St. James's, April 24.

THIS Day His Majesty was pleased to fill up the vacant Stall, at Westminster, of the most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

The Sovereign having put on the Ribbon with the Symbol of the Order hanging to it, the Gentleman Usher bearing the Red Rod, and habited in the Mantle of the Order, introduced the Lord Clive, (a Gentleman Usher Daily Waiter carrying the Sword of State) who kneeling, was knighted with the Sword of State: Then the Earl of Breadalbane, having received the Ribbon, with the Badge of the Order, from the Gentleman Usher, (Bath King of Arms being absent) presented the same to the Sovereign, who put the Ribbon over Lord Clive's Right Shoulder, he still kneeling: Then his Lordship had the Honor of kissing His Majesty's Hand; which done, he rose up and withdrew.

The Ceremony was performed in His Majesty's Closet, several of the Great Officers of the Court attending.

Madrid, April 9. Last Saturday the 7th, his Catholic Majesty and all the Court returned from the Pardo to Madrid.

Copenhagen, April 14. General Count d'Ablefeldt, Governor of this Capital, is appointed to command the Citadel also. A new built Man of War of 60 Guns was launched on Monday last, and is called the Wilhelmina Carolina, in Honor of her Royal Highness the Princess of that Name, Second Daughter to his Danish Majesty.

Berlin, April 17. Yesterday Morning the King of Prussia arrived from Potsdam, and gave an Audience to Count Scaffgotsch, who was sent from Frankfort to notify the Election of the King of the Romans; and returned to Potsdam the same Evening.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Mansfeldt Cardouel, Alexander le Grand, Joseph Tuder, and George Clerk Maxwell, Esqrs. together with Basil Cochrane, Esq; in the room of Robert Montgomerie, Esq; to be Commissioners for the Receipt and Management of His Majesty's Customs and other Duties, in that Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland; and of the Duties on Salt and Rock-Salt imported, and upon Salt made there.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint George Drummond, Alexander Udny, Richard Dauber, and George Burges, Esqrs. together with Thomas Lockhart, Esq; in the Room of Basil Cochrane, Esq; to be Commissioners for the Receipt and Management of His Majesty's Revenues of Excise in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland.

Leicester House, April 25.

This Day the Prince of Aversperg, sent from the Emperor to notify the Coronation of the King of the Romans, had a Private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.

To which he was introduced by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

General Post-Office, April 20, 1764.

PUBLIC Notice is hereby given, That by an Act passed this last Session of Parliament, entitled, An Act for preventing Frauds and Abuses, in relation to the sending and receiving of Letters and Packets free from the Duty of Postage;

It is Enacted, That from and after the First Day of May next, so long as the Revenue of the Post-Office shall continue to make a Part of the Aggregate Fund, no Letters or Packets shall be exempted from Payment of Postage, except as follows:

All such as shall be sent from or to The King's most Excellent Majesty.

All Letters and Packets, not exceeding the Weight of Two Ounces, sent from and to any Places within Great Britain or Ireland, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before or after any summons or Prorogation, which shall be signed on the Outside by any Member of either House of the Parliament of Great Britain, and whereof the whole Supercription shall be of his own Hand Writing, or which shall be directed to a Member of either House, at any of the Places of his usual Residence, or at the Place where he shall actually be at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at either House of Parliament.

All Letters and Packets, not exceeding the Weight of Two Ounces, sent from and to any Places within Ireland, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before or after any Summons or Prorogation, which shall be signed on the Outside by any Member of either House of the Parliament of Ireland, and whereof the whole Supercription shall be of his own Hand Writing, or which shall be directed to a Member of either House, from any Part of Great Britain or Ireland, at any of the Places of his usual Residence, or at the Place where he shall actually be at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at either House of Parliament.

All such Letters and Packets as shall be sent from and to certain Persons by Virtue of their Offices, under such Conditions, Restrictions, and Limitations, as in the said Act is particularly expressed.

It is likewise Enacted, That all printed Votes, or Proceedings in Parliament, or printed News Papers, sent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides, signed on the Outside thereof, by the Hand of any Member of Parliament, in such Manner as hath been heretofore practised; or directed to any Member at any Place whereof he shall have given Notice in Writing to the Postmaster-General, or to his Deputy at Edinburgh or Dublin respectively, shall pass free of Postage.

And also, That the Clerks in the Offices of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and certain Officers in the Office of His Majesty's Postmaster-General, may continue to Frank such printed Votes, and Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers, in the Manner they have heretofore been accustomed, provided they be sent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides.

It is further Enacted, That any Officer employed under the Postmaster-General, shall have Power to examine and search any Packet sent without a Cover, or in a Cover open at the Sides, in Order to discover whether any other Paper or Thing whatsoever be inclosed or concealed in or with such printed Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers; and in Case any such other Paper or Thing whatsoever, shall be found in or with such printed Paper, or in Case there shall be any Writing, other than the Supercription upon such printed Paper, or upon the Cover thereof, the whole of such Packet shall be charged with the Duty of Postage.

And it is further Enacted, That if any Person shall, after the First Day of June next, counterfeit the Hand Writing of any Person whatsoever in the Supercription of any Letter, or Packet, to be sent by the Post, in Order thereby to avoid the Payment of the Duty of Postage, every Person so offending, shall be deemed

Guilty of Felony, and be transported for Seven Years.

And whereas many Letters directed to Members, are, in the Hurry of Business, charged with Postage, chiefly for Want of the Words, Member of Parliament, being added to the Supercription: It is therefore desired, that all Persons corresponding with Members, would make that Addition, or distinguish them by M. P. at the Corner; and in Case any Letter or Packet, not exceeding the Weight of Two Ounces, should after every Precaution, happen to be charged, all Postmasters are hereby directed, immediately to remit the Postage to such Member, who is desired to return the Cover, when it can be conveniently done, as a Voucher to the Postmaster, in passing of his Accounts with this Office.

And whereas great Numbers of Letters are privately collected and delivered contrary to Law, to the Prejudice of the Revenue of this Office; all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Wherrymen, Dispersers of News Papers, Higlens, and all other Persons whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal collecting, conveying, or delivering of Letters and Packets, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity. The Penalty is Five Pounds for every Letter so collected or delivered, contrary to Law, and One Hundred Pounds for every Week such Practice is continued: One Moiety to His Majesty, and the other to the Informer.
