Lisbon, June 16.

**I**N Searching among the Rubbish of the Custom-house, there have been found a large Parcel of Whalebone, several Hides, some damaged, others not, some few Chests of Sugars, and a great Deal of melted Sugar, and several Remnants of Woollens; the Whole amounting in Value to about Seven or Eight Thousand Pounds. The Warehouses under the Marine Arsenal are preparing in all Haste for the Reception of Goods; and Orders are given for building the new Custom house forthwith.

His Most Faithful Majesty has been pleased to remit the Duties of Export upon the Whalebone saved after the Fire.

Copenhagen, June 23. Count de Wurmbbrand, Minister Plenipotentiary from their Imperial Majesties, arrived here on Monday last, and had his Audience of the King of Denmark Yesterday.

An Ordonnance, dated the 4th of June, is lately published, prohibiting the Importation of Gunpowder, upon Pain of Confiscation, and the farther Punishment appointed by the Custom-house Laws.

they are to be paid their Half Pay, but also produce Certificates that they have subscribed to the Test, and taken the Oaths required by Act of Parliament to His present Majesty; and in Case any of the said Sea Officers shall not be able to attend themselves to receive their Money, but employ Attorneys for that Purpose, that the said Attorneys may produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Persons they are employed by.
