By the KING, A PROCLAMATION,

For permitting the free Importation of Salted Provisions from Ireland into this Kingdom.

GEORGE

THEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, " An Act to enable His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order the Importation of Provi-" fions from Ireland during the next Recess of Par-" liament, under certain Restrictions and Regulations therein mentioned," We are empowered, during the present Recess of Parliament, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, from Time to Time to Order, Permit, and Authorize, the free Importation of Salted Beef, Salted Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from Ireland into this Kingdom, as We shall think convenient and needful, and as the Necessity of the Times may require, and in such Manner as We shall think fit to direct; Provided, that nothing therein contained shall extend to authorize the free Importation of Salted Beef, Salted Pork, Bacon, or Butter from Ireland, unless the Price of the best Ox Beef in Smithfield Market shall exceed Three-pence per Pound for the Four Quarters, and unless the Price of the best Pieces of such Beef shall exceed Four-pence per Pound at Leadenhall Market, and unless the Price of the best Pork shall exceed Four-pence per Pound, the best Bacon Seven pence per Pound, and of the best Butter shall exceed Nine pence per Pound, at Leadenhall Market .- And whereas a Petition hath been presented to Us in Council by several Merchants, large and extensive Dealers in Salt Provisions, humbly praying, that in regard the Prices of the aforementioned Provisions at Smithfield and Leadenhall Markets, do exceed the Prices specified in the said Act, We will be graciously pleased to permit the free Importation of Salted Beef, Salted Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from Ireland into this Kingdom .- And whereas it has been verified, by the Examination of several Witnesses, that the Prices of the best Beef, of the best Pork, and of the best Bacon, and of the best Butter, per Pound, do far exceed the Prices specified in the said Act; and We have the greatest Reason to suspect, that the present high Prices of Provisions do not arise from Scarcity, but are occasioned by unlawful Combinations; We do therefore, pursuant to the Powers vested in Us by the faid A&, and by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, by this Our Royal Proclamation, Order, Permit, and Authorize, the free Importation of Salted Beef, Salted Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from Ireland, into that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, subject to the Payment of the Duties in the faid Act mentioned, until, and provided the same be landed in any of the Ports of that Part of our faid Kingdom of Great Britain called England, on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next: And in order to prevent all unlawful Combinations

for the Enhancing the Price of Provisions, and for an Encouragement to all who shall discover any concerned in such illegal Practices, and bring the Offenders to Conviction, We do hereby promife and de-clare, that all Persons who shall so discover, and cause such Offenders to be convicted, shall be en-titled to a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS; which faid Sum of ONE HUN-DRED Pounds, the Commissioners of Our Treafury, or Our High Treasurer of Great Britain for the Time being, are hereby directed and required to pay accordingly, without any further or other Warrant in that Behalf.

AT the Court at St. Jamer's the 12th Day of O&ober, 1764,

PRESENT, The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

7 Hereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the Third Year of the Reign of His present Ma-jesty, intituled, "An Act for the further Improve-"ment of His Majesty's Revenue of Customs, and " for the Encouragement of Officers making Seizures, and for the Prevention of the Clandestine Run-" ning of Goods into any Part of His Majesty's Do-" minions," it is (amongst other Things) Enacted, That one Moiety of the nett Produce arising by the Sale of Smuggling Vessels and Prohibited Goods, which should be seized after the First Day of May. One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Three, and condemned and fold according to Law, (the Charges thereof being first deducted) should be allowed by the Commissioners of the Customs to any Officers of the Customs who should seize the same; and that the other Moiety thereof should be paid by the said Commissioners into the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer, in lieu of His Majesty's Share thereof, (except in those Cases which are otherwise provided for by the faid Act :) And that for the more effectual Prevention of the infamous Practice of Smuggling, and for the better Encouragement of the Officers and Seamen of all fuch Ships and Vessels of War belonging to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, who may be employed in preventing the clandestine Running of Goods on the Coasts of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the other Dominions and Colonies belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, to direct and appoint the Moiety therein before-mentioned, or any other Part of all and every the Seizure and Seizures that shall be made by fuch Officers and Seamen respectively, so employed as aforesaid, to be divided amongst all such Offi-

cers and Seamen who shall make any such Seizure, in such Proportions, and in such Manner, as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, shall think fit to order and direct, by any Order or Orders of Council, or by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be made or issued from Time to Time for that Purpose: And whereas by one other A& passed in the last Session of Parliament, entituled, "An A& for grant-"ing certain Duties in the British Colonies and Plan-" tations in America, for continuing, amending and " making perpetual an Act passed in the Sixth Yearof the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, (intituled, An Act for the better fecuring " and encouraging the Trade of His Majesty's Sugar Colonies in America) for applying the Produce of such Duties, and of the Duties to arise by Vir-" tue of the faid Act, towards defraying the Expences of defending, protecting, and fecuring, the faid Colonies and Plantations; for explaining an Act 66 made in the Twenty Fifth Year of the Reign of 46 King Charles the Second, (intituled, An Act for 46 the Encouragement of the Greenland and Eastland ⁶⁶ Trades, and for the better fecuring the Plantation Trade,) and for altering and disallowing several Drawbacks on Exports from this Kingdom, and "more effectually preventing the clandeftine Con-" veyance of Goods to and from the faid Colonies and Plantations, and improving and fecuring the "Trade between the fame and Great Britain"; it is, amongst other I hings enacted, That all Penalties and Forfeitures inflicted by that or any other A& or Acts of Parliament relating to the Trade and Revenues of the British Colonies or Flantations in America, which shall be incurred and recovered there (except fuch Seizures as shall be made at Sea by the Commanders or Officers of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels of War duly authorized to make Seizures) shall be divided, after deducting the Charges of Profecution from the Gross Produce thereof, into three Parts; and that one Part of the nett Produce thereof should be paid into the Hands of the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Port or Place where fuch Penalties or Forseitures should be recovered for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors; one other Third to the Governor of the Colony, and the other Third to the Seizer or Profecutor; and that one Moiety of all fuch Seizures as should be made at Sea by His Majesty's Ships and Vessels as aforefaid, and of the Penalties and Porfeitures recovered thereon, first deducting the Charges as aforesaid, shall be paid as aforesaid to the Collector of His Majesty's Customs, to and for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors; and the other Moiety to him or them who shall Seize, Inform, and Sue for the same; subject nevertheless to such Distribu-tion of the Produce of the Seizures so made at Sea, as well with Regard to the Moiety therein before granted to His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, as with Regard to the other Moiety given to the Seizer or Prosecutor, as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors shall think sit to order and direct by any Order or Orders of Council, or by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be made for that Purpose; His Majesty taking the same into his Royal Consideration, is hereby pleased, pursuant to the Powers vested in him by the said Acts of Parliament, and by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, direct and appoint, that the Moiety, or other Part of all and every the Seizure and Seizures that have been, or shall be made by Virtue of the first mentioned Act, and granted to the Officers and Seamen as aforesaid, and the Moiety of Seizures granted by the faid last mentioned Act, be divided in the following Proportions, viz.

iff. With Regard to Seizares made by the Officire and Men of Ships and Sloops of V/ar.

To the Captain or Captains of any fuch Ships or Sloops who thall be actually on Board at the Science of any Smuggling Vessel or prohibited Goods, Three Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them: To the Captains of Marines and Land Frigues, See Lieutenants and Masters on Board any fach Ships o. Sloops, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided among [them: To the Lieutenants and Quarter Mafters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Enfigas, and Quarter Ma-iters of Land Forces, Boatfwain, Conner, Parler, Carpenter, Master's Mate, Surgeon, Pilot, and Chaplain, on Board any fuch Ships or Sloops, One Eighti-Part, to be equally divided amongst them: To the Midshipmen, Secretary to Flag Officere, Captain's Clerk, Matter Sailwaker, Carpenter's Matters, Boat-fwain's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Matter at Arms, Corporals, Yeomen of the Sheets, Conswain, Quarter Masters, Quarter Master's Mates, Surgeon's Mates, Yeomen of the Powder Room, and Serjeans of Marines, or Land Forces on Board any fuch Ships or Sloops, One Eighth Part to be equally divided amongik them: To the Trumpeters, Quarter Ganners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Co per, Swapber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinoy Seamen, and Marine, or other Soldiers, and all ether codo doing Duty, or affifting on Board any fuch Ships or Sloops, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them.

2d. With Regard to Seizures made by the Officers and Men of Cutters commanded by Lieutenants.

To the Lieutenant commanding such Cutter, who shall be actually on Board as the Seizure of any Smuggling Vessel, or Prohibited Goods, One Half Part: To the Second Mader and Pilot, or Mader's Mate and the Midshipmen on Board any such Cutter, One Eighth Part: The Second Musser and Polot, or Ma-fler's Mart, in have Two Third Parts thereof, and the Midshipman to have the Renainder; but if there should happen to be all the Extraordinary on Board at the making of any fuch Selzure, the Second Master and Pilot, or Master's Mate, is, in that Case, to have one Moiety of the faid Eighth Part, and the other Moiety is to be equally divided between the Pilot Extraordinary and Midshipman: To the Clerk and Steward, Boatswain's Mate, Gunner's Mate, Carpenter's Mate, and Surgeon's Mate on Board any fuch Cutter, One Bighth Part: To the Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and all other Persons doing Duty and affiling on Board any fuch Cutter, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided among & them.

3d. With regard to Scizures made by Ships or Sloops of War in Conjunction with Cutters.

That in all fuch Cases, the Moiety or other Part which is given to the Officers and Men who shall make such Seizure, be divided into so many equal Parts or Shares, as there may be Ships or Sloops and Cutters concerned therein; and that those Shares be distributed to the Officers and Men of the Ships or Sloops and Cutters according to the aforegoing Proportions.

And His Majesty doth hereby further order, direct, and appoint, That in the Case of Scizures made at Sea in any of the Colonies Abroad, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, by His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, being Part of the Squadron, or acting under the Orders of a Flag Officer, or a Commodore with a Captain under him, such Flag Officer or Commodore shall have One Fourth Part of the Moiety or other Part of the said Seizures directed by the said last mentioned Act to be paid to the Collector of His Majesty's

jesty's Customs, or reserved by sormer Acts for His Majesty's Use: And in Case any Sea Captain, inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officers, belonging to any fuch Ship or Vessel, for whom any Shares of Seizures are hereby allowed, be absent at the Time of making fuch Seizure, the Share of fuch Sea Captain, inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officer, shall be cast into the Shares hereby allowed to the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpanter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Staward's Mare, Cook's Mate, Gunners, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Scamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty or affifting on board any fuch Ship or Vessel, to be equally divided amongst them : Provided, that if any Officer or Officers on Board of any fuch Ship or Sloops at the Time of making fuch Seizures, shall have more Commissions or Offices than One, he or they shall be intitled only to the Share which, according to the abovementioned Distribution, shall belong to his or their respective superior Commissions or Offices. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majetty's Treefury, and the Lord's Commissioners of the Admi. alty, are to cause His Majesty's Pleasure hereby figuified, to be duly complied with.
