St. James's, June 4. HIS Day being the Anniversary of the King's Birth-Day, there was a very numerous and brilliant Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty on that Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there was a Ball at Court, and Bonfiles, Illuminations, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

This Day the Prince of Aversperg, sent from the · Emperor to notify the Coronation of the King of the Romans, had an Audience of Leave;

And the Baron de Nolcken, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sweden, had a Private Andience

of His Majesty, to deliver his Credentials.

To which they were introduced by the Right Hon. the Earl of Sandwich, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

DUBLIC Notice is hereby given, That by
an Act passed this last Session of Parliament, entitled, An Act for preventing Frauds and Abuses, in relation to the fending and receiving of Letters and Packets free from the Duty of Postage

It is Enacted, That from and after the First Day of May next, so long as the Revenue of the Post-Office shall continue to make a Part of the Aggregate Fund, no Letters or Packets shall be exempted from Payment

of Postage, except as follows: All fuch as shall be sent from or to The King's most

Exceilent Majesty.

All Letters and Packets, not exceding the Weight of Two Ounces, fent from and to any Places within Great Britain or Ireland, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before or after any Summons or Prorogation, which shall be signed on the Outlide by any Member of either House of the Parliament of Great Britain, and whereof the whole Superficiption shall be of his own Hand Writing, or

which shall be directed to a Member of either House, at any of the Places of his usual Residence, or at the Place where he thall actually he at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at either House of Parliament.

All Letters and Packets, not exceding the Weight of Two Ounces, fent from and to any Places within Ireland, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before or after any Summons or Prorogation, which shall be figned on the Outside by any Member of either House of the Parliament of Ireland, and whereof the whole Superfeription shall be of his own Hand Writing, or which shall be directed to a Member of either House, from any Part of Great Britain or Ireland, at any of the Places of his usual Refidence, or at the Place where he shall actually be at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at either House of Parliament.

All fuch Letters and Packets as shall be fent from and to certain Persons by Virtue of their Offices, under fuch Conditions, Restrictions, and Limitations,

as in the faid Act is particularly expressed.

It is likewise Enacted, That all printed Votes, or Proceedings in Parliament, or printed News Fapers, fent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides, figned on the Outside thereof, by the Hand of any Member of Parliament, in such Manner as has been heretofore practifed; or directed to any idember at any Place whereof he shall have given Notice in Writing to the Postmaster-General, or to his Deputy at Edinburgh or Dublin respectively, shall pass free of

And also, That the Clerks in the Offices of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and certain Officers in the Office of His Majesty's Postmader-General, may continue to Frank such printed Votes, and Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers, in the Manner they have heretofore been accustomed, provided they be fent without Covers, or

in Covers open at the Sides.

It is further Enacted, That any Officer employed under the Postmaster-General, shall have Power to examine and fearch any Packet sent without a Cover, or in a Cover open at the Sides, in Order to discover whether any other Paper or Thing whatfoever be inclosed or concealed in or with such printed Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers; and in Case any such other Paper or Thing whatfoever, shall be found in or with such printed Paper, or in Case there shall be any Writing, other than the Superscription upon such printed Paper, or upon the Cover thereof, the whole of fuch Packet shall be

charged with the Duty of Postage.

And it is further Enacted, That if any Person shail, after the First Day of June next, counterfeit the Hand Writing of any Person whatsover in the Superscription of any Letter, or Packet, to be fent by the Post, in Order thereby to avoid the Payment of the Duty of Postage, every Person so offending, shall be deemed Guilty of Felony, and be transported for Seven

Years.
