*Genoa, October 20.* This Week the Republick has received Advice, that the Succours and Reinforcement sent to the Garrison of San Fiorenza were got safe. Some Corsican Soldiers, and the Officer of the Fort in Erbalonga, having determined to deliver the Fort to the Genoese, a Detachment of the Republick's Troops was sent from Bastia on Board some Vessels to assist them; but the Design of those in the Fort having been discovered, the Male-contents came down from the adjacent Villages, and prevented the Genoese from Landing. The Officer and Soldiers, finding their Design circumvented, began a Parley with the other Male-contents; but whilst the Officer was treating, he was shot; which so disheartened the Soldiers, that they offered to surrender up the Fort on Condition of their Lives being spared; which was promised: But as soon as the Male-contents got Possession of the Fort, they stabbed with Stiletto's every one of the Mutineers.

*Vienna, October 24.* His Royal Highness Prince Charles of Lorraine arrived here on Thursday in perfect Health; and his Sister Princess Charlotte is expected in a few Days.

The Court went on Monday to Schlofs-Hoff, a Country-Seat of the Emperor's; and will remain there till the End of the Week.

At Noon there was a very splendid Levee at the Castle; after which their Excellencies the Lords Justices, attended by the Nobility and Gentry, and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, went in Procession round the Statue of King William, and Stephen's Green. By Command of their Excellencies the Play of Terrestrial was performed at the Theatre Royal: And the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and every other Demonstration of Joy.
