**H** E R Imperial Majesty returns To-morrow from Czarstkoe Selo, but it is supposed she will not remain long in Town.

*Algiers, June 4.* Yesterday Commodore Harrison, in the Centurion, sailed from hence to Mahon, after Three Weeks Stay here. In the Evening, the Vessel bound for Portsmouth, having on board his Royal Highness the Duke of York's Horses, put back to this Port, by reason of contrary Winds.

*Copenhagen, June 18.* On Sunday last this Court went into Mourning for Six Weeks for the late Princess Dowager of East Friesland, who died on the 7th Instant.
