THE Empress returned to Schonbrun from Presbourg on Monday last. The Emperor is gone for a few Days to Holitsch, a Country Seat in Hungary. Their Imperial Majesties go again to Presbourg about the Middle of next Month, where they will stay a Fortnight, and then make a Visit to the Cardinal Archbishop of Vienna, at his Bishoprick in Hungary.

Berlin, July 28. The King of Prussia left Charlottenbourg on Monday the 23d, and returned to Potzdam accompanied by the Duke of Brunswick and his Family, who, after taking Leave of his Prussian Majesty, set out from that Place last Wednesday, lay that Night at Brandenbourg, and it is reckoned would arrive at Brunswick as Yesterday Evening.

Last Sunday Night his Serene Highness the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel set out from Charlottenbourg for his own Dominions.
