Venice, March 30.

THE Senate having sent out new Inquisitors into the Venetian State, there are no more Complaints now of the Want of Corn, as they have found great Quantities in the private Granaries, which they have distributed, and ordered the Markets to be constantly supplied with it. All the neighbouring Countries of Italy are in great Want.

Florence, March 31. His Royal Highness the Duke of York intends to make a Visit to Leghorne on Tuesday, and to return hither at the End of the Week.

Liege, April 7. Yesterday about Noon arrived here the Courier, who has been so long expected, from Rome, with the Grant of the Administration Spiritual and Temporal of this Bishoprick; which the Pope has given to our new Prince Count Oultremont. Accordingly, his Highness will be conducted To-morrow in Ceremony to the Palace, and take the Reins of the Government into his Hands, to the great Joy of all his Subjects.

St. James's, March 31.

Information having been given, that several of His Majesty's Subjects, in the underwritten List particularly mentioned, have been for a considerable Time; and are now detained in France as Hostages for the Payment of Ransom Bills, which have not yet been satisfied; These are to give Notice, that in Case such Ransom-Bills are not forthwith discharged, Prosecutions will be commenced in His Majesty's Court of Admiralty against all Masters, Owners, and others, unjustly refusing or neglecting to pay the Sums of Money stipulated for the Release of those unfortunate Persons, who have suffered so long an Imprisonment.
