Vienna, July 7.

ON Tuesday Evening their Imperial Majesties made their publick Entry into Presburg, preceded by the Bishop and Prelates in their State-coaches; and by the Magistrates and inferior Nobles of Hungary on Horse back.

Venice, July 11. On the 29th past his Royal Highness the Duke of York came hither from Padua, and the next Morning went to the Arsenal and on Board the different Ships that were upon the Stocks, at which his Royal Highness expressed great Satisfaction; and in the Afternoon returned to Padua.

On the 3d instant his Royal Highness was pleased to accept of a Dinner from the Proveditor; and, after taking Leave of his Excellency, in his Box at the Theatre, set forward, at Break of Day, for Milan, and arrived that Night early at Brescia.

Count Rosenberg has left this Place, after having received two Purfes, each containing 764 Zecchins, from this Republick, which is the usual Present to Ambassadors that represent their Imperial Majesties.

THE King's Plate of One Hundred Pounds will be run for on Lewes Downs in Sussex, on Thursday the 23d of August next, by any Horse, Mare, or Gelding, being no more than Six Years old the Grads before, as must be certified under the Hands of the Breeder, carrying twelve Stone, the best of three Heats, round the Course. To be shewn and entered at Verrall's Coffee House in Lewes, on Wednesday the 22d Day of August next, or they are not to run for the said Plate: And if any Difference arises relating to their Ages, Entering, or Running, the same to be determined by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, or whom he shall appoint, according to such His Majesty's Orders or Rules, as shall be produced at the Place of Entering or Running for the said Plate.
