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Westminster, April 19.

**T**HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Septimus Robinson, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

*An Act for establishing an Agreement with the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, for raising certain Sums of Money towards the Supply for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-four, and for more effectually preventing the forging Powers to transfer such Stock, or receive such Dividends or Annuities, as are therein mentioned, and the fraudulent personating the Owners thereof.*

*An Act for raising a certain Sum of Money by Loans or Exchequer Bills, and for applying certain Monies remaining in the Exchequer, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-four; and for Application of certain Savings of Public Monies, and of Monies arisen by the Sale of Military Stores; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament; and for Relief of Persons who have omitted to insert, in Indentures or other Writings, the full Sum agreed to be paid with Clerks, Apprentices, and other Servants.*

*An Act for charging on the Sinking Fund, certain Annuities granted by an Act passed in the First Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, and for carrying the Duties therein mentioned, to the said Fund; and also for consolidating such of the said Annuities as are granted for a certain Term of Years irredeemable, with other Annuities, granted by an Act, passed in the Second Year of His present Majesty's Reign.*

*An Act for preventing Frauds and Abuses in relation to the sending and receiving of Letters and Packets free from the Duty of Postage.*

*An Act for continuing several Acts of Parliament, made for the Encouragement of the Whale Fishery carried on by His Majesty's Subjects.*

*An Act for the Encouragement of the Whale Fishery, in the Gulph and River of St Lawrence, and on the Coasts of His Majesty's Colonies in America.*

*An Act for granting a Bounty upon the Importation of Hemp and rough and undressed Flax from His Majesty's Colonies in America.*

*An Act for granting, for a limited Time, a Liberty to carry Rice from His Majesty's Provinces of South Carolina and Georgia, directly to any Part of America to the Southward of the said Provinces, subject to the like Duty, as is now paid on the Exportation of Rice, from the said Colonies, to Places in Europe situate to the Southward of Cape Finisferre.*

*An Act for importing Salt from Europe, into the Province of Quebec in America, for a limited Time.*

*An Act for vesting the Fort of Senegal, and its Dependencies, in the Company of Merchants trading to Africa.*

*An Act to explain and amend an Act, passed in the Second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to explain, amend, and reduce into one Act of Parliament, the several Laws now in Being, relating to the raising and training the Militia, within that Part of Great Britain called England.*

*An Act for applying the Money, granted in this Session of Parliament, for defraying the Charge of the Pay and Cloathing of the Militia of that Part of Great Britain called England, for One Year, beginning the 25th Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-four.*

*An Act for making Compensation to the Proprietors of such Lands and Hereditaments as have been purchased upon the Sea Coasts, in the Counties of Kent, Suffex, and Southampton, on which Forts and Batteries have been erected for Defence of the said Coasts, in Purjuance of an Act passed in the Second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.*

*An Act to empower the High Court of Chancery to lay out, upon proper Securities, a further Sum of Money, not exceeding a Sum therein limited, out of the Common and General Cash in the Bank of England, belonging to the Suitors of the said Court; and for applying the Interest arising therefrom, towards answering the Charges of the Office of the Accountant-General of the said Court.*

*An Act to indemnify such Persons as have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments, and to indemnify Justices of the Peace, Deputy Lieutenants, and Officers of the Militia, or others, who have omitted to register, or deliver in, their Qualifications, within the Time limited by Law, and for giving further Time for those Purposes; and to indemnify Members and Officers in Cities, Corporations, and Borough Towns, whose Admissions have been omitted to be stamped, according to the several Acts of Parliament now in Force for that Purpose, or, having been stamped, have been lost or mislaid, and for allowing them Time to provide Admissions duly stamped; and to prevent the Destruction of Trees and Underwoods growing in Forests and Chases.*

*An Act for allowing further Time for Inrollments of Deeds and Wills made by Papists, and for Relief of Protestant Purchasers.*

*An Act for preventing Inconveniencies arising in Cases of Merchants and such other Persons as are within the Description of the Statutes relating to Bankrupts, being intituled to Privilege of Parliament, and becoming insolvent.*

*An Act to continue an Act, made in the Fifth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act to prevent the Committing of Frauds by*

by Bankrupts; and for extending the Law relating to Hackney Coaches to the Counties of Kent and Essex.

An Act to enable His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order the Importation of Provision from Ireland, during the next Recess of Parliament, under certain Restrictions and Regulations therein mentioned.

An Act to prevent Paper Bills of Credit, hereafter to be issued in any of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America, from being declared to be a legal Tender in Payments of Money; and to prevent the legal Tender of such Bills as are now subsisting, from being prolonged beyond the Periods limited for calling in and sinking the same.

An Act for taking and swearing Affidavits, to be made Use of in any of the Courts of the County Palatine of Durham.

An Act to explain, amend, and render more effectual, Two several Acts of Parliament, made in the Second and Third Years of His present Majesty, for paving, cleansing, and lighting the Squares, Streets, and Lanes, within the City and Liberty of Westminster, and other Places therein mentioned, and for preventing Annoyances therein; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for the more easy and speedy Recovery of small Debts, within the Borough and Soke of Doncaster in the County of York, and for lighting the Streets, Lanes, and other open Passages and Places, within the said Borough.

An Act for the more easy and speedy Recovery of small Debts, in the Town and Parish of Kirkby in Kendal, in the County of Westmorland.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Beverley to Kexby Bridge, in the County of York.

An Act for continuing and enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, intituled, An Act for repairing and widening the Road leading from Piper's Inn, in the Parish of Ashcott in the County of Somerset, to and through Glastonbury and Wells, to the White Post, in the Great Western Road to the City of Bath, and from Wells to Rusby Hill, leading to the City of Bristol; and for repairing and widening several other Roads, leading from the City of Wells.

An Act for explaining and amending an Act, made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for amending, widening, and repairing, the Road leading from Dover, to Barham Downs, in the County of Kent; and also for amending, widening, and repairing, the Road leading from Cowgate and Archcliffe Fort, in Dover, through Folkstone, to the Town of Hythe in the said County.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of so much of an Act of the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for repairing and widening several Roads, therein described, leading from the Town of Tewkesbury, in the County of Gloucester, as relates to the First District of the Roads therein mentioned; and for amending the Road from Comb Hill, to a Bridge near Norton Mill, in the County of Gloucester, and from Eckington Bridge, to join the Turnpike Road which leads from Upton on Severn, to Pershore in the County of Worcester.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads, from Spalding High Bridge, to the Market Place in Donington, and from the Tenth Mile Stone, in the Parish of Gosbertown, to the Eighth Mile Stone, in the Parish of Wigtoft, in the County of Lincoln.

An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads leading from the Bucks-Head, at Watling-Street, to Beckbury, and the New Inn; and from the Birches Brook, to the Hand-Post, in the Parish of Kemberton, in the County of Salop.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road leading from Ashborne, in the County of Derby, over Belpar Bridge, to the present Turnpike Road from Sheffield and Chesterfield, to Derby, at or near a Place called Open-

wood Gate, and from Belpar Bridge, to Ripley, in the County of Derby.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road, from Bramcote Odd House, in the County of Nottingham, to the Cross Post, upon Smalley Common, in the County of Derby, and from Ilkeston, to the Towns of Heanor, and Shipley, in the said County of Derby, and from Trowell in the County of Nottingham, to the Town of Nottingham.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads, from Melton Mowbray, in the County of Leicester, to the Guide Post, in St Margaret's Field, Leicester, and from the Town of Leicester, to the Town of Lutterworth, in the said County, and other Roads therein mentioned.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road, from Scots Dyke, in the County of Dumfries, by or through the Villages of Langholm and Hawick, to Haremsis, in the County of Roxburgh.

An Act to amend and render more effectual, Two several Acts, passed in the Twenty-fourth and Twenty-eighth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty, for repairing the High Roads in the County of Edinburgh, to and from the City of Edinburgh, and from Crammond Bridge, to the Town of Queensferry, in the County of Linlithgow.

An Act for repairing several Roads leading from the Town of Bideford, in the County of Devon.

An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads leading from the Town of Cardiff, and several other Towns and Places in the County of Glamorgan.

An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor in the Hundred of Musford, and Lothingland, in the County of Suffolk.

An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor, in the Hundreds of Loddon and Clavering, in the County of Norfolk.

An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor, in the Hundred of Wangford, in the County of Suffolk.

An Act for the better paving of the Streets and Lanes, and for preventing Nuisances, and other Annoyances, in that Part of the Parish of Portsea, in the County of Southampton, commonly called Portsmouth Common.

An Act for the better establishing a Manufactory of Cambricks and Lawns, or Goods of the Kind usually known under those Denominations, now carrying on at Winchelsea, in the County of Sussex; and for improving, regulating, and extending, the Manufactory of Cambricks and Lawns, or Goods of the Kind usually known under those Denominations, in that Part of Great Britain called England.

An Act for the better supplying the Town of Knareborough, and that Part of the Township of Scriven with Tenter-Gate adjoining upon the said Town, with Water.

And to Twenty-six Private Bills.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most Gracious Speech.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I Cannot put an End to this Session of Parliament, without returning you My Thanks for the prudent and salutary Measures which you have taken to extend the Commerce, and to secure the Happiness of My Kingdoms.

The Assurances which I have received of the pacifick Disposition of the several Powers with whom We were lately at War, and of their Resolution to adhere inviolably to the Terms of the late Treaty, promise the Continuance of Peace Abroad; and the firm and temperate Exertion of your Authority, joined to the constitutional and publick spirited Conduct which you have manifested on every Occasion during the present Session, will, I trust, establish at Home

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due Obedience to the Laws, Reverence to the Legislature, and domestick Union.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

I thank you for the Supplies which you have so cheerfully and unanimously granted. The ample Provision you have made for the several Services recommended to you, and especially for maintaining My Fleet in a respectable State, will, I am confident, preserve to this Nation its proper Weight and Influence, and give Strength and Security to all My Dominions.

The wise Regulations which have been established to augment the Publick Revenues; to unite the Interests of the most distant Possessions of My Crown, and to encourage and secure their Commerce with Great Britain, call for My hearty Approbation.

Your Regard to Publick Credit, in discharging a Part of the heavy Debt contracted and unprovided for during the late War, without imposing on this Kingdom the Burthen of any new Taxes, is particularly pleasing to Me, from the tender Concern which I feel for My People.

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

It is the proper Employment of this Season of Tranquility, to consider of the most effectual Means for perfecting those Works of Peace, and Plans of Publick Utility, which have been so wisely and happily begun.

I recommend these important Objects to your Consideration during the Recess. You may depend upon My constant Endeavours for the Success of these good Purposes, as I shall ever esteem it My truest Glory, to employ that Power with which the Constitution hath entrusted Me; in promoting your real Interests, and lasting Happiness.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said:

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

**I***t is His Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, that this Parliament be prorogued to Thursday the 21st Day of June next; to be then here held; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday the 21st Day of June next.*

*Extract of a Letter from Sir William Johnson, dated at Johnson Hall, March 2, 1764.*

**I***t gives me great Pleasure that I can now inform you of the Success of the first Party of Indians, whom I lately sent out; an Express being just arrived with Letters, acquainting me, that on the 26th ult. in the Evening, near the main Branch of Susquehanna, as they were pursuing their Rout, they received Advice; that a large Party of our Enemies the Delawars were encamped at a small Distance, on their Way to attack some of the Settlements hereabouts; upon which Intelligence they made an expeditionary March to their Encampment, which they surrounded at Day-Break; then rushing upon the Delawars (who were surpris'd, and unable to make a Defence) they made them all Prisoners to the Number of 41, including their Chief Captain Bull, Son to Teedyuscung, and one who has discovered great Inveteracy against the English, and led several Parties against them during the present Indian War: They are all fast bound, and may be expected here, under an Escort, in a few Days.*

*The Following is an Account, sent by Major Adams, in a Letter dated at the Camp before Mongbeer, the 5th of October, 1763, to the late Earl of Egmont, of the late Military Transactions in these Parts.*

**A****F****T****E****R** the treacherous Murder of Mr. Amyatt, and other Gentlemen in his Com-

pany, on the 3d of July, at Murshudabad, by the Order of the Nabob Cossim Ali Cawn, I took the Field, by the Order of the President and Council of Fort William; with His Majesty's 84th Regiment of Foot, 150 of the Company's Forces, Two Troops of European Cavalry, One of Black Cavalry, Ten Companies of Seapoys, and 12 Pieces of Cannon; and on the 10th proclaimed Jaffair Ali Cawn, Nabob of the Provinces of Bengal, Bahar, and Oriza, as had been done some Days before at Fort William.

On the 11th, Six Companies of our Seapoys, with one Piece of Cannon, on their March from Birdawan to join the Army, were attacked near Cutwa by a numerous Body of the Enemy's Cavalry, who, by repeated Efforts, broke our Seapoys three Times; but, by the prudent Disposition and gallant Behaviour of Lieut. Glenn, who commanded them, the Enemy were at last obliged to retire with considerable Loss. I immediately ordered an advanced Party, which consisted of 50 European Infantry, a Troop of Cavalry, 3 Companies of Seapoys, and 2 Pieces of Cannon, commanded by Captain Long, of His Majesty's 84th Regiment, to join Lieutenant Glenn, and dispossess the Enemy of the Village of Cutwa. They accordingly, on the 14th, attacked the Enemy, and, after a very obstinate Resistance, obliged them to quit the Place with great Loss, leaving Three Pieces of Cannon.

On the 16th, I crossed the Cossambazar River, with the Army, at Agardup, and, on the 19th in the Morning, I attacked the Enemy, who were drawn out at Ballassara ready to receive me, opposite to the Fort of Cutwa, having thrown up an Intrenchment with several Pieces of Cannon in Front of their Right, and having on their Left a marshy Ground. Perceiving their Disposition, I made a Motion to their Right, in order to attack their Left Flank, which was open. This Movement obliged them to alter their whole Disposition; and immediately 2500 Patan Horse, and 1000 Seapoys, marched out to attack our Right Wing, which they did with great Resolution, and bore our Cannonade very well, till within 50 Yards of us; when our Grape, and a Discharge of Musquetry, obliged them to fly with Precipitation; as did likewise their main Body. Our Seapoys and Cavalry pursued them with great Slaughter; they ran towards the City of Murshudabad, leaving us all the Cannon; and likewise abandoned the Fort of Cutwa on the opposite Side of the River. By the best Accounts I could get, the Enemy were about 10,000 Horse and Foot, and they had 7 or 800 killed, with their Commanding Officer Mahamud Tuchy Cawn. I proceeded after the Fugitives, and arrived within two Miles of the City on the 23d, and determined to attack them immediately though considerably reinforced, and strongly entrenched. But finding that their Entrenchments were 14 or 15 Feet high, and well defended with Cannon, and that it would be impossible to get Possession of them in the Face of an Enemy without a considerable Loss, I therefore thought it advisable to make Use of a Feint, and accordingly ordered a small Detachment to advance towards the South Part of their Works, where they had collected their principal Force, in order to amuse them, whilst I marched the Army, at Two in the Morning of the 24th, round to the North East; and at Day-light, attacked that Part of their Works where they had but a slight Guard, and which they soon abandoned, as well as the City, and retired towards Sooree, leaving us all their Cannon.

I then proceeded to Saddockhang, where I halted Four Days to refresh the Army, greatly fatigued by excessive hard Duty, and almost incessant Rains. Here I received Advice, that the Factory of Docca, which

which had been taken some Days before by Cassim Ali Cawn's People, was retaken by Mess. Grant, and Swinton's Battalions of Seapoys, and that the latter was ordered with his Battalion to join me immediately.

On the 20th, I again crossed the Cossimbuzar River at Nassapon, and was joined at Mahamudhore, by Major Carnac with 100 Europeans, one Battalion of Seapoys, one Troop of Black Cavalry, and 2 Pieces of Cannon from Bardawan.

August the 1st, I crossed Nuncas Nullas, which separated us from the Enemy, over which I immediately ordered Bridges to be thrown; and at Four in the Morning of the 2d, I marched the Army over, leaving the Baggage on an Island, formed by the Two Nullas, defended by a Party of Seapoys and one Piece of Cannon. Between Seven and Eight o'Clock I came within Sight of the Enemy's whole Army, drawn up in Order of Battle, much more numerous than I expected: 8000 Seapoys, 20000 Horse, and 20 Pieces of Cannon, besides Match-lock and Rocket Men, composed their Army, according to the best Accounts I could get: The Artillery were all mounted in the English Manner, and served by 200 Europeans, of those taken at Patna, of which one Company were Artillery Men: And their Seapoys were armed, clothed, and accoutered like our own. The whole was divided into Brigades, and posted in a very advantageous Manner. I immediately began to form, and moved up within a very small Distance of the Enemy, without receiving a Shot; neither did they begin to cannonade till I began the Attack; a Circumstance never before known in India. After a very obstinate Dispute of near four Hours, they retired, leaving me all their Cannon. Their Cavalry charged the 84th Regiment, when separated from the main Body, with uncommon Resolution, in Front and Rear, three several Times, within twenty Yards; which having obliged the Battalion to change its Face, the Enemy was repelled with considerable Execution. About 2000 of the Enemy lay dead on the Field of Battle, 80 Europeans, Foreigners, immediately came off to us, and 150 Boats, laden with military Stores, fell into our Hands. The English of the Patna Detachment would not insist in Cassim Ali Cawn's Service. They were therefore kept Prisoners at Mongheer.

The Enemy retired to Auda Nulla, a Post which they had been fortifying for some Time, and remarkably strong by Nature; having in Front a very considerable Swamp, and protected on one Flank by the Mountains, and on the other by the River. Here they threw up a Work, and mounted upwards of 100 Pieces of Cannon, having a very deep Ditch in Front 54 Feet broad, and full of Water, except towards the Hills. We had no other Method of carrying on Approaches towards it, but on the Bank of the River, on Account of the Swamp. The Breadth of the dry Ground did not exceed 200 Yards. On the 21st of August I encamped within 3000 Yards of the Enemy's Works, and began to throw up an Entrenchment to protect the Camp from any Attempts of the Enemy's Cavalry, that my Attention might not be taken off from the Siege. On the 24th, at Night, I advanced an Approach under the Bank of the River, and erected a Redoubt for the Protection of the Trenches, within 1200 Yards of the Enemy's Works; into which I ordered 120 Europeans, 300 Seapoys, and 3 Pieces of Cannon. On the 25th, at Noon, the Enemy marched out a considerable Body of Seapoys to attack it, who were permitted to advance within 100 Yards, when they received such a warm Fire, as to oblige them to retreat, leaving about 100 killed and wounded on the Spot. On the 27th our Approaches were carried on 450 Yards farther, and a Redoubt similar to the former was finished. But I

could not get the grand Battery completed before the 3d of September, on Account of the Difficulty of getting Materials, and the Badness of the Weather. This Battery I opened in the Morning with four 18 Pounders, two 12 Pounders, 4 Howitzers, and 1 Royal, at about 500 Yards Distance; at which Time the Enemy marched out to attack our Encampment in Front and Rear, but were easily repulsed. On the 4th, finding that our Fire had no great Effect on the Enemy's mud Work, and that there was no Possibility of carrying it by the River, but by advancing our Approaches, and filling the Ditch; and that the Enemy's principal Attention was taken up with our present Attack, thinking that Part of their Works towards the Hills, quite secure by the large Lake and Swamp in Front, I determined to attack that Part in the Morning, and accordingly ordered the two Companies of European Grenadiers, a Company of French Volunteers, and 500 Grenadier Seapoys, to march at Three in the Morning, commanded by Captain Irwin, of His Majesty's 84th Regiment; to whose Prudence, and Perseverance, the Success of the Attempt is principally owing. They were supported by 1000 Seapoys, and Two Pieces of Cannon; and the whole Line to follow and support them. This was accordingly put into Execution in the Morning; and we got Possession of their whole Works, with a great deal of Fatigue, but little Loss in Proportion to the Importance of the Enterprize. The Numbers of the Enemy that were slain, is incredible; and the Number drowned, far exceeded the Slain. About 14 or 1500 Horse were made Prisoners, whom, after taking their Horses and Arms from them, I sent about their Business; the First Instance of the Kind, ever known in this Country. Their Confusion and Terror is inconceivable: The Roads, particularly at every Piece of Water, are strewed with dead Carcasses; and they have never attempted to make any Stand, till we arrived here Yesterday; though many Places are fortified by Nature, and require very little artificial Assistance to render them impregnable, particularly the Pass of Tiriagully, where they had mounted 13 Pieces of Cannon, all which they abandoned on the Approach of our advanced Guard.

Cassim Ali Cawn is retired with the principal Remains of his Army to Patna, leaving a Garrison of 2000 Seapoys in this Place, which I hope to be Master of in a few Days. Before he set out, he left 4000 Horse, and 1000 Matchlocks here, with Orders to harass us during the Siege, by attacking our Rear. On our Approach, they retired to Carrickpore, about 11 Coss Distance in the Hills; to which Place I, on the 2d Instant at Night, ordered two Battalions of Seapoys, and two Pieces of Cannon, to attack and drive them from thence, which they effected with great Ease, and returned this Day to Camp.

During our Attack at Auda Nulla, a considerable Detachment of Horse and Foot, under the Command of Camgor Cawn, proceeded down to Beerboon, through the Hills, in order to enter the Birdwan Province. They were retarded for some Time by Captain M'Lean, with a small Detachment of Seapoys, and two Pieces of Cannon; but, by my last Accounts from thence, I hear that Camgor Cawn has given him the Slip, and entered the Birdwan Country, to the Westward of him. I have ordered Major Carnac down thither, who, in a few Days, with the Reinforcement just arrived from Madras, will, I doubt not, be able to give a good Account of them.

The next Stand that the Enemy will make, it is said, will be at Patna. Cassim Ali Cawn has a great deal of Money, and pays his People well, who are all Soldiers of Fortune, and have no Connections in the Country, being chiefly Persians and Mogul Tartars, who, on Account of the Troubles in their own Country, are obliged to seek a Refuge here. He is

a cunning artful Politician, but will never venture himself in the Field, well knowing that his People will fight much better than if he was himself present.

The Armenians and some Europeans have had the principal Hand in bringing his Artillery to so great Perfection, and forming and disciplining his Seapoys.

I have the Honour to inclose to your Lordship, a Return of the Killed and Wounded in the several Engagements, and of the Artillery and Stores taken from the Enemy.

All Letters and Packets, not exceeding the Weight of Two Ounces, sent from and to any Places within Ireland, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before or after any Summons or Prorogation, which shall be signed on the Outside by any Member of either House of the Parliament of Ireland, and whereof the whole Supercription shall be of his own Hand Writing, or which shall be directed to a Member of either House, from any Part of Great Britain or Ireland, at any of the Places of his usual Residence, or at the Place where he shall actually be at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at either House of Parliament.

All such Letters and Packets as shall be sent from and to certain Persons by Virtue of their Offices, under such Conditions, Restrictions, and Limitations, as in the said Act is particularly expressed.

It is likewise Enacted, That all printed Votes, or Proceedings in Parliament, or printed News Papers, sent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides, signed on the Outside thereof, by the Hand of any Member of Parliament, in such Manner as hath been heretofore practised; or directed to any Member at any Place whereof he shall have given Notice in Writing to the Postmaster-General, or to his Deputy at Edinburgh or Dublin respectively, shall pass free of Postage.

And also, That the Clerks in the Offices of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and certain Officers in the Office of His Majesty's Postmaster-General, may continue to Frank such printed Votes, and Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers, in the Manner they have heretofore been accustomed, provided they be sent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides.

It is further Enacted, That any Officer employed under the Postmaster-General, shall have Power to examine and search any Packet sent without a Cover, or in a Cover open at the Sides, in Order to discover whether any other Paper or Thing whatsoever be inclosed or concealed in or with such printed Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers; and in Case any such other Paper or Thing whatsoever, shall be found in or with such printed Paper, or in Case there shall be any Writing, other than the Supercription upon such printed Paper, or upon the Cover thereof, the whole of such Packet shall be charged with the Duty of Postage.

And it is further Enacted, That if any Person shall, after the First Day of June next, counterfeit the Hand Writing of any Person whatsoever in the Supercription of any Letter, or Packet, to be sent by the Post, in Order thereby to avoid the Payment of the Duty of Postage, every Person so offending, shall be deemed Guilty of Felony, and be transported for Seven Years.

P. at the Corner; and in Case any Letter or Packet, not exceeding the Weight of Two Ounces, should after every Precaution, happen to be charged, all Postmasters are hereby directed, immediately to remit the Postage to such Member, who is desired to return the Cover, when it can be conveniently done, as a Voucher to the Postmaster, in passing of his Accounts with this Office.

And whereas great Numbers of Letters are privately collected and delivered contrary to Law, to the Prejudice of the Revenue of this Office; all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Wherry-men, Dispersers of News Papers, Higlers, and all other Persons whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal collecting, conveying, or delivering of Letters and Packets, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity.
