St. James's, September 28.

LA S T Night one of His Majesty's Messengers arrived from Madrid with Dispatches from His Majesty's Ambassador at that Court, transmitting a Duplicate of the Orders, which, in consequence of his Excellency's late Remonstrances, that Court has dispatched to Don Felipe Ramirez de Eftenoz, Governor of Yucatan: In which Orders his Catholick Majesty disapproves the Proceedings of the said Governor, with respect to His Majesty's Subjects in the Bay of Honduras; expresses his Desire of giving His Majesty the greatest Proofs of his Friendship, and of preserving Peace with the British Nation; and commands the said Governor to re-establish the British Logwood Cutters in the several Places from which he had obliged them to retire, and to let them know, that they may return to their Occupation of Cutting Logwood, without being disquieted or disturbed under any Pretence whatsoever.

Warsaw, September 8. The Ceremony of the Election of Count Stanislas Poniatowski to the Throne of Poland, passed the 6th Instant, with the most perfect Unanimity of the Suffrages of the whole Nation, delivered by the different Palatinates assembled for that Purpose: And Yesterday he was proclaimed by the Name of Stanislas Augustus, and conducted to the Court and Palace through the Acclamations of several Thousands of Spectators. The Primate announced the Election to all the Foreign Ministers, who in consequence thereof demanded Audiences this Morning; and they accordingly had the Honour to pay their Respects and Congratulations on his happy Accession to the Crown.

The Coronation is fixed for the 25th of November.

Segovia, September 10. Don Pedro de Salazar, a Colonel in the Spanish Guards, and who has the Rank of Brigadier in this Service, is appointed Captain-General of the Province of Guatimala, in the room of Don Joaquin de Aguiavié, deceased.

Berlin, September 18. Last Saturday the King of Prussia arrived in this Capital from Silesia, accompanied by the Prince Royal, and Prince Henry of Prussia, the Hereditary Prince, and the two Princes of Brunswick. His Prussian Majesty, soon after his Arrival, had a Levée, at which the Foreign Ministers here were present. The next Morning the King of Prussia set out from hence for Potzdam, where in all Probability he will remain for some Time, as there will, on the 27th of this Month, be a Camp formed in that Neighbourhood, which is to be composed of the Troops in Garrison at Potzdam, Spandow and

Brandenbourg, and of two or three Regiments from this Place; they have received Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to march against the 25th or 26th Instant.
