by an Act of the Eleventh and Twelfth Years of King William the Third, for the Repair of Dover Harbour, and which have been, by several other Acts, continued till the Twelfth Day of May, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-five; and for applying the same to completing and keeping in Repair, the Harbour of Rye in

the County of Suffex; and for more effectually completing and keeping in Repair the said Harbour.

An Act for paving, repairing, and cleansing, the Streets, Lanes, Alleys, and publick Passages, within the Town of Whitby in the County of York, and for preventing Inroads and Annoyances therein, and for regulating the Carriages, Cartmen, and Porters there.

An Act for amending, and supplying the Deficiencies of, an Act passed in the Second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty King George the Third, intituled, An Act to amend, and to render more effectual, several Acts made for cleansing and enlightening the Streets of the Town of Kingston upon Hull, and for preventing Annoyances therein.

An Act for supplying the Borough and Town of Wigan, in the County of Lancaster, with fresh and wholesome Water.

And to Twenty-three private Bills.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We have taken into Our Consideration, the great Benefit which will arise to the Commerce of Our Kingdoms and the Interests of Our Subjects, from the speedy Settlement of Our Islands of Grenada, the Grenadines, Dominica, St. Vincent, and Tobago. We do therefore think fit, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation to publish and declare to Our loving Subjects, that We have, with the Advice of Our said Privy Council, given the necessary Powers and Directions for an immediate Survey and Division into proper Parishes and Districts, of such of the said Islands as have not hitherto been so surveyed and divided, and for laying out such Lands in the said Islands, as are in Our Power to dispose of, into Allotments for Plantations of different Size and Extent, according as the Nature of the Land shall be more or less adapted to the Growth of Sugar, Coffee, Cocoa, Cotton, or other Articles of beneficial Culture, reserving to Us, Our Heirs, and Successors, such Parts of the said Islands as shall be necessary for erecting Fortifications thereon, and for all other military Purposes, for Glebes for Ministers, Allotments for Schoolmasters, for Woodlands, High Roads, and all other publick Purposes; and also reserving such Lands in Our Islands of Dominica and St. Vincent, as, at the Time of the Surrender of those Islands, were and still are in the Possession of the French Inhabitants of those Islands, which Lands, it is Our Will and Pleasure should be granted to such of the said Inhabitants as shall be inclined to accept the same, upon Leases for Terms absolute, or for renewable Terms, upon certain Conditions and under proper Restrictions. And We do hereby further publish and declare, that the Allotments for Plantations in Our Islands of Grenada, the Grenadines, Tobago, and St. Vincent, shall contain to Three Hundred Acres, with some few Allotments in each Island of Five Hundred Acres; and that the Allotments in Our Island of Dominica, which is represented to be not so well adapted to the Cultivation of Sugar, and which from its Situation requires in Policy to be well peopled with White Inhabitants, shall be in general from Fifty to One Hundred Acres.

And whereas We have thought fit to declare to Our Parliament at the Opening of the present Session, Our Gracious Intention of reserving for the publick Use, whatever Sums shall be produced by the Sale of any of the Lands belonging to Us in the Islands of the West Indies, which were ceded to Us by the late Treaty; We do further publish and declare, that when these Allotments, or a sufficient Part of them, shall have been laid out, the same shall be set up to Sale by Auction, at a Price per Acre, to be fixed thereby by Commissioners appointed for that Purpose, under Our

Great

Great Seal of Great Britain, who shall give publick Notice of the Time and Place of such Sale.

And We do hereby further publish and declare, that the Lands so set up to Sale by Auction, shall not be sold, but upon the following Terms, and under the following Conditions and Reservations, that is to say,

That each Purchaser shall immediately pay into the Hands of such Person as We shall appoint to receive the same, Twenty per Cent. of the whole Purchase-Money.

That the Remainder of the Purchase-Money shall be paid by different Installments, viz. Ten per Cent. within the First Year after the Purchase, Ten per Cent. more within the Second Year after such Purchase, and Twenty per Cent. within every successive Year, until the Whole is paid.

That each Purchaser of Lands which have been cleared and improved, shall, within the Space of Three Months from the Date of the Grant, settle and constantly keep upon the Lot purchased, One White Man or Two White Women for every Hundred Acres contained in the said Lot; and, in Default thereof, shall be subject to the Payment of Twenty Pounds per Annum for every White Woman, and Forty Pounds for every White Man, that shall be wanting to complet the Number.

That the Purchaser of uncleared Lands shall clear and cultivate One Acre in every Twenty in each Year, until Half the Land so purchased shall be cleared; and, in Default thereof, shall pay Five Pounds per Annum for every Acre not cleared, pursuant to such Condition; and such Purchaser shall also be obliged to settle and constantly keep upon the Lot so purchased, One White Man or Two White Women for every Hundred Acres, as the same shall be cleared.

That each Purchaser shall, besides the Purchase-Money, be subject to the Payment of an Annual Quit-Rent to Us, Our Heirs, and Successors, of Six-pence per Acre, under the Penalty of Five Pounds per Acre upon Non-payment thereof; such Quit-Rents, in the Case of the Purchase of cleared Lands, to commence from the Date of the Grant; and the first Payment to be made at the Expiration of the First Year; and in Case of the Purchase of the uncleared Lands, such Quit Rents to commence at the Expiration of Twelve Months from the Time each Acre is cleared.

That in Case of Failure in the Payment of the Purchase-Money in the Manner above directed, the Purchaser shall forfeit all Right to the Lands purchased.

That no Person shall purchase at any publick Sale more than Five Hundred Acres of cleared or uncleared Lands, in the Islands of Grenada, and the Grenadines, Tobago, and St. Vincent's, and in the Island of Dominica the Quantity shall be restrained to Three Hundred Acres; and in Order to enforce this necessary and essential Regulation, that a Condition shall be inserted in every Grant, to be made in Consequence of such Purchase, that in Case any Purchase shall be made contrary thereto, so that the Property of the Purchaser in the Islands where the Lands lie, shall thereby amount to more than the above Quantity respectively, the same shall be void, the Money paid thereon forfeited, and the consequential Grant of no Effect.

That all and every Purchaser of Lands, upon the foregoing Terms and Conditions, shall immediately, upon the Payment of the first Twenty per Cent. of the Purchase-Money, receive a Bill of Sale, signed by the said Commissioners, which shall entitle such Purchasers to a Grant of the said Lands, under the Seal of the Islands, containing the aforementioned Conditions and Reservations: Which said Purchase, and Grant in Consequence thereof, duly registered in the proper Offices, shall be good and valid in Law against Us, Our Heirs and Successors, unless the same shall be revoked: And We do hereby declare the same revocable by Our Commissioners of Our

Treasury, or Our High Treasurer for the Time being, within Twelve Months from the Date thereof; in which Case such Purchase and Grant shall become void and of no Effect; and upon Notice of such Revocation, the said Commissioners shall return to such Purchaser the Money paid upon the Purchase, with legal Interest thereon, and reasonable Allowance for any Improvements made on the said Lands.

And whereas the Establishing Towns in proper Situations, within the said Islands, will conduce greatly to the Convenience of the Inhabitants, and the Benefit of Trade and Commerce; We have therefore thought fit, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to direct a proper District in every Parish in each Island, to be laid out for that Purpose, into Lots for Tenements of different Size and Extent; and each Town-Lot to have a proportionate Allotment of Land contiguous to such Town, for a small Field or Pasture, allowing one Acre for every ten Foot in Front of the Town-Lot to which it is to be annexed; but no Field-Lot to exceed the Quantity of Six Acres.

And We do hereby further publish and declare, that such of these Town and Pasture-Lots, in each Island, as consist of Lands, which have been already cleared and improved, shall be set up to Sale by publick Auction, at a Price per Foot in Front of each Town Lot, and a Price per Acre of the Field Lot, to be fixed upon such Lot, by the said Commissioners, in like Manner as upon the Allotments for Plantations.

And We do further publish and declare, that the Lots, so set up to Sale by Auction, shall not be sold but upon the following Terms and Conditions; that is to say,

That the Purchase-Money shall be paid in the same Proportion, by the like Installments and upon the same Conditions as are required in the Case of the Purchase of Allotments for Plantations

That each Tenement shall be charged with the Payment of an Annual Ground-Rent to Us, Our Heirs, and Successors, of One Penny per Foot in Front, and Sixpence per Acre, for each Acre of the Field annexed to such Tenement; the said Rents to commence at the Expiration of one Year from the Date of the Purchase, and the Purchaser to be liable to the same Penalties, in Case of Failure of the Payment of the Purchase-Money, and the Ground-Rent and Quit-Rent, as We have already required in respect to the Purchase of Allotments for Plantations.

And We do further publish and declare, that the Reservations, which We have directed to be made for Town and Pasture Lots of uncleared Lands, shall be granted in Fee Simple by Our Governor in Chief, under the Seal of the Islands, to any Persons, who will give such Security as Our Commissioners shall approve, for building on such Town-Lots within a reasonable Time, to be fixed by Our said Commissioners; and also for Inclosing, Fencing, and properly Clearing for Pasture, the Fields that shall be granted with such Tenement.

And We do further publish and declare, that We have directed that no more than one Town-Lot be granted to any one Person, and that no more than Six Acres of Pasture-Land be annexed to such Town-Lot, whatever Number of Feet in Front it shall consist of.

That each Grantee shall be obliged, under proper Penalties, to the Payment of an Annual Ground-Rent to Us, Our Heirs, and Successors, of One Penny per Foot in Front of the Town-Lot for a Tenement, and Sixpence per Acre for each Acre of the Pasture-Lot; the first Payment to be made within two Years from the Date of the Grant.

And in order the more effectually to conduce to the Peopling Our said Islands with industrious White Inhabitants, upon which their Strength and Security do

do essentially depend; We have thought fit, with the Advice of Our said Council, to direct a Quantity of Land, not exceeding Eight Hundred Acres, to be reserved in such Parts of every Parish in each Island respectively, as are not adapted for Sugar Plantations, for the Accommodation of poor Settlers, to be divided into Lots, of not less than Ten, nor more than Thirty Acres each: And We do hereby further publish and declare, that the said Allotments are to be granted in Fee Simple, under the Seal of Our said Islands, to such poor Protestants as shall apply for the same, in Proportion to their respective Abilities to cultivate the said Lands; and subject to the following Conditions; that is to say,

That each Grantee shall, at the Expiration of four Years from the Date of the Grant, pay a Quit-Rent to Us, Our Heirs, and Successors, of Six-pence per Acre, for every Acre then cleared, and a Penalty of Two Shillings per Acre, for every Acre of Land un-cleared; which said Penalty of Two Shillings per Acre shall be reduced to Six-pence per Acre, as the Land shall be cleared; and in Case of Failure of such Rent and Penalty, the Grantee shall be subject to the further Penalty of the Payment of Five Pounds for every Acre, for which such Quit-Rent shall not be paid.

That each Grantee shall enter upon and occupy the Land within Three Months from the Date of the Grant; and shall continue to occupy and improve the same, for Twelve successive Months, from the Time of such first Settlement.

That the Lands shall, for the Space of Seven Years, be unalienable by Sale, nor shall the same be let, set or assigned over during the same Term, otherwise than to the Use and Benefit of any Child or Children of such original Settler, without especial Licence in Writing first had and obtained, from the Chief Governor or Commander in Chief of Our said Islands for the Time being; and in Case of Failure or Default in either of the two last mentioned Conditions, the Grant to be void.

And We do hereby further publish and declare, that all Grants made of the said Allotments for poor Settlers, as also all Grants made of Town and Pasture Lots of cleared and un-cleared Lands, shall be absolute and final.

That in all Grants to be made of Allotments for Plantations and Town and Pasture Lots, and of Lands for poor Settlers, there shall be a Reservation to Us, Our Heirs, and Successors, of all Mines of Gold and Silver.

And We do hereby further publish and declare, that the first Sale of Lands shall be in the Month of June next, if the Surveys can be made so soon; due Notice of which, as also of the Place of Sale, will be given by Our Commissioners appointed as aforesaid, for the Disposal of the said Lands.

INformation having been given, that several of His Majesty's Subjects, in the underwritten List particularly mentioned, have been for a considerable Time, and are now detained in France as Hostages for the Payment of Ransom Bills, which have not yet been satisfied; These are to give Notice, that in Case such Ransom-Bills are not forthwith discharged, Prosecutions will be commenced in His Majesty's Court of Admiralty against all Masters, Owners, and others, unjustly refusing or neglecting to pay the Sums of Money stipulated for the Release of those unfortunate Persons, who have suffered so long an Imprisonment.

Naples, March 13. His Sicilian Majesty went on Saturday last to Caferta, as usual, with his whole Court. There being but two Corn Vessels arrived, of the many which are expected, the Scarcity of Bread rather increases; and if the said Vessels should not come in very soon, the Distress must infallibly grow much more considerable, and be productive of some great Disorders.

The two Neapolitan Frigates, that went some Months to Genoa and Toulon, came back into this Port on Saturday last in the Night.

Florence, March 20. His Royal Highness the Duke of York arrived here on Friday the 16th Instant, in good Health: Lord Fordwich, and Sir Horace Mann, had been for two Days towards the Confiner on the Bologna Road, to wait for his Royal Highness, and had the Honour to conduct him into the Town. The Desire of his Royal Highness to pass under the Title of Earl of Ulster, deprived this Government of shewing him those publick Honours, on his entering the Town, that were intended. The Streets were crowded with People, and particularly that where Sir Horace Mann's House stands, where his Royal Highness condescended to lodge. A few Minutes after his Arrival there, a proper Guard was sent to his Door; and the Officer, who commanded it, being admitted to the Duke's Presence, received his Royal Highness's Thanks, and the Guard was dismissed. Soon after, Marshal Botta's Aid de Camp was sent to enquire at what Hour the Marshal and the other

other Members of the Regency might have the Honour of paying their Respects to the Duke; and the Great Chancellor of Russia sent the same Message. His Royal Highness answered, That he would receive them after he had dined; when they were accordingly introduced to him by Colonel St. John and Sir Horace Mann. Marshal Botta made a Compliment to his Royal Highness; by Order and in the Name of the Emperor, with Offers of an Apartment in one of his Imperial Majesty's Palaces, his Coaches, and every Thing that could be for his Royal Highness's Service and Amusement; which the Duke declined. In the Evening, many Ladies, who, by his Royal Highness's Permission, had been invited, were presented, and the Assembly was very numerous. The next Morning the Duke took a Tour about the Town in his Coach, in an Undress, and called upon Marshal Botta, who received him at the Bottom of the Stairs. The same Day his Royal Highness admitted all the English to dine with him; and the Day after the Members of the Regency, Foreign Ministers, &c. The Duke having heard that the Marshal had said, that out of Respect he could not take the Liberty to invite him to Dinner, but was very ambitious of having that Honor, his Royal Highness sent him Word, that he would dine with him Yesterday, being the Festival of the Arch-duke. In the Evening the Marshal made a great Assembly for the Ladies, at which his Royal Highness assisted.

Turin, March 24. This Court has lately had a great Loss in the Marquis de Breille, who died a few Days ago, in about his 80th Year. He was Master of the Horse to his Sardinian Majesty, Father of the Bailly de Solar, his Ambassador at Paris, and had himself served this Court, in a publick Character, many Years, with distinguished Abilities, at Vienna and other Places.

Franckfort, March 27. The Elector of Cologne arrived here the 25th, at Three in the Afternoon, amidst a vast Concourse of People of all Ranks that went to meet his Electoral Highness. About Four o'Clock the Elector of Treves visited his Highness without Ceremony; and, soon after he was gone, the Elector of Mentz came in the same Manner.

Yesterday Morning the Electoral Ambassadors went in Ceremony to wait on his Electoral Highness, which employed him till Dinner: After which, the Elector waited on the Emperor at Heisenstamm, and on his Return, he repaid the Visits of the Electors of Mentz and Treves.

This Day the Archduke Joseph has been unanimously elected King of the Romans. The Emperor, with the King of the Romans, will make their Entry into this City the 29th; and the Coronation is fixed to the 3d of April.

It is said the Emperor will set out hence the 10th of next Month; arrive at Molck the Thursday in the Holy Week; and make his Publick Entry into Vienna on Easter Tuesday.

Hague, March 30. We expect here in a few Days the young Prince of Aversperg from Franckfort, in his Way to England, where he is to notify to the British Court, the Election of the King of the Romans.

Hamburg, March 30. The Regency of Kiel having transmitted to M. de Bredahl his Credentials as Minister Plenipotentiary from the Grand Duke of Russia to the Circle of Lower Saxony, he presented the same on the 26th Instant, in the usual Manner, to the Senate.
