The humble Address of the President and Commander in Chief, the Council, and Assembly of your Bermuda or Sommer Islands.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the President, Council, and Assembly of your Bermuda Islands, humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty, with the warmest Sentiments of Regard and Affection, for your Paternal Care and unwearied Fortitude in Supporting a long and successful War for the Honour of the Crown and true Happiness of your People. After your Majesty was pleased to pursue every laudable Measure that could contribute to the Glory and Security of your extensive Dominions, you have at last, by your consummate Prudence and Wisdom, procured us a safe, honourable, and, we hope, a lasting Peace.

And we take Leave to express the most permanent

And we take Leave to express the most permanent and unseigned Joy on the Birth of a Second Prince to your Illustrious and August House; an Event which we esteem as an additional Strength to the present happy Establishment, and a surriner Prop and Security to our excellent Constitution in Church and State. Permit us, though remote, to consess, that the happy Insuence of your Majesty's mild and constitutional Government enables us to taste the the Sweets of Liberty; in such a Situation, must we not admire that Goodness of Heart that distinguishes You as a humane, benevolent, and amiable Prince? As your Arms have been a Scourge, so may your conspicuous and shining Virtues unite your Subjects in the highest Sentiments of Loyalty and Assection. May your Majesty's unwearied Endeavours prove successful in procuring to your Kingdoms, and their Appendages, the invaluable Blessings of Peace; may your Royal Example teach your Subjects to enjoy Freedom without Licentiousness; and that the innumerable Blessings we reap under your auspicious

Reign, may for a long Series of Ages be continued to our Posterity in your Illustrious Line.

Turin, July 11. His Royal Highness the Duke of York arrived here this Morning, and was met at some Distance from this Place by the Master of the Ceremonies, and his Deputy, in two of his Sardinian Majesty's Coaches, and conducted to the Palace prepared for his Reception; and soon after received the Compliments upon his safe Arrival, on the Part of the King, the Duke of Savoy, and the rest of the Royal Family; to all of whom his Royal Highness a sew Hours after paid his Visit, which was received with all the Marks of Friendship and Cordiality.

Stockholm, July 13. The Empress of Russia has sent a Present to the Queen of Sweden of Six Horses from the Ukraine; and her Majesty came on Wednesday to Carlberg to see them: There are three Saddle Horses, and three for the Sledge. Prince Bariatinskoi has received the King's Picture set with Diamonds; as also a Gold Snussibox, in the Lid of which is the Prince Royal's Picture, surrounded likewise with Diamonds; and the Day he took Leave, the King made him a Knight of the Order of the Sword.

Berlin, July 21. M. Badouin, the Prussian Secretary of Legation, set out from hence Yesterday for England. The King and Prince Royal of Prussia, accompanied by the Duke and Dutchess of Brunswick, the Horeditary Prince and Princess, and the Princesses Estabeth and Augusta of Brunswick, came from Potzdam to Charlottenbourg on the 16th Instant. The same Day Count Finckenstein acquainted the Foreign Ministers residing at this Court, with the intended Marriage of the Prince Royal of Prussia with the Princess Elizabeth of Brunswick, adding, that his Prussian Majesty would be pleased to see the Ministers at Charlottenbourg, to share in the Diversions that were to be given on this Occasion. On the 18th Instant the Ceremony of Betrothing was performed; and in the Evening there was an Assembly, the Garden being illuminated; and after Supper there was a Ball, which lasted till Morning.
