General Post-Office, April 20, 1764. **DUBLIC** Notice is hereby given, That by an Act passed this last Session of Parliament,

entitled, An Aft for preventing Frauds and Abuses, in relation to the fending and receiving of Letters and Packets free from the Duty of Poltage

It is Enacted, That from and after the First Day of May next, fc long as the Revenue of the Post Office shall continue to make a Part of the Aggregate Fund, no Letters or Packets shall be exempted from Payment of Poftage, except as follows:

All fuch as shall be fent from or to 'The King's most Excellent Majefty.

All Letters and Packets, not exceding the Weight of Two Ounces, fent from and to any Places within Great Britain or Ireland, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before or after any Summons or Prorogation, which shall be figned on the Outfide by any Member of either Houfe of the Parliament of Great Britain, and whereof the whole Superfcription shall be of his own Hand Writing, or which shall be directed to a Member of either House, at any of the Places of his usual Refidence, or at the Place where he shall actually be at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at either House of Parliament.

All Letters and Packets, not exceding the Weight of Two Ounces, fent from and to any Places within Ireland, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before or after any Summons or Prorogation, which shall be figned on the Outside by any Member of either House of the Parliament of Ireland, and whereof the whole Superfcription shall be of his

own Hand Writing, or which shall be directed to a Member of either House, from any Part of Great Britain or Ireland, at any of the Places of his usual Refidence, or at the Place where he shall actually be at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at either Houfe of Parliament.

All fuch Letters and Packets as shall be fent from and to certain Perfons by Virtue of their Offices, under fuch Conditions, Restrictions, and Limitations, as in the faid Act is particularly expressed.

It is likewise Enacted, That all printed Votes, or Proceedings in Parliament, or printed News Papers, fent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides, figned on the Outlide thereof, by the Hand of any Member of Parliament, in fuch Manner as hath been heretofore practifed; or directed to any Member at any Place whereof he shall have given Notice in Writing to the Postmaster-General, or to his Deputy at Edinburgh or Dublin respectively, shall pass free of Postage.

And alfo, That the Clerks in the Offices of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and certain Officers in the Office of His Majesty's Postmaster-General, may continue to Frank fuch printed Votes, and Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers, in the Manner they have heretofore been accuftomed, provided they be fent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides.

It is further Enacted, That any Officer employed under the Poftmaster-General, shall have Power to examine and fearch any Packet fent without a Cover, or in a Cover open at the Sides, in Order to discover whether any other Paper or Thing whatfoever be inclofed or concealed in or with fuch printed Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers; and in Cafe any fuch other Paper or Thing whatfoever, shall be found in or with such printed Paper, or in Cafe there shall be any Writing, other than the Superscription upon such printed Paper, or upon the Cover thereof, the whole of fuch Packet shall be charged with the Duty of Postage.

And it is further Enacted, That if any Perlon shall, after the First Day of June next, counterfeit the Hand Writing of any Perfon whatfover in the Superfeription of any Letter, or Packet, to be fent by the Post, in Order thereby to avoid the Payment of the Duty of Postage, every Person fo offending, shall be deemed Guilty of Felony, and be transported for Seven Years.

And whereas many Letters directed to Members, are, in the Hurry of Business, charged with Postage, chiefly for Want of the Words, Member of Parlia-ment, being added to the Superfcription : It is therefore defired, that all Perfons corresponding with Members, would make that Addition, or diffinguish them by M. P. at the Corner ; and in Cale any Letter or Packet, not exceeding the Weight of Two Ounces, should after every Precaution, happen to be charged, all Postmasters are hereby directed, immediately to remit the Postage to such Member, who is defired to return the Cover, when it can be conveniently done, as a Voucher to the Postmaster, in passing of his Accounts with this Office.

And whereas great Numbers of Letters are privately collected and delivered contrary to Law, to the Pre-judice of the Revenue of this Office; all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Wherrymen, Disperfers of News Papers, Higlers, and all other Perfons whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal collecting, conveying, or delivering of Letters and Packets, will be profecuted with the utmost Severity. The Penalty is Five Pounds for every Letter fo collected or delivered, contrary to Law, and One Hundred Pounds for every Week fuch Practice is continued : One Moiety to His Majefty, and the other to the Informer.
