Vienna, October 17.

THE King of the Romans returned from Bohemia on Sunday Morning. Monday last being the Empress's Name-Day, was kept at Schonbrun with great Solemnity. In the Morning the Ambassadors paid their Compliments to her Imperial Majesty in private Audiences: At Noon the Royal Family dined in Publick; and in the Evening there was a Ball, and afterwards a Supper.

Turin, October 27. The French Troops destined for Corsica, are now quite ready at Toulon, expecting every Day final Orders to embark: And the 18th Instant a Genoese Galley, with five large Barks, sailed from Genoa for Bastia, to bring back the Troops of the Republick, as soon as the French shall have taken Possession of those Places which they are to garrison.

Segovia, October 27. His Catholick Majesty goes on Monday the 29th to the Escorial, with the Prince of Asturias, and the youngest Prince; who has had the Chicken Pox; the Two others, who have the same Distemper, but are in a fair Way of Recovery, will remain here for some Time; and the King of Spain's Brother Don Lewis remains also here with the Queen Mother, until her Majesty is able to undertake the Journey. The Foreign Ministers had all the Honour of paying their Court to her Majesty last Thursday the 25th, which was her Birth-day. Her Majesty is greatly recovered.

This Day Count Bruhl, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Saxony, had his first Private Audience of His Majesty to deliver his Credentials.

And the Chevalier Stapleton, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Duke of Wurtemberg, had also his first Private Audience of His Majesty.

To which they were introduced by the Right Hon. the Earl of Sandwich, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

To which they were introduced by the Right Honourable Lord Viscount Cantalupe, Her Majesty's Vice-Chamberlain; and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

London, November 9.

Yesterday Sir William Stephenson, Knt. Lord Mayor Elect for the Year ensuing, was sworn at

Guildhall; when the Chair, and other Ensigns of Mayoralty, were surrendered to him in the accustomed Manner.

This Day the new Lord Mayor, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Recorder, and Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went in their Coaches to the Water-side, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City Officers attending, and from thence proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the several Companies in their respective Barges, adorned with Streamers and Pendants, to Westminster; and having walked round the Hall, and solemnly saluted all the Courts, they went to the Exchequer Bar, and the new Lord Mayor did there take the Oaths appointed; and having recorded Warrants of Attorney in the proper Courts, returned by Water to Black Fryars, and from thence in Coaches, with the usual Solemnity, to Guildhall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided; at which were present the Great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, the Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, the Judges, and other Persons of Quality and Distinction.

And it is also further enacted, that all and every Person and Persons, who shall print, paint, or stain any Paper in Great Britain as aforesaid, for Sale or not for Sale, shall give or leave Notice in Writing, at the Office for the said Duties on Paper next to the Place where such Paper shall be printed, painted, or stained, of their respective Names and Places of Abode, and the Place where they shall respectively print, paint, or stain any such Paper as aforesaid, before they respectively do presume to print, paint, or stain the same; to the End the Commissioners, or other Officers for the said Duties on Paper, may, from Time to Time, have due Knowledge of all the Places where such Goods shall be wrought, and be the better enabled to secure the Duties thereby granted thereupon: And if any such Person or Persons, who shall print, paint, or stain any Paper for which a Duty ought to be paid by the said Acts, shall neglect to give or leave such Notice as aforesaid, he, she, or they shall, for every such Offence, forfeit the Sum of 30 l. And it is further enacted, that all and every Person and Persons, who shall print, paint, or stain any Paper as aforesaid in Great Britain, shall once in every six Weeks make a true Entry in Writing, at the next Office for the said Duties upon Paper, of all the Paper by him, her, or them severally made fit for Use within such six Weeks respectively; which Entries shall contain the just Kinds and Quantities thereof, on Pain to forfeit, on every Neglect of such Entry, the Sum of 50 l. which Entries shall be made upon Oath, or upon Affirmation. And whereas by an Act passed in the 1st Year of the Reign of his Majesty King George the First, among other Things, for preventing Frauds in the Duties relating to printed or painted Paper, &c. it is enacted, that no Person or Persons, who shall print, paint, stain, or dye any Paper chargeable with the said Duty, shall remove, carry, or send away, or suffer to be removed, carried, or sent away, any Paper by him, her, or them printed, painted, or stained respectively, until such Time as the proper Officer shall have taken an Account of every particular Quantity of such Paper so to be carried away, and until every particular Piece and Parcel of such Paper shall be duly marked with such Stamp or Seal as aforesaid, denoting the Charging of the said Duty, on Pain to forfeit 20 l. for every such Offence; and that all the printed, painted, or stained Paper, so carried away without being marked with such Stamp or Seal denoting the Charging of the said Duty, and being in the Possession of any Stationer, or other Trader or Dealer therein, or of any other Person or Persons for the Use of such Stationer, Trader, or Dealer, for Sale, shall and may be seized and recovered one Moiety thereof for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, and the other Moiety for the Use of the Seizer or Informer.

And whereas there is Reason to believe, that several Persons practise the Painting of Paper for Hanging Rooms, without making the Entries or paying the Duties aforesaid, whereby they incur the Penalties inflicted by the said Laws;

Notice is hereby given, that all Persons, who paint Paper for Hangings, and neglect to make the Entries,

and pay the Duties aforesaid, will be prosecuted as the said Laws direct.
