The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 12th Day of October last, to order, permit, and authorize the Importation of Salted Beef, Salted Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from Ireland, into that Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain called England (pursuant to the Powers veited in His Majesty for that Purpose, during the present Recess, by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament) until and provided the same be landed in any of the Ports of that Part of the said Kingdom of Great Britain called England, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this Instant December. — And whereas the Time thereby limited for the Importation of the said Salted Provisions is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient that the same should be continued for as long Time as His Majesty by the said Act is empowered to permit the same—His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby accordingly Ordered, that the Time limited by the said Proclamation, for the Importation of Salted Beef, Salted Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from Ireland, be prolonged and extended to the Ninth Day of January next inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice.

Warsaw, November 28. The King of Poland was crowned the 25th Instant, with all the Pomp and Ceremonies customary on that important Occasion. His Majesty received the Congratulations of the Foreign Ministers in the Name of their respective Sovereigns; and the next Day the Homage of the Towns of Warsaw and Cracow; and was pleased to Knight Six Burgesses of the former Place, and Four of the latter. The Joy of the Nation was testified by every Means possible, such as Illuminations, Balls, &c. &c. which will probably continue till the Opening of the Diet. The first Acts of Sovereignty were, the Investing with the Order of the White Eagle, Prince Repnin, Ambassador from the Court of Russia; Prince Adam Czartorinski; and the King's Brother Abbé Poniatowski.

The great Charges vacant are not yet disposed of.

Dresden, December 3. Prince Charles fell lately with his Horse as he was Boar-hunting, and received a Contusion on his Breast; but is at present much recovered.

The Prince Administrator had also a Fall the same Day, but received no Hurt.

The whole Electoral Family go to Moritzburg this Morning; but will return again at Night to be present at a French Comedy.

Hamburgb, December 7. The Accounts vary yet very much with respect to the Loss sustained at Königsberg by the late Fire: It is said, that it amounts to about 67,000 l. Sterling.

Berlin, December 8. The King of Prussia continues at Potsdam; and it is said that he is confined to his Room by a slight Fit of the Gout.

Last Night M. de Schlabrendorff, the King of Prussia's Principal Minister in Silesia, arrived here from Breslau.

Hague, December 14. By Order of the Court of Holland, some late impious Productions of the Press, particularly a Work intitled, *Dictionaire Philosophique*, have been burnt this Morning by the Hands of the Common Hangman.

The Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having appointed Money for paying Half Pay to Sea Officers from the 1st of January, to the 30th of June, 1764, according to His Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf; These are to give Notice, that the said Payment will begin to be made at the Office of the Treasurer of the Navy in Broad Street, on Thursday and Friday the 20th and 21st Instant, at Ten o'Clock in the Morning, viz.
