Lisbon, September 19.

THE Reigning Count de Schaumbourg-Lippe has taken Leave of the Court, and will embark To-morrow Morning on Board the Expedition Packet, with the Officers of his Suite. The Presents his Highness has received, are, Six small Pieces of Cannon of massive Gold, of very curious Workmanship, with his Highness's Coat of Arms upon each, upon Carriages of Brazil-Wood, bound with Silver-Plate, and the Wheels of Silver; a Diamond Star for his Order of the Black Eagle; his most Faithful Majesty's Picture set in Diamonds; and a Set of Diamond Buckles.

Warsaw, September 22. Great Preparations are making for the Coronation, which will be very magnificent.

Hamburg, October 2. Their Royal and Serene Highnesses the Hereditary Prince and Princess of Hesse, together with Prince Frederick, arrived at Altona late on Friday Evening, in perfect Health. M. Henning, a Knight of the Order of Dannebrogue, and President of Altona, received their Royal and Serene Highnesses at a little Distance from that City, the Streets whereof were illuminated upon their Entering into it. The next Day the Senate of Hamburg deputed two of their Members to compliment the Hereditary Prince and Princess upon their Arrival in the Neighbourhood of their City, and sent them a Present of Wine and other Refreshments. The Danish Envoy having notified their Arrival to the Foreign Ministers, they all had the Honour to pay their Court to their Royal and Serene Highnesses the next Day, as did most of the Nobility here, and were most graciously received. On Saturday their Highnesses rested themselves; and Yesterday Morning, about Ten o'Clock, they proceeded on their Journey: In passing thro' this City they were saluted, both at their Entrance and going out, with Twenty-one Pieces of Cannon. Their Royal and Serene Highnesses were to lay last Night at the Hope, on the other Side of the Elbe; and will pursue their Journey in short Stages, passing thro' Zelle and Hanover, in their Way to Hanau. It was not till Yesterday Morning that the Ladies sent from Hanau had the Honour to serve her Royal Highness, the Danish Ladies having continued till then in their Employments about her Royal Highness's Person. These

last are returned hither To-day, having attended upon her Royal Highness as far as the Zollenspicker, (the Passage of the Elbe) where they finally took Leave.

Prince Reprin sat out from hence for Petersbourg on Thursday last. Count Woronzow is expected here in a few Days. The Bishop of Lubec's House is made ready for his Reception.

Hague, October 2. The Princess of Weilbourg has been lately much indisposed in Germany, but her Highness, by the last Accounts, was pretty well recovered.
