All Letters and Packets, not exceding the Weight of Two Ounces, fent from and to any Places within Ireland, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before or after any Summons or Prorogation, which shall be figned on the Outfide by any Member of either Houfe of the Parliament of Ireland, and whereof the whole Superfcription shall be of his own Hand Writing, or which shall be directed to a Member of either Houfe, from any Part of Great Britain or Ireland, at any of the Places of his ufual Refidence, or at the Place where he shall actually be at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at either Houfe of Parliament.
